Campbellsport B.P. Canopy Collapses

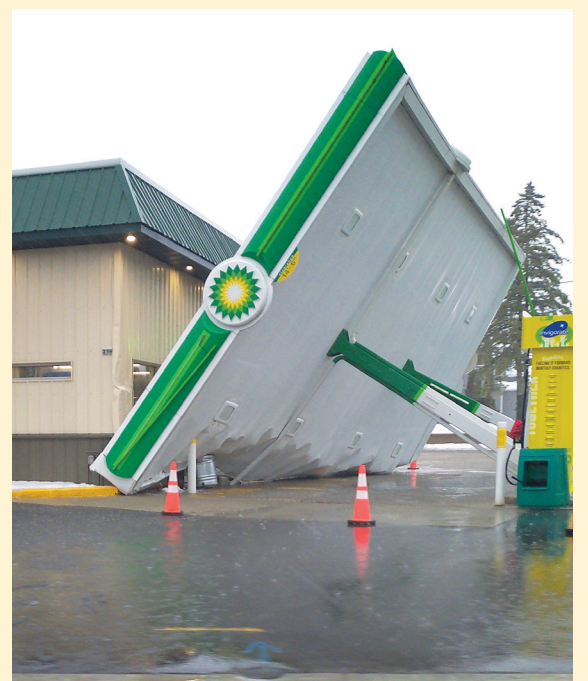
A Kohn's Filling Station fuel canopy fell over during a Feb. 27 morning storm

Welcoming Mr. Stanley

As reported on this edition's front page, former *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel* Editor George Stanley will be joining this weekly's publishing company, Multi Media Channels (MMC), beginning this month as a Local News Initiatives Adviser.



In the bubble that is the Wisconsin news industry, this is akin to one's favorite sports team landing the off-season's biggest free agent.

Starting as a reporter for the *Sentinel* in 1989, Stanley took over as managing editor of the merged *Journal Sentinel* in 1995. Under his leadership, the *Journal Sentinel* won three Pulitzer Prizes (one of the most prestigious awards given to newspapers and journalists).

He announced he was stepping down as editor of the *Journal Sentinel* last year after more than three decades with the papers.

My entire life, Stanley has been a dedicated newspaperman in Southeastern Wisconsin. As I navigated journalism school at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, his was a name brought up often both as an example of how to report and how to lead. Stanley is known for his unflappable leadership and a dogged commitment to quality journalism; his reputation for rebuilding and reorienting newsrooms and his passion for

nurturing young journalists could be considered second-to-none.

In addition to other duties, Stanley will work with MMC's Pass it Forward internship program: a cooperative initiative sponsored by the Green Bay Packers Give Back group and Nicolet Bank, which seeks to support local educational institutions in training the next generation of journalists while fostering the community news environment.

I do not have any additional inside-baseball information on the finer details of Stanley's upcoming work with MMC, nor do I know what immediate short-term effects there might be for this newspaper. I was surprised and excited to get the news via internal communications on February 23, and a press release was issued the next morning.

All I can do is pass along my educated opinion on Stanley joining the fold: this is a great thing for MMC and for this community paper.

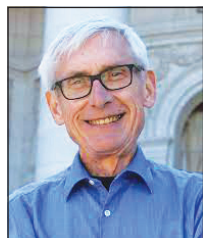

Gov. Evers to Deliver on Promise of 10-Percent Middle-Class Tax Cut

Governor's budget to deliver more than \$1.2 billion in targeted tax relief to working families, parents, veterans, caregivers, seniors, and student loan borrowers

Relief for working families supported by provisions limiting tax giveaways to wealthy earners

Gov. Tony Evers announced provisions in his 2023-25 biennial budget that will deliver on the governor's promise made last August to fight for a 10-percent middle-class tax cut. The plan aims to build upon income tax cuts signed by Gov. Evers since taking office that have returned \$1.4 billion annually to taxpayers by delivering more than \$1.2 billion in targeted tax relief to working families, parents, veterans, caregivers, seniors, and student loan borrowers, among others, while limiting tax giveaways to wealthy earners.

