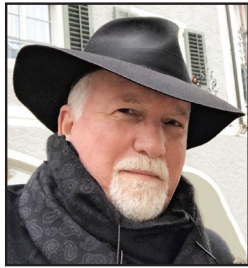

Dear Reader,
 Recently I read Robert Frost’s poem “Nothing Gold Can Stay.” This eight-line composition reflects on the beauty and impermanence of life. Frost describes how all things dwindle with time, and how beauty fades to nothingness. The sunset you saw last night lives only in your mind; the christening of your child is only a memory; the wealth you accumulated over the years becomes value-less, since shrouds have no pockets.



The poet is saying that the green of spring’s birth eventually evolves to the gold of full being in summer. But autumn winds blow through our lives, and the fleeting beauty of gold vanishes, much as the idyll of Eden gave way to the toil and pain of our current existence. Each cycle of life brings its own aesthetics, both new and familiar to the fore, as all things are limited and temporary.

Being transitions into non-being over time as the body crumbles to dust. 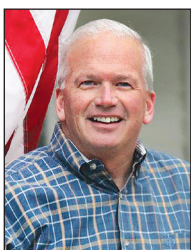
Kudos to everyone involved.

Reining in Inflation in Bipartisan Fashion

For 22 months in a row, inflation has outpaced real average hourly earnings, and remains the top concern of Americans across the country. House Republicans understand the pain inflation has caused, and last week made strides to prevent it from worsening by passing the REIN In Act with strong bipartisan support.

This legislation requires the White House to publish the inflationary impact of pending executive actions prior to enactment from now on. As I’ve said, the severity of inflation in the United States could have been mitigated if not for the current administration’s shortsighted policies.

When President Biden took office, inflation

sat at 1.4%, according to the Consumer Price Index. Two years later, after unprecedented levels of federal spending, inflation spiked to 9.1% last summer, and still remains extraordinarily high at 6.4% for this past January. Despite this, President Biden has rejected any notion that he bears one iota of responsibility for it. In fact, when pressed, Biden has claimed inflation was already an issue when he took office.

At this point, if the president is unwilling to admit the impact of his administration’s reckless policies, then we must require the White House to make public an inflationary impact analysis for every future executive action to alert officials and the American people. If passed by the Senate and signed into law by President Biden, the REIN In Act would represent a historic move towards

Campbellsport Village Moves Forward with GFL for Trash and Recycling Services

The Village of Campbellsport held a regular board meeting on Monday, March 13, with all members in attendance.

The board discussed the recommendation made by the Department of Public Works (DPW) to switch the village garbage collection company from Waste Management to GFL Environmental.

A representative from GFL was in attendance and answered questions from the board about their service.

It was stated that GFL can offer the village more perks than the current company. A few items that members can look forward to include: a cap of 9% on CPI increase, bulk waste pick up and a collection site in West Bend that residents can take bigger items to. Additionally, citizens have the option to contract with GFL inde-

pendently, at village rates, if they would like an extra cart.

President Dave Krebs asked, "If we have questions or need help, can we count on assistance from a live representative on the phone?"

The board was assured that GFL would have representatives to speak with in real-time if needed.

The representative stated that it is likely garbage collection day will change to Mondays and they would begin as early as May 1.

The board made a motion to accept the Public Works recommendation and contract with GFL for trash and recycling.

Currently, it is undetermined when the switch from Waste Management to GFL will officially take place.

Village Matters

The board approved the Public Works Committee's recommendation to allow the DPW to purchase

a pickup truck for up to \$50,000 that meets their specifications without further approval.

The DPW is currently struggling to find a new truck that meets their needs and requested the board's approval to make an immediate purchase if a suitable vehicle is found. It was stated that the truck will be primarily used for moving people and tools around the village.

The board also made a motion to change an address of a building complex from Reliable of Milwaukee to 480 Campbellsport Dr.

This specific building was never given an updated address and the information that was being used lead to the back entrance. This served as a safety concern for the county and emergency systems.

The updated address of 480 Campbellsport Dr. will be used for the entire complex and lead to the front entrance of the building.

