Changing of the Guards, Dornbrook Excited for Next Chapter as Chief Dowland Takes Reins

Retired Campbellsport Police Chief Tom Dornbrook signed off on Jan. 3, and new Chief Andrea Dowland was sworn in the next day

For someone who spent more than four decades in law enforcement in the State of Wisconsin, one could reasonably assume that former Campbellsport Police Chief Tom Dornbook might feel bittersweet about his retirement.

That was not the case.

Instead, when former Fond du Lac (FDL) County Sheriff's Deputy Andrea Dowland was officially sworn in as the village's next Chief of Police on Wednesday, Jan. 4, Dornbrook said he felt relieved.

"When she was sworn in, it was a weight lifted off my shoulder," said Dornbrook roughly 48 hours after he officially retired from his post. His last day was Jan. 3, but he has remained by Dowland's side during her first days and weeks to help the transition.

That metaphorical heaviness rising off Dornbook's epaulets was not due to ennui or animosity. Instead, the former chief was reassured out," recalled Dornbrook. "I've been telling everyone: She's young, she's ambitious, she's intelligent, and I think she's going to be a chief with new ideas; better than I was. She's going to improve our department. I wholeheartedly mean that."

Dornbrook said with change in leadership should come improvements. He noted that when he joined the Campbellsport Police Department (CPD) five years ago, he viewed the department as having an accessibility issue.

"Nobody had access to the police department," said Dornbrook, noting that it was not uncommon for a citizen to arrive at the police station only for there to be no cops. "We opened it up. We created a reception area, we hired an administrative assistant... and I think that was a big thing that we did from day one."

In the last half decade, Dornbrook said he was proud of modernizing other parts of the department, as well. Under his leadership, the CPD has invested in new squad and body cameras, new radios and was able to solicit a donation for active-shooter defense materials like body armor. Recently, Dornbrook said he was pleased to get the Campbellsport School District back up-to-



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Kewaskum Village and Library Boards at **Impasse Regarding Shared Facilities**

There is no clear path forward as library expresses discontent with present shared-facility building plans

A joint meeting between the Village of Kewaskum Board of Trustees and Kewaskum Library Board members took place on Monday, Jan. 9, with both sides appearing to be at a crossroads on how to proceed with the current sharedfacilities building project.

West Bend City Administrator Jay Shambeau, who was Kewaskum's Village Administrator from 2006-2008, was present to moderate per the request of village officials.

"I'm happy to help be a part of the discussion, but I don't claim to be an expert on your topic or your issues," said Shambeau clarifying his role as a facilitator.

For the next 80 minutes, the roughly one-dozen village board, library board and Kewaskum Public Library Foundation, Inc. members discussed what's become a standstill regarding the sharedfacilities building project between the village and the library.

Prior to the meeting, the village was planning to move forward with a two-story (plus basement) three-departmental building, which would house the Kewaskum Police Department, the village administrative offices and the library. Per this plan, the current Annex Building would be demolished, and the shared-facilities building would be erect-

that Campbellsport – a place he called home both in his younger years and the last five as the police force leader - had found a trustworthy and reliable successor in newly appointed Chief Dowland.

"I'm anxious for the department to move forward," said Dornbrook, who has known Dowland for years. He said her track record with the FDL County Sheriff's Office speaks for itself, but he added that her familiarity with Campbellsport and her demeanor will make for a good fit between the department, the village and Dowland.

When the plausibility of retirement started to become an inevitability, Dornbrook said he phoned Dowland and asked her to consider applying once his decision was official.

"I thought it would be a good place for her if she was interested, and that's the way it worked date with state regulations regarding school safety and active shooter preparation, as well.

"That's the stuff we did that I really liked," said Dornbrook, who also added that - under his watch - communication with the school and village boards and the community-at-large also increased substantially.

Looking ahead, Dornbrook will stay plenty busy with his other current roles: He serves as a Fond du Lac County Board Supervisor for District 9, and he said he plans to run for local office in Campbellsport. He currently lives in the village.

"I have a soft spot for this community," admitted Dornbrook, who credited Campbellsport residents for making the village a pleasant place

Last week, in my first column of the year, I wrote that I had planned to keep rolling with a prompt that asked, "What is a newspaper?"

I hope readers will allow me, even this early in my so-far-brief 52-week run, to put that on pause until next edition.

Instead, I wanted to write about Buffalo Bills football player Damar Hamlin, who went into cardiac arrest on national television last week, Jan. 2, during a Monday Night Football game while his team played in Cincinnati against the Bengals.

For readers unaware, the 24-year-old's heart stopped after an in-game collision, and he required life-saving efforts from first responders (members of the Bills' athletic training department) on the field. The game, which was only in the first quarter at the time Hamlin collapsed, was postponed and then cancelled.