"I promised the people of this state I'd fight to deliver a 10-percent tax cut for middle-class and

working families, and today, I'm proud to deliver on that promise. I've said all along that we'd deliver real, responsible tax relief targeted to the middle class and working families – not spending big on breaks for the wealthiest 20 percent of earners in our state who don't need the extra help affording rising costs," said Gov. Evers.

"I'm proud to have signed one of the largest tax cuts in state history and to have kept my promise to provide a 15-percent tax cut for middle-class families during my first term in office, and with this budget proposal, we're going to build on that work so we can keep taxes low now and into the future responsibly and without driving our state into debt or causing devastating cuts to priorities like public schools or public safety."

Over the course of his first term, Gov. Evers more than delivered on the promise he made be-

Evers is Living in a Fantasy World (Where Money Grows on Trees)

Gov. [Tony] Evers recently announced his spending plan to expand the scope of government and increase total state expenditures in excess of 22% over the two-year budget cycle. With a laundry list of wishful ideas crammed into a 1,815-page budget proposal, this is arguably Evers most out of step budget proposal yet.

Evers budget spends down our projected \$7.1 billion state surplus to an alarming \$2.8 billion deficit by the end of this budget – let that sink in. A good portion of the surplus is due to previous prudent and conservative fiscal practices by the Legislature. However, it includes tax collec-

tions from \$68 billion in one-time federal COVID money sent to Wisconsin that cannot support the checkbook-busting permanent increases Evers proposes. Even the surplus was not enough as Evers' proposed budget has a net increase in taxes. To put it into perspective, this budget proposes spending \$103.8 billion versus the previous \$87.5 billion budget. That is triple the average growth over the 8 prior budgets!

Strikingly, Evers proposes \$2.8 billion, a 17.27% increase, in K-12 spending while enrollment and achievement levels decline. Note that \$2.8 billion is close to quadruple what Evers hailed as a record school aid increase in his first budget. The proposed increase in K-12 spending alone con-

The newspaper's work won nearly every major national award for reporting about health, business, education, justice, politics, sports and the environment, including 10 Pulitzer finalists and three Pulitzer Prize winners.

Stanley has participated in several national programs aimed at finding a sound future for local news, including the Table Stakes News Transformation program run by the American Press Institute, Lenfest Foundation and Temple University.

Through Table Stakes, the Journal Sentinel learned to innovate, reach readers they hadn't been serving before and dramatically grow both digital-only circulation revenue and grant-funded journalism projects.

Stanley helped found the O'Brien Public Service

Fellowship program at Marquette University's journalism school, which is fully endowed by a \$10 million donation.

In this program, experienced journalists spend an academic year working on a major public service journalism project that they then bring back to their newsrooms. A student returns with each fellow to their home newsroom for a summer internship paid for by the program.

Stanley is past president of the News Leaders Association and a board member of the Wisconsin Newspaper Association.

Before becoming managing editor of the Journal Sentinel, he was business editor and before that he was a reporter for the *Milwaukee Sentinel*, the *Wichita Eagle* and *Ducks Unlimited* magazine with an expertise in environmental and conservation reporting.

He started his career at the *Lake Geneva Regional News* after graduating from the University of Wisconsin.

He and his wife Pam grew up in Allouez. They have five adult children and seven grandchildren.

"I'm excited about working with the Multi Media Channels, the Press Times and the Pass it Forward internship program as foundation stones to strengthen community news coverage in Wisconsin," Stanley said. "For our democracy to work the way it's supposed to, people need to be informed about what's going on at all levels with our schools, law enforcement, roads, zoning, taxes, new developments, you name it. The business models that supported this local reporting are rapidly changing, and we've got to find ways to retain and rebuild it."

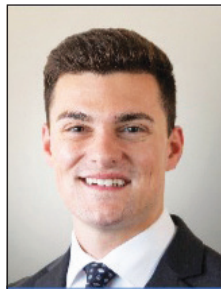

'Schola' To Perform at Holy Trinity

Free concert on Saturday, March 4, at 7 p.m.