Many government analyses are conducted to inform Congress and the public on the budgetary and economic impact of legislation we consider. If a bill carries an enormous cost or is burdensome on the economy, constituents across the country will hear about it and have the opportunity to share their concerns with their representative. It's time we hold the Executive Branch to the same standard of transparency.



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Three Washington County Offices to Change Office Hours to 'Four-10s' Schedule

The Washington County Board of Supervisors approved a request from the county clerk, treasurer, and register of deeds to implement a pilot program to change their office hours to a "four-10s" schedule – working four days a week, 10 hours a day, to better serve the public.

This proposed pilot program will be an expansion of the limited pilot program undertaken by County Clerk Ashley Reichert last summer when her office used the "four-10s" schedule. The results of that initial pilot program were positive, with 43% of all appointments scheduled outside of the normal appointment times – before 8:15 a.m. and after 3:45 p.m. The success of this program led to consideration of an expanded pilot program.

The county clerk, register of deeds, and county treasurer's offices will adjust their operation hours to a four-day work week, Monday through Thursday, from 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and will be closed on Fridays. The three county offices will begin the new hours on Monday, April 3.

Among the services provided to the public by the three offices include:

The pilot program will analyze improvement to customer service, recruitment advantages, and cost-savings. Other county functions that may be affected, such as personal time off, support functions and payroll will also be studied. No other county departments will be adjusting work hours at this time.

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W.C.H.S. Assists Sheriff in Helping Neglected Town of Wayne Dogs

An unlicensed dog-breeding business was shutdown with charges brought against a Wayne man

In the evening hours of Tuesday, January 31, the Washington County Humane Society (WCHS) was contacted by the Washington County Sheriff's Office and asked to assist in evaluating a property in the Town of Wayne regarding an anonymous complaint of unsatisfactory outdoor animal housing, especially dangerous in sub-zero temperatures.

What law enforcement and shelter staff found were 34 dogs (mostly Jack Russell Terrier mixes) living in squalid housing and feeding on leftover pizza and moldy animal carcasses in what looked to be an unlicensed dog breeding business. Most were tied and barely had enough room to move about their kennels. Many had hair loss on their necks due to poor leashing methods.

The Sheriff's Office asked WCHS to impound all 34 dogs and transport them to the shelter for housing and medical evaluation.

Charges have been brought against the sixty-seven-year-old owner of the property, Russell Quaas, and will be heard in Washington County Circuit Court on April 3.

WCHS continues to work closely with the Washington County Sheriff's Department to document evidence of mistreatment. Additionally, law enforcement consulted with a veterinarian from the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, who concurred that the dogs were not provided adequate shelter, food or water under Wisconsin laws.

While at WCHS, care staff have been working tirelessly to ensure each dog is on the road to recovery, which entails addressing al-

ready present medical concerns, getting each dog up to date on vaccines and dewormers and returning them to normal activities. All dogs now have a warm bed and a caring advocate.

WCHS prides itself on the care and attention it provides to animals in need, though the shelter has taken on a great financial burden due to the amount of care needed.

"We need the whole community to help with this," says Jessie Wermager, WCHS Operations Manager.

The intended outcome is for each dog to be put up for adoption when their health and legal status is no longer a concern.

Members of the Kewaskum Public Library Board, along with village officials, took a field trip during the committee's regular monthly meeting on Monday, March 13, to the Regal Ware Inc. administrative building at 1675 Reigle Dr., and, following the tour, the group voted to support future civic development of the site following the roughly half-hour walkaround.

Joining library employees and members of the board for the on-location meeting were Regal Ware President and CEO Ryan Riegle, Maintenance/Facilities Supervisor Brian Keller and Administrative Services Coordinator Kathy Rohlinger. Joining from the village administration was Adam Gitter and Tocarra Theisen. Riegle,

Keller and Rohlinger walked the assemblage through the facility to give library board members a clearer picture of how the space could suit its needs.

As it was announced last week, the Village of Kewaskum intends to purchase the four-story facility and adjacent property for a future civic campus, which would include village administration offices, the public library, the Kewaskum Police Department and other community spaces.

Prior to the tour, Riegle addressed the group and thanked them for their time and consideration.