As of print time, Hamlin was reported to be returning home after receiving care at a hospital in Cincinnati for roughly one week. He's been able to communicate and is expected to continue his recovery.

In the immediate aftermath and the days following the shock of what transpired, speculation started on what the National Football League's (NFL) actions would be.

For the record, there is nothing inherently wrong with wondering about the logistics such an event would cause to an enormous organization like the NFL. Knowing full well that every-

to work, live and play. "They are good people. The citizens are good citizens. That's why I think [Campbellsport] is a good fit for Andrea. For Dornbrook, closing his career in the Kettle Moraine is a bit like coming around full-circle. For 13 years in the 1960s and 70s, Dornbrook was a village resident.

He graduated from Rosendale High School (now Laconia) and moved up in the law enforce-

one with an iota of compassion had his or her mind on Hamlin, it was okay to speculate and express curiosity about the next steps.

What was not okay was some folks' presumption that the NFL, with all its billions of dollars, could not simply cancel a game because it was "far too important" to the season's outcome or to its bottom line. In particular, rich charlatans in suits on television thought it an opportune time – when it wasn't clear if Hamlin would survive – to prognosticate on their platforms that the NFL would force the Bills and Bengals to replay the contest in short order.

The NFL, which has had a checkered history on "doing the right thing", did the right thing, and flatly told the minority of talking heads that: No, even *we* are not more important than someone's life.

This last weekend, football continued and the regular season officially ended; though, the Bills and Bengals only played 16 games, while the other 30 teams played 17.

And did it matter?

No.

In the grand scheme of things, even a culturally defining entity like the NFL is pretty low on the list of Most Valuable Things, and that's coming from someone who watches the game every week and interned for NFL Films.

I'm glad common sense prevailed, and I hope the universal support for Hamlin and his recovery is a reminder that life is a lot more important than football.



"I'd like to thank the village board that hired me," he said. "And, I'd like to thank the citizens of Campbellsport."



We have lived in our house almost a quarter of a century and have amassed a lot of stuff. Our house is large and we have plenty of storage. I remember moving in and thinking that we would never fill all the closets and cubbies and drawers. We have not. There is still an empty drawer in one of our bathroom vanities. But the rest is full and we have come to a point where we are contemplating downsizing.

Ideally, we will move to a place half the size of what we have now, if not smaller. This move will probably be anytime between two and five years. Plenty of time to get rid of everything we will not need, right? Doubtful. To be truthful, I have been cleaning out the house a little at a time for a while. But it does not seem to have made a dent in our belongings. I could use help.

There are multitudes of books, podcasts and websites on the topic of decluttering. I read an article in *Psychology Today* about the joys of downsizing. Some highlights were the ability to walk down memory lane, feel generous when you are giving away your items and that less is more. This can be an overwhelming task, or for some, super simple which reminds me of my grandmother. She had a large house and it was orderly and always as neat as a pin. When they moved from Wisconsin to California, I don't think it took her more than a month to get rid of what she didn't want.

Years ago, at a different library, I had a program about decluttering. It was very well-attended, especially during a time when it was advised to get rid of possessions that did not give you joy. The presenter was good but I felt somewhat judgmental especially when she stated that no one needed more than five books in their home. I will disagree with that until the day I die.

There are professional organizers for hire to assist you with the job of decluttering. Kewaskum Public Library will have a program on this topic presented by professional organizer Kelly Weltin. Kelly is a master organizer and has made a career out of her passion. The program "Why We Keep Our Clutter" will go over how to determine which things matter and how to get rid of everything else. Health Department Offers Radon Test Kits for Radon Action Month

During National Radon Action Month, the Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department is encouraging citizens to test their homes for radon by offering free test kits to residents. We are asking residents to bring a non-perishable food item to our department in exchange for a free test kit. All items collected during outreach events will be donated to a local food bank. Please note that postage on the test kit is not included.

Radon is a naturally occurring odorless, colorless gas found in rock and soil. Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer, claiming the lives of an estimated 20,000 Americans each year. In Wisconsin about one out of 10 homes has high radon levels.

The radon test kit is easy to use and only takes a few minutes to set up. Once you open it, the kit stays in your home for two days. Then you will package it and mail it to the lab for analysis. The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the U.S. Surgeon General strongly recommends all homes be tested for radon. Homes with radon levels of four picocuries per Liter (4 pCi/L) or higher should be remediated. If you

Three new businesses are coming to the TIF (Tax Increment Financing) District in Kewaskum. A plumbing contractor, a graphics sign shop, and an exercise facility will all be housed in a new 11,200-square-foot building that will be constructed off Industrial Drive, directly west of Daco Precision, Inc. Stellar Abodes, LLC, is purchasing the property and hopes to run a plumbing business from the location, as well as lease to two tenants. The graphics sign shop is not named in the article. The exercise facility is Next Level Fitness, which currently works out of Holy Trinity Church.