The first time Andrew Beine played piano at Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Kewaskum was in spring 2012 when he was in fourth grade and played for his grandfather's funeral. That fall, when he was in fifth grade, Beine started playing regularly for Masses at the church.

Now 20, Beine is a junior at the Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary in Winona, Minn. Beine, who is studying to become a priest, is still involved with music ministry.

In 2020, he and four other seminarians formed a group called Schola, short for the Latin phrase "schola cantorum," meaning "school of singers."

The group mainly sings Gregorian chant, a type of music that enhances Beine's prayer life.

"Gregorian chant has a different formula from other music I grew up hearing, where everything is metered. I have definitely learned to love it," Beine said.

Schola, which typically rehearses twice a week, has grown to seven members. Having a larger group provides a unique opportunity for the seminarians, both musically and spiritually.

"It allows us more flexibility on voice parts and helps us to develop unique tonal colors and blended harmonies for each piece we perform," Beine said. "As seminarians, this is a clear benefit to our formation as priests, as we will God-willing one day be responsible for the organization and proper practice of liturgy in diocesan parishes. Aside from these future benefits, we provide music for various needs in-house as well as for various diocesan events in and around the City of Winona."

Six of the members are performing with Schola at various parishes in the Milwaukee Archdiocese this week, including at Holy Trinity in Kewaskum. Each concert will last about one hour and 15 minutes. In addition to performing Gregorian chant, Schola will perform an Eastern-style liturgical piece, which is characterized by greater harmonic expression and is typically more repetitive than Gregorian chant.

The concert at Holy Trinity, 331 Main St. in Kewaskum, will be held Saturday, March 4, at 7 p.m. The concert is free of charge; a freewill offering will be taken.

"We enjoy all of this music because it is a form of prayer and lifts our hearts as well as those who hear it to God. So goes the saying attributed to Saint Augustine, "Those who sing pray twice!" Beine said. "I really encourage everyone to come out and experience it, especially if you haven't heard Gregorian chant before."

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Meeting Set Regarding Washington County Hazard Mitigation Plan

Citizens are invited to a public information meeting related to the mitigation of impacts from natural hazards in Washington County. The meeting will be held from 6-8:30 p.m. on Thursday, March 2, at the Washington County Public Agency Center, Room #1113 A&B, 333 E, Washington Street, in West Bend.

This session will provide an opportunity to learn more about, and to comment on, the findings and recommendations documented in the preliminary draft of the first three chapters of Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPC) Community Assistance Planning Report No. 326 of the Washington County Hazard Mitigation Plan Update. The plan includes recommendations related to the mitigation of impacts from hazards such as flooding and related stormwater drainage problems; weather-related hazards such as tornadoes, winter storms, extreme temperatures, drought, and severe thunderstorms in Washington County. This plan constitutes an update of the initial hazard mitigation plan which was adopted by the County in 2018 and is being completed in order for the County to maintain eligibility for hazard mitigation funding through the Federal Emergency Management Agency. This meeting will discuss the purpose of the plan and review the work completed to date.

Copies of the first three report chapters, including the risk and vulnerability analysis chapter, are now available for review on the SEWRPC web

site at sewrpc.org/HMP.

The plan is being prepared by SEWRPC, in cooperation with the county's department of emergency management. Preparation of the plan was guided by a Hazard Mitigation Local Planning Team consisting of local officials, including representatives of city and village departments, such as the fire, police, city development, and public works departments; county departments and agencies, including the county emergency management office and the health care community.

The sessions will begin with a meeting in an open house format for the first hour and, which will provide an opportunity to meet one-on-one with the commission and county staff to receive information, ask questions, and provide written comment. A presentation will be made by the commission staff starting at 7 p.m.

fore being elected governor in 2018 to provide a 10-percent, middle-class tax cut. In the 2021-23 biennial budget, the governor signed one of the largest tax cuts in Wisconsin state history, providing \$2 billion in individual income tax relief over the biennium and approximately \$1 billion annually going forward. When combined with the tax cuts Gov. Evers signed in the 2019-21 biennial budget, as well as 2019 Wisconsin Act 10, 86 percent of Wisconsin taxpayers have seen an income tax cut of 15 percent or more, with 2.4 million taxpayers getting relief.