"We reached out to and partnered with the village on making something really special here come to fruition," he said, noting that the original structure was built circa 1968 with

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D.H.S. Investigating FoodShare Benefits Scam

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) is investigating a scam that targets FoodShare members through fake text messages. DHS is alerting members to take steps now to protect their benefits.

“It is alarming that scammers are going after public benefits like FoodShare that people rely on to feed themselves and their families,” said Anthony Baize, DHS inspector general. “We encourage FoodShare members to understand how to protect their benefits from these increasingly sophisticated scams and to report them when they happen.”

The DHS investigation is based on complaints from concerned FoodShare members about a scam instructing them to call a phone number to confirm their account and personal identification numbers (PINs) to avoid having benefits locked. Scammers then use this information to access and steal the benefits.

To limit the potential for benefit loss, DHS is removing access to all unauthorized phone numbers linked to cases within the investigation. DHS also is discontinuing and replacing all compromised QUEST cards and is conducting a review for each impacted member to determine if benefits should be replaced.

Tips for Protecting your FoodShare Benefits

DHS advises members to take the following steps to protect their FoodShare benefits and QUEST cards:

- Monitor account balances on the MyACCESS mobile app or ebtEDGE website or mobile app.
- Add or change optional account passwords to limit unauthorized access.
- Do not share account passwords and PINs with anyone who is not part of your household.
- Create unique account passwords and PINs.
- Avoid using email addresses and the names of family members and pets for passwords.
- Avoid using your birth date and year, as well as repeating num-

bers, such as 1111, numbers in a row, like 2345, and numbers that follow a pattern, like 1212, for PINs.

- Temporarily freeze QUEST cards between uses by using the ebtEDGE website or mobile app. When members need to purchase food, they will need to unfreeze their cards using the ebtEDGE website or mobile app. This helps prevent unauthorized benefit use.

- Block out-of-state and online purchases. Members can turn off this feature before traveling out of state or shopping for groceries online.

- Confirm that an email or text about your FoodShare benefits is from DHS, not a scammer. DHS sends official FoodShare texts from 94347 (WI DHS) and emails from dhs@info.wisconsin.gov. DHS FoodShare texts and emails never ask members for personal information, such as a birthday or Social Security number, or financial information, like a bank account or credit card number. DHS does not offer prizes or money to members for responding to these texts and emails.

- Check your FoodShare card balance by calling QUEST Card Service at 877-415-5164 or using the MyACCESS mobile app, ebtEDGE website, or ebtEDGE mobile app. Using only these tools to check your card balance helps prevent unauthorized card access.
- Call your local agency to ask about suspicious FoodShare account activity, check account information, establish an account password, and ask general benefit questions.
- Call QUEST Card Service 24/7 to change PINs, immediately report lost or stolen cards, and to report suspicious FoodShare account activity outside of your local agency's business hours.
- Report any emails or texts about your FoodShare benefits that are not sent to you by DHS to the agency that issues your benefits and Wisconsin's Consumer Protection Hotline at 800-422-7128 or DATCPHotline@wi.gov. This hotline is run by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. Be sure to avoid clicking any links in the email or text message or calling the phone number that sent you the text message or any phone number in the message.

Originally from California, Sandra Mendoza moved to Kewaskum at the urging of her uncle, who was looking to retire from restaurant work. She had no restaurant experience and really wasn't interested in working in the food industry but somehow was convinced to move to Wisconsin and start El Pig's Butt in the same location as her uncle's restaurant. She believes divine intervention played a role.

"For almost a year I told him 'no'... it took almost a year to convince me. I also feel like there was something in my gut that was telling me 'go.' Like 'I have good things for you, go.' So I am a strong believer that God ended up bringing me here. To this day, despite the pandemic, inflation, the lack of workers, we've been able to keep going. One person leaves, another person walks in the door."

Mendoza says she has no trouble keeping staff unlike many other restaurants in the area. She has a small team of many younger workers, mostly teens, and considers herself blessed that they are dedicated to the job.

The menu includes Mexican food as well as barbecue, which was added after many customers asked for it. Mendoza describes the food as "top notch." Breakfast is also served, with omelettes, french toast, and breakfast burritos and tacos rounding out the selections.