More trees will be logged at Reigle Family Park in Kewaskum. The village board decided unanimously on January 15 that trees should be removed from the western border of the park between the two driveways. The village board had initially wanted to leave as many trees as possible to create a border between the park and neighboring properties.

Students in the Kewaskum School District now have more than 3,000 e-books available to them. Kewaskum is one of 52 school districts and individuals from across the state that joined the Wisconsin Schools Digital Library Consortium. The new collection became available for participating school districts on January 8.

ed in its place.

The library, in this plan, is to be on the top floor. Kewaskum Public Library Director Lori Kreis stated that dozens of community members, after hearing about the initial plans, took umbrage with the library's location up a flight of stairs.

"I had people screaming at me because we were going to be on the second floor," said Kreis.

Kreis also stated the library staff, board and Foundation - based on initial plans for library expansion that started nearly two decades ago - had hoped for more square footage than the current project was offering.

Village Trustee Nate Wendelborn expressed frustration that, after months of approving designs, he only recently heard about the library board and Foundation's concerns. He added that, per the village's plan to fundraise the projected \$9 million cost for the building, the library would leave the village and police department hanging if it backed out.

"This is roughly a \$9 million building, and the library is responsible for one-third of that," explained Wendelborn, adding that fundraising might be more difficult for the village if the library is not involved in the building. "You hamstrung us on who we can go out and get to benefit that building."

Wendelborn and the other present village trustees also noted that - should the library seek its own separate facility - that it would need to budget the additional costs for utilities and other expenses.

"How are you going to fund that?" asked Wendelborn.

Village officials added that a petition, which was facilitated late in 2022 and placed inside the library

and local businesses, asking patrons about their desires for the future library space, seemed to be a "lightning rod" for discontent in the project.

"When the petition was introduced, it created this thought that [the library board] wanted to fund a separate library and, now, not matter what we do, it causes a hindrance to our ability to fundraise," said Village Trustee Fuzz Martin, noting that the village's plan in raising capital wrapped around messaging of the new building being a "joint facility."

Kreis said the petition was only meant to gather information and to honor the library's stated mission of expanding community space. According to its members, the Foundation, a non-profit organization that benefits the Kewaskum Public Library, started the petition.

"It wasn't anything to 'stick it to the board," said Kreis, quoting a previous statement from a village official.

Toward the end of the meeting, an added wrinkle was thrown into the ring: the recent closure of the PNC Bank branch at 1225 Fond du Lac Ave. Members of the library board expressed interest in this location as a possible public library.

"I think we should put it on hold until we find out what goes on," said Trustee Richard Knoebel, noting the potential sale of the former PNC Bank building might not be feasible until March or later in the spring. "We're not going to get this done tonight, and we're not going to get this done in the next month or two."

While at times the discussion teetered on contentious, Shambeau and all present members of the represented boards did express optimism on a conclusion, but not in the present. By the meeting's end, it was clear that more discussions would be necessary to move forward with a shared-facilities building project.

"You've got your concerns, and we've got our concerns," said Knoebel to members of the library board. "And we're not gelling, at all."

The village board moved into closed session for the remainder of the meeting.





AN Outdoorsman's JOURNAL **Cold Weather Goose Hunt**

This December, I was driving on the interstate near Deforest in mid-December - headed to my good friend Dick Emerson's funeral – and I had just written about Dick the week before. Dick and Molly Emerson are the couple that helped me become a writer.

I kept noticing, literally, hundreds of Canadian geese flying all over.

Dick's funeral was ter, Flower, who is 3. in Deforest, and I had а brainstorm and decided to call Seth Steinhauer, who is 33, a solid member of our group of very fun people and asked him where the heck I could hunt in this area.

Seth is an arborist with Bugg Tree Care and has been an active waterfowl hunter since he was old enough to legally be a waterfowler. Seth has two Chesapeakes: Arrow, who is 8, and her daugh-

Seth Steinhauer is more into using a kayak than a motor, which is something that I have a lot of respect for.

SUNDAY, DEC. 18 HIGH: 25. LOW: 6.

This would be a very interesting and fun hunt for both of us.

First, Seth was dragging a kayak loaded with decoys, and I was pulling an Otter Sled a good half-mile.

Next, we dragged our rigs on just-thickenough ice about

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400-yards and then dogs and men immersed themselves in water while wearing chest waders.

Then, we set decoys and, finally, we hid in cattails next to each other and began our hunt.

Today was opening day of the late Canada goose season and, let me tell you, I made the right call when I chose Seth Steinhauer. The conditions were kind of brutal and, to hunt where we were, you had to travel on foot. It was somewhat dangerous and, despite the fact that we were near Madison (meaning lots of people), we did not hear another shot for our entire hunt.