Additionally, Gov. Evers last year directed the Wisconsin Department of Revenue to revise its withholding tax tables, changing how much income employers withhold from an employee's paycheck in taxes. Based on these directed chang-

sumes over 90% of all projected revenue growth for the entire state. How are we to fund raises for 70,000+ state employees, healthcare for the poor and disabled, public safety, inflationary costs in government services, the UW System, tax cuts and other priorities? This is not a serious proposal.

Furthermore, it is disappointing Evers attempts to slip far-left agenda items into his budget proposal. He looks to strangle our state's school choice program by capping the total number of kids who may participate in the program in addition to imposing other roadblocks. Instead of expanding school choice and giving parents more say in their child's education, this move by Evers would severely hamper school choice, affecting thousands of families across the state currently benefiting from educational options that actually save taxpayers money.

Evers also proposes taking Wisconsin in the wrong direction by repealing Right to Work, Act

es and Gov. Evers' prior tax cuts, over the course of the last year, a single filer making \$50,000 will have seen \$551 more in their paychecks while a married couple each earning \$50,000 combined will have seen over \$1,200 more for their household in their paychecks.

Gov. Evers' tax plan announced today draws stark contrast to a Republican-backed flat tax proposal to give enormous breaks to wealthy millionaires and billionaires rather than prioritizing relief for working families. Based on available details, Republicans' plan would provide more than \$3.5 billion in tax breaks to the wealthiest 20 percent of Wisconsin tax filers, which is nearly four times what the remaining 80 percent of filers would see combined. All told, nearly 80 percent of the flat tax plan will benefit the top 20 percent of earners who file taxes in Wisconsin.

10 and numerous labor reforms that were implemented over the past decade. Given our state's workforce shortages and rising labor costs, this will only create more barriers and increase costs for both the public and private sectors - thus making our state economy less competitive. The Evers budget includes giving driver's licenses to illegal immigrants, eliminating work requirements for able bodied adults on welfare, prioritizing factors such as race and sexuality in government programs and services, significantly expanding government healthcare and erodes our second amendment rights. And on top of all that, adds 816 new government employees.

As we look ahead, in the upcoming months the state's budget writing committee will once again craft a responsible state budget. The Legislature will listen to the public and take their comments into consideration. At the end of the day, the Legislature will fund our priorities, address our obligations, cut taxes, protect taxpayers' pocketbooks, and prepare Wisconsin for the future.

today. It's a very important day for us and for our family to keep our tradition going almost 150 years in business," he said.

Prior to the Laatsch family, the grocery store was owned by Aaron's cousin, Mike Geidel. Both Geidel and Laatsch can directly trace their lineage to Nicolas Marx who opened a grocery store and saloon in Kewaskum in 1876. The Marx-named stores were a staple of the community until 1976 when Harold and Eleanor Marx sold the business to their daughter Judy and her husband Bill

Geidel (Mike's father). The Geidel's operated the Sentry before relocating to the current location and refranchising as Piggly Wiggly in 2000.

"I want to thank Mike Geidel for helping make this such a smooth transition," added Laatsch. "And for all the leadership he's shown us over the years to prepare us for this moment."

Altogether, Aaron and Amy's ownership keeps alive a five-generation family tradition (from Marx to Geidel to Laatsch).

Joining Aaron and Amy on Sunday were their daughters, Alexis and Olivia, who represent a sixth generation of the family to work at the store.

In closing, Laatsch recognized past and present employees for all their hard work.

Today, March 2, is recognized as Read Across America Day. This day was established 25 years ago by the National Education Association to encourage children to do my favorite thing, read of course. It takes place on the birthday of Theodore Geisel who is more commonly known as Dr. Seuss. Due to controversy surrounding Seuss' books, the focus of NEA's Read Across America Day has

shifted from solely celebrating this author to promoting books that endorse diversity.