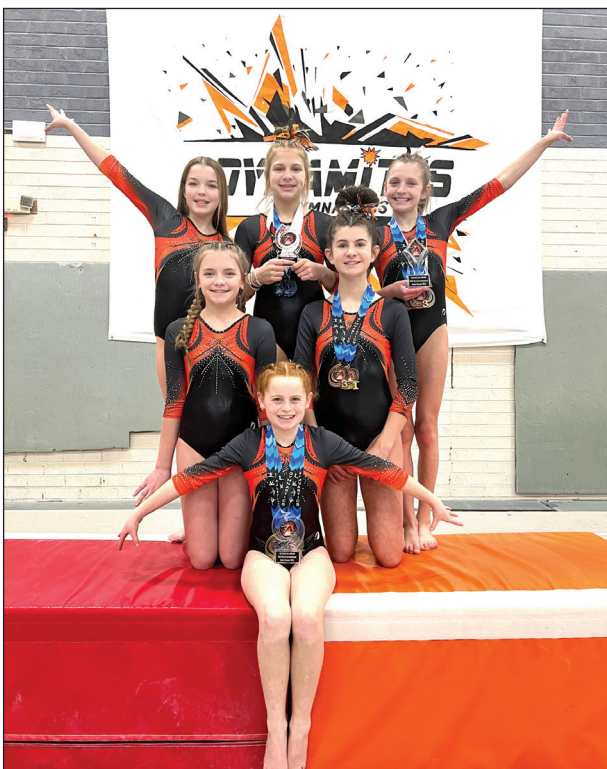

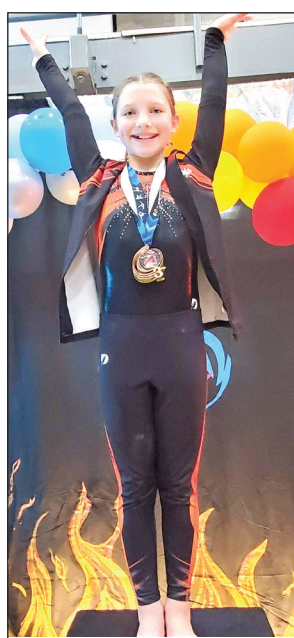

an additional section constructed a few years later in 1971-72. "That was the original administration building."

The property has also undergone significant improvements since, as well, and is considered close to "move-in ready" for the village's needs. One section of the building on the north side, Reigle noted, will likely require an HVAC update.

"It's like a nine-zone heating system, which you would never do again, you would do a two-zone... because the open-design concept of this building is designed [for that]," noted Keller, recognizing that Regal's needs to the building were far more segmented than what the village will need. "You can simplify this quite a bit."

As the trio of Regal representatives led the board members through the facility, Riegle and Keller pointed out the structure's flexibility at several points.

"It's basically just a giant rectangle," said Reigle, who noted that most interior walls are temporary, and could be re-arranged to accommodate the village's needs.

The library is likely to occupy the building's "first level", which some consider the basement, and the second level, which includes the main entrance; the building is ADA accessible.

Moving from floor-to-floor and room-to-room, board members considered what spaces would be best for what, with Kewaskum Public Library Director Lori Kreis identifying the "basement" floor as a potential community space.

"It just goes on and on!" said one member to an-

other, as the board engaged with the full scope of the square footage. "It has all the elements of a very good library."

Reigle also noted the size of the facility's parking lot, which he suggested could stay as is, could be used to expand any of the future village buildings or to add additional green space.

Following the excursion, the board took a brief recess and reconvened at the current municipal building to resume the meeting.

The assemblage went into closed session and voted to support the village's efforts in obtaining the Regal property for a future civic campus.

Section I. Territory Annexed. In accordance with Wis. Stats. §66.0217(2) and the Petition for Direct Annexation by Unanimous Approval filed with the Village Clerk on or about the 2nd day of February, 2023 which petition is acknowledged by the Village was signed by all the owners of the real property within the territory proposed to be attached, now, therefore, the following described territory is hereby attached to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin and is detached from the Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, to wit:

THE NORTHWEST 1/4 AND THE SOUTHWEST 1/4 OF THE NORTHEAST 1/4 OF SECTION 8, TOWNSHIP 12 NORTH, RANGE 19 EAST, IN THE TOWN OF KEWASKUM, COUNTY OF WASHINGTON, STATE OF WISCONSIN, DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS:

COMMENCING AT THE NORTHWEST CORNER OF SAID NORTHEAST 1/4, SAID CORNER ALSO BEING THE POINT OF BEGINNING OF THIS DESCRIPTION;
 THENCE NORTH 89°49'18" EAST, 1327.71 FEET, ALONG THE NORTH LINE OF SAID NORTHEAST 1/4;
 THENCE SOUTH 00°52'07" EAST, 2659.31 FEET, ALONG THE EAST LINE OF SAID NORTHWEST 1/4 AND SAID SOUTHWEST 1/4 OF SAID NORTHEAST 1/4;
 THENCE SOUTH 89°28'59" WEST, 1331.58 FEET, ALONG THE SOUTH LINE OF SAID NORTHEAST 1/4;
 THENCE NORTH 00°47'02" WEST, 2667.13 FEET, ALONG THE WEST LINE OF SAID NORTHEAST 1/4 TO THE POINT OF BEGINNING.

The Clerk's certificate shall include reference to the population of the territory being attached as set forth in the Petition, which population is zero (0) persons.

Section IV. Municipal Boundary Review. The Petition for Direct Annexation was found to be in the public interest by the Wisconsin Department of Administration, Division of Intergovernmental Relations/Municipal Boundary Review, under MBR #14567.

Section V. Severability. If any provision of this Ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this Ordinance to any person or circumstance is invalid or unconstitutional, such unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions or obligations of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application.