During March, Kewaskum Public Library will be observing Read Across America month by showcasing diverse authors and characters in our collection. In sharing our new books for the month, look for those that either are written by an author, contain characters or have a centric theme that is diverse.

In adult fiction, *Black Candle Women* is a well-reviewed book written by Diane Marie Brown. Measuring and Mapping the Land – The Formation of Farmington

The first land sales to early pioneers in Farmington were made in 1836. Settlement was beginning and by 1847, the Township of Farmington was created. Join the Farmington Historical Society as they look at how the Wisconsin Territory was surveyed and the plat maps created before the early settlers arrived.

Beginning in 1833, the U.S. General Land Office surveyed the land that is now Farmington. The life of a surveyor was difficult; the survey parties had to follow the compass relentlessly over hills, through swamps, rivers and forests. As surveyors traveled, they took field notes, which became the official record of the surveys. Surveyors recorded

vegetation, land features and evidence of human habitation. Mapmakers at the U.S. General Land Office used these notes to develop the grid system that is still the basis for property maps at this time.

Interested individuals can learn about these surveying methods and the 1830s surveying instruments on Saturday, March 11, at 1 p.m., at the Boltonville Fire House, located at 9336 Bolton Dr. in Kewaskum. Presented by Farmington Historical Society, this event is free and open to the public. More information can be found at farmingtonhistorical.org or on Facebook at facebook.com/FarmingtonHistorical.

NOTICE OF RABIES VACCINATION AND DOG LICENSE REQUIREMENTS LATE FEES TO BE ASSESSED AFTER APRIL 1, 2023

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Fond du Lac County that rabies vaccinations and dog licenses are required under the statutes.

Vaccination by a veterinarian against rabies of all dogs is required (Section 95.21 (2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 4 months of age, and re-vaccinated before the certificate expires or within three years of the previous vaccination. Notice is hereby further given that evidence that the dog is currently immunized against rabies must be presented before a license can be issued. To qualify for the minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females, presentation of evidence attesting to same must be presented when applying for the license.

PENALTIES

A minimum late fee of \$5.00 shall be assessed the owner of each dog 5 months of age or over who fails to obtain a dog license by April 1st of each year, or within 30 days of acquiring ownership on or before the dog reached licensable age. The minimum late fee may be raised by municipal action.

Any owner who fails to have a dog vaccinated against rabies as required by statute may be required to forfeit not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100.00.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may submit a request to vote an absentee ballot to their municipal clerk. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen who:

- will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day.
- has resided in the ward or municipality where they wish to vote for at least 28 consecutive days before the election.

The elector must also be registered to vote to receive an absentee ballot.

Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may make written application to your municipal clerk for an absentee ballot in person, by mail, by email or at MyVote.wi.gov.

Your written request must include:

1. your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote.
2. the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different from the address above.
3. your signature.
4. A copy of your photo identification.

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is:

5 p.m. on the fifth day before the election,
Thursday, March 30, 2023.

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

Voting an absentee ballot in person

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified for casting an absentee ballot in person from the Clerk.

In-Person absentee voting is not allowed prior to March 21.

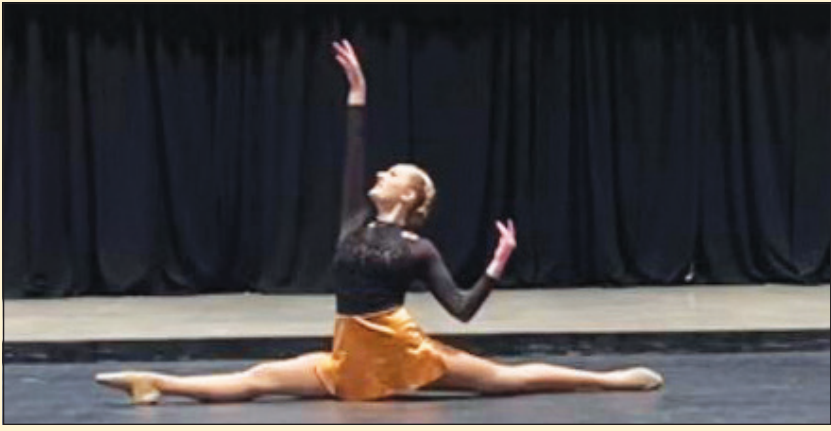

The Lady Indians knocked off Denmark and Sheboygan Falls to earn a trip to the sectional tournament