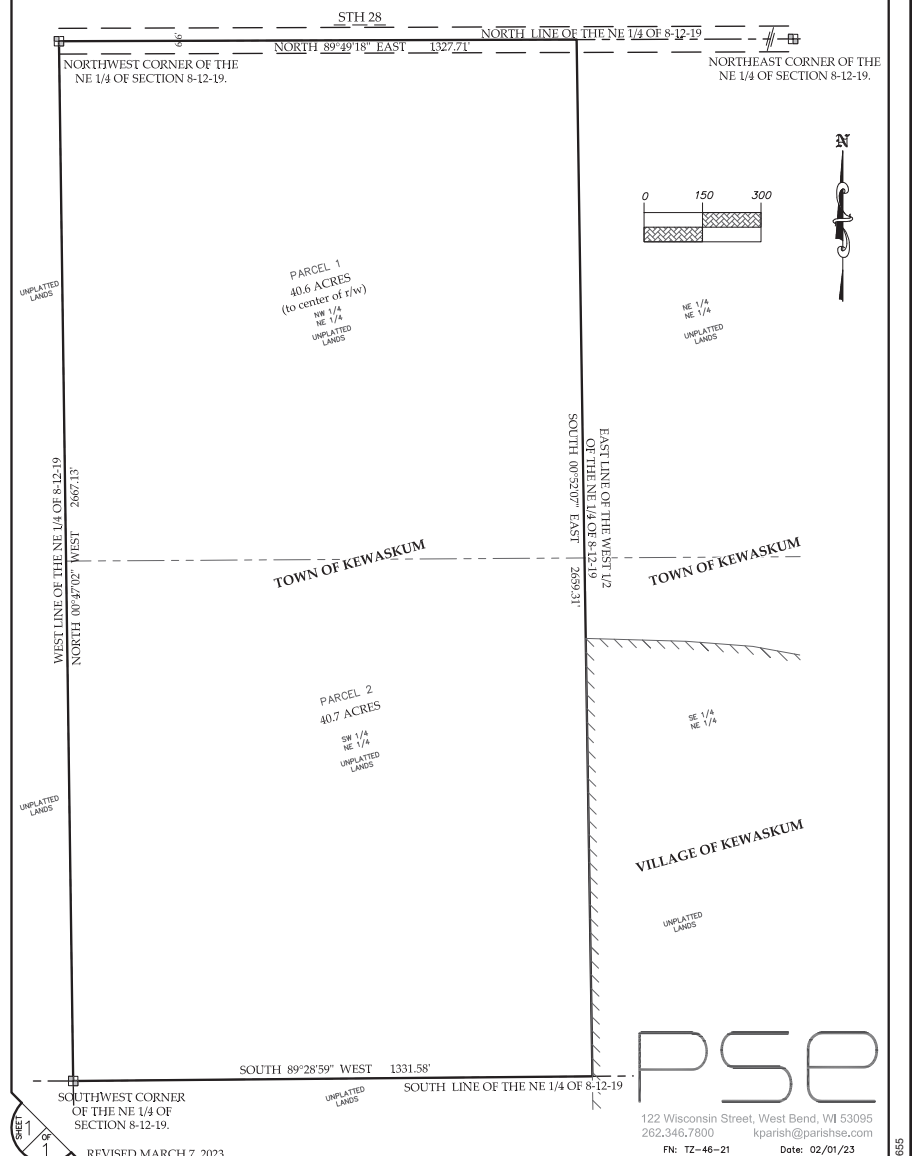

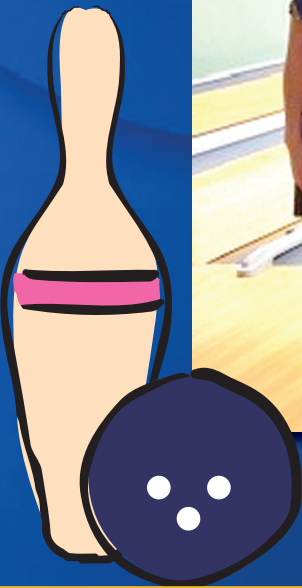

Monster Walleye on Little Bay de Noc

This past week, I put another serious test on the Chevy Hotel with the load I was pulling and some go-for-it driving on Upper Michigan's Little Bay de Noc (LBDN).

LBDN is known throughout the

Midwest as a place to potentially catch a 30-plus-inch walleye and attracts hardcore ice anglers from throughout the Midwest.

FRIDAY, MARCH 3
HIGH 33, LOW 26

My old high school buddy, Doug Cibulka, is doing three trips on the ice with me this winter and they all have challenges.

Our other companions were Ruby and her pup, Red, and the challenge began from minute-one as we entered the ice on what is the north arm of Green Bay. We were going on local advice, a Fishing Hot Spots map and, literally, my foot on the gas pedal.

The local advice was that, due to deep snow drifts, we could not pull my trailer with a snow machine in it. Our other option was to unload everything at the public landing at Kipling and pull four Otter Sleds for multiple trips to wherever we were going to set up for this four-day excursion.

I sensed the 2006 with 363,000 miles

was hungry for a challenge and, by God, as long we kept moving she performed like the champ that she is.

We really did speak with a lot of locals about a strategy, and we settled on the south end of what is called Second Reef where we each put out tip-ups and Finicky Foolers over 22-to-25 feet of water. We baited with large shiners and then we began the massive job of building camp.

There was no wind, and we had three nights on the ice to live large, and the mood was excellent.

At dark, a steady east wind began that was blowing off from the open water of Lake Michigan. There was so much moisture in the air that everything got an extremely heavy frost on it and, even though we stayed up very late, we could not catch a fish.

SATURDAY, MARCH 4
HIGH 36, LOW 29

This morning was our second primetime on the ice, and we had zero

action and neither did any of our neighbors.

A difficult decision was made to break camp and drive north about four-miles to shallower water where we would build camp and catch at least a dozen walleye over 30-inches.

Once again, the Chevy Hotel was seriously tested, and we ended up where the Whitefish, Rapid and Tacoosh Rivers enter the bay.

Eventually the walleye will swim up these rivers to spawn.

So, we build camp, the mood is excellent and, about three hours after we arrived, I am fighting a fish on a jig pole that I have baited with a fathead. Holy moly, were we have ever happy when I landed our first walleye. It was only 14.5 inches, but we had no cares, as we knew there was a herd of 30-inchers swimming our way.