Following a first-round bye, Kewaskum (#2) opened up regional action by hosting the Denmark Vikings (#10) last Friday evening.

Denmark defeated Chilton on Tuesday, Feb. 21, in what most would call a mild upset.

During the round-two contest played at the Kewaskum High School (KHS) Fieldhouse, Madi Dogs scored 12 of her 16 points in the first half to help the Indians to a 31-18 halftime advantage.

Kewaskum's defense continued to be solid in the second half, holding Denmark to only 15 points.

Seniors Morgan Adams and Haley Butschlick helped the offense with 12 and nine points, respectively.

Dogs also finished with 10 rebounds, eight steals and six assists.

Final score: 50-33.

Very interesting...

An odd stat for this game: the Indians went the entire contest without attempting a free throw.

Regional Final

Most fans were preparing to face the Brillion Lions (#3) in the regional final, however, six-seed Sheboygan Falls would not allow the Lions to beat the Falcons for a third time this year, and it was Sheboygan Falls with revenge in the round-two contest, 47-42.

As for the Indians and Falcons, Kewaskum beat Sheboygan Falls by 13 on January 31 (the two teams' only meeting this season).

Coming into last week's regional final, though, the KHS coaching staff emphasized to the players that tournament games have a special feel and are much different than the regular season. The added pressure of "win or go home" makes tensions rise. The Falcons were underdogs, playing with nothing to lose, which made them a dangerous foe.

During the game, the Indians full-court pressure

helped Kewaskum jump out to a 9-0 lead early on.

The officials were allowing more contact in this contest than a typical game, which amplified the intense environment for the playoff final.

The Indians' frontcourt of Dogs and Adams scored 17 of Kewaskum's 23 first-half points.

To their credit, the Falcons converted on some second chance opportunities and trailed by just eight at the half.

Julia Steger opened up the scoring in the second half with a corner triple; three of her 12 total points.

Scoles is 4x State Champ, Soyk Finishes Sixth

Despite competing on the biggest mat in the state this weekend, nothing was different about Braeden Scoles' performance. Scoles finished his senior season atop the podium for the fourth time in his high school career, making him the first four-time state champion in Kewaskum's history, in the process.

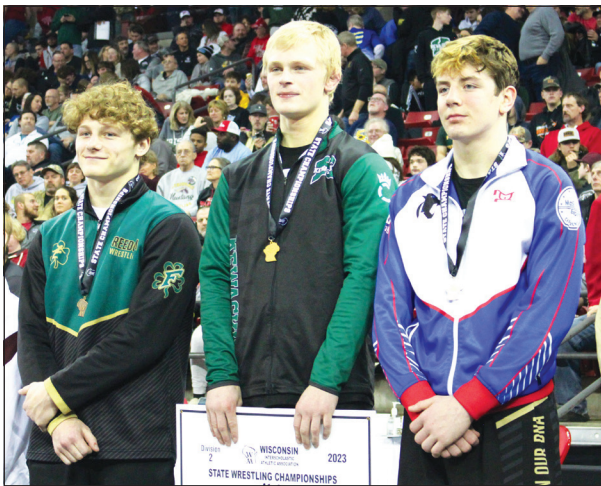
Nothing was different because Scoles won by technical fall in all three matches, a common result for the Kewaskum wrestler since his freshman season in 2019-20. In his first match early on Friday, he defeated Jeremiah Avery from Prairie du Chien, 18-3, in 4:35. Later that evening, it was in just more than four minutes he defeated Logan Kawa from the Medford area, 21-2.

In the championship match, Scoles racked up the points against Owen Wasley from Saint Croix Central and defeated him in 5:21, 19-4.

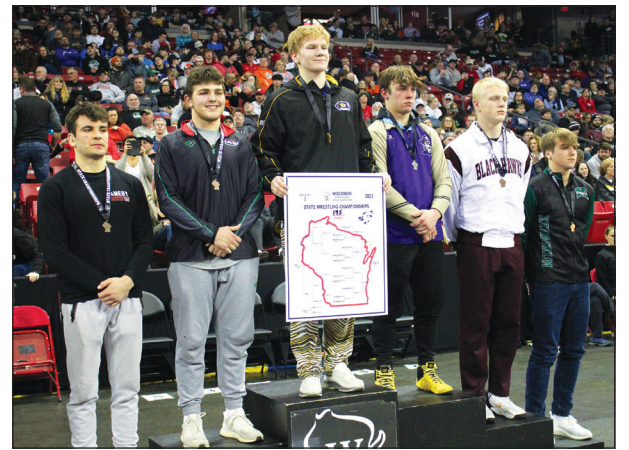
The incredible run of championships by Scoles cements his place in Wisconsin high school wrestling history: he is just the 23rd wrestler ever to complete a four-year varsity sweep.

Kewaskum placed two more of the four wrestlers that traveled to Madison.

Junior Dylan Soyk took the final spot on the podium in the 195 class. He wrestled Wyatt Egan from Parkview/Albany on Thursday night and won by a 15-5 major decision. Still on track to wrestle in the first place match, Soyk faced Grant Cook from Amery on Friday morning, but lost by a close 3-1 decision moving him over to the consolation bracket. In round one of the consolation matches, Soyk squeaked by with a 3-2 decision win over Ben Kienbaum from Kiel. In his last two matches, Soyk lost, first, by fall to Caden Weber



Scoles stands in a familiar spot. CLARICE CASE PHOTOS



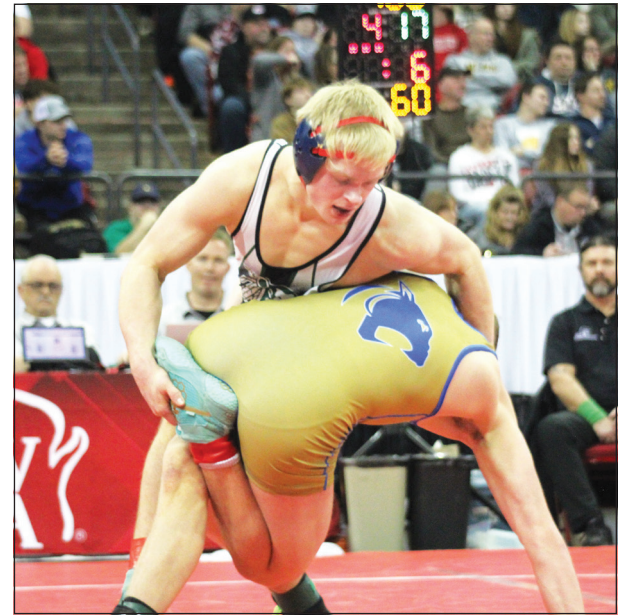
Soyk takes the sixth spot, far right, on the podium in the 195 weight-class.

from Regis/Altoona and then by 10-3 decision to Grant Cook, earning a sixth place medal.

Freshman Ethan Immel placed fourth in the 120 weight-class. He started his weekend on Thursday night with a 9-3 decision win over Isaac Jerabek from Luxemburg-Casco. Immel also lost his second match by decision. He proceeded to win his next two matches against Dylan Weigel from Belmont/Platteville by a 13-3 major decision and Bob Huntley from Brillion by a 6-5 decision to get himself to the third place match. It was a hard-fought match, but Immel lost by just one point to Lane Anderson from Amery to end up in fourth place.

Freshman James Racer did not place in the 113 class. He won his first match by fall in 1:45 over Garrett Minder from Monroe, but lost his next two matches by decisions.

Throughout the second, with Dogs in foul trouble, Falls made a run and stayed within striking distance.

Every time the Falcons got close, though, it seemed Morgan Adams stepped up and got huge buckets to help stop their runs.

Grace Leitheiser came up with a few key steals, and Jadin Czuppa a few big defensive rebounds down the stretch to help seal a 41-34 victory.

Adams led the way with 16 points while Dogs added 11.

At final horn, it was the Kewaskum Indians, again, hoisting the WIAA Regional Championship trophy.

This is the Indians fourth consecutive regional title and third straight won on their home court. In 2019-2020, they won a regional title at Kewaunee, before getting knocked out by Sheboygan Falls in the sectional semifinals. Last week's triumph was also the 20th win for Kewaskum on the campaign.

Looking at the rest of the bracket, all four teams remaining in the sectional are the top seeds.

On Thursday, March 2, Kewaskum will face a 24-2 Oostburg (#1) squad that recently knocked off Kettle Moraine Lutheran (#4), 71-55, for a regional title. Oostburg features freshman twin sisters who

average 31 points combined. The pair shoot better than 40% from three-point distance.

It will be a contrast of styles with Oostburg's high-potent offense against Kewaskum's gritty defense.

The Indians will need to rely on their experience and their frontcourt to make it to Saturday's sectional final.

Germantown High School was named as the neutral site for the round-one sectional between Kewaskum and Oostburg. Tip-off is expected at 7 p.m.

The winner of Thursday's sectional semifinal will play the winner of Freedom (#1) and Wrightstown (#2) on Saturday in Denmark.

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Blanchard Wins State Championship, Volz Third

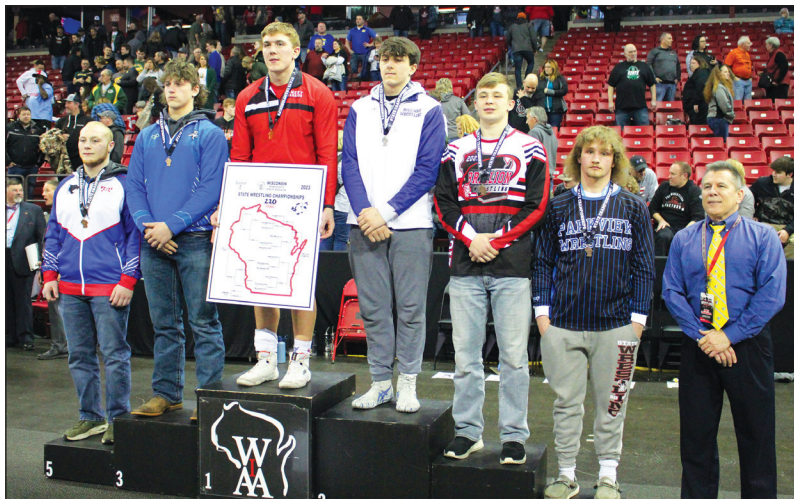

Campbellsport senior Ostin Blanchard became the Cougars' 19th individual state wrestling champion and junior Joseph Volz took third place.

After finishing in third place in 2022, 126-pounder Ostin Blanchard, who was ranked second in the state coming into the tournament, was on a quest to stand alone at the top of the podium in 2023. His quarterfinal match pitted him against Garrett Marks (45-12) of Winneconne. Blanchard used four takedowns, a two point near fall and an escape to earn an 11-2 decision. This was the third time this year Ostin majored Marks.

In his semifinal match, Blanchard wrestled Chris Karbash (40-7) of Delevan-Darian. Once again, Blanchard used his strength of taking people down to his advantage as he racked up four more takedowns and an escape to win 9-3 sending him to the state championship match.

In the title match, Blanchard was pitted against the number one ranked wrestler in the state, Luke Dux, who was 35-0 going into the championship match. In the first period, Dux would strike first by getting a takedown shortly before the period ended to take a 2-0 lead. Blanchard chose the down po-