I just had that fish go when I had a flag, which ended up being a 28-inch gator.

State Semifinal: West Salem

After receiving a three-seed, the Indians were optimistic with their matchup against a two-seeded West Salem squad.

Though nobody is quite sure how the computer algorithm seeds teams, you need to beat the team across the scoring table from you.

The Kewaskum coaching staff felt the team had advantages going in with West Salem, and nobody really knew their second leading scorer had broken her hand the same week in practice. Anna McConkey tried playing through it, but it was obvious after 10 minutes she wasn't going to contribute much.

West Salem is a young team and was much better defensively than the Indians expected. They made it extremely difficult for Kewaskum to get into their sets.

Kewaskum is also a very good defensive team, and the first half was a grind on the offensive end.

The Indians held a 17-14 lead at the half.

Kewaskum really couldn't pull away until late in the game. The frontcourt of Morgan Adams and Madi Dogs provided a large percentage of the offense in this state semifinal. Adams was very efficient, hitting on six-of-nine field goals, including the only three-pointer for the team, along with providing late-game foul-shooting, finishing six-for-seven at the stripe for a career high 21 points. Dogs was five-for-10 from the floor and connected on four-of-seven foul shots.

Kewaskum held West Salem to 27% shooting, and did not allow many free throws (four).

The Indians put the game away at the foul line as West Salem needed to foul late to get the ball back.

Kewaskum made 15-22 free throws to help them reach the state final with a 46-34 win.

State Final

In the other semifinal, the Milwaukee Academy of Science (MAS) overcame a huge, early deficit by displaying a relentless assault on the offensive glass to knock off defending champion Waupun. The Novas are very athletic and feature two outstanding seniors in Ellis and Waheed.

The game plan was to take care of the basketball, limit second chances and try to slow down their high octane offense.

The Indians knew this wasn't going to be an easy task, but as fans packed the Resch Center in Green Bay, it was clear Kewaskum Green would be the primary color in the stands, as a great turnout was on-hand from the community.

The first half was one of Kewaskum's finest halves of basketball this entire season.

The game plan was well executed: only four turnovers, solid defensive rebounding and held MAS to only 23 points in the half. The Indians shot

54% in the half, led by Julia Steger's 13 points.

Steger was locked in. She had a different look on her face this game: confident, determined and focused.

Kewaskum took a nine point lead, 32-23, into the locker rooms.

MAS came out swinging in the second half. They increased their intensity with a full-court press, sped up Kewaskum into taking some quicker shots and were able to get into their transition game.

The Novas quickly erased the Indian lead and grabbed a lead of their own four minutes into the half.

Kewaskum Head Coach Mark Maley used a timeout to regroup and to instruct the girls to beat the press with the pass instead of the dribble, and Kewaskum was able to stop the bleeding.

When a missed three-pointer from Waheed appeared to be gathered by a Nova player, there was Steger to tip it away out of her hands and the speedy guard tracked it down and converted the breakaway to the loudest roar from the Indian faithful up to that point.

Kewaskum led 47-42 with 6:26 remaining.

MAS went on another run to reclaim a 48-47 lead at the 2:50 mark. This was anyone's game at this point.

The Novas were trying to burn some clock, and Madi Dogs came up with a huge steal that led to two Steger free throws for a 49-48 Indian lead with 1:53 left.

Grace Leitheiser pushed the lead to three with free throws at the 1:20 mark.

Morgan Adams grabbed a missed Ellis shot and was fouled with 66 seconds remaining and converted both foul shots to put the lead to five.

Upon returning home that night, the entire team was treated to a parade in their honor, as Kewaskum residents lined the streets from Foundry 45 to downtown to catch a glimpse of the state champs.

Adams finished with 11. She played the entire 36 minutes. She may have been the most consistent player over the past month. Her high-post decision-making was so good, making timely passes to set teammates up for high percentage shots and knowing when to look to score. Plus, she rebounds and plays defense extremely well. How this girl didn’t get first team all-conference this year will keep many scratching their heads for years to come.

Leitheiser played nearly the entire game. She did an amazing job handling the pressure. Grace made some key baskets and free throws and played solid defense the entire season.

Dogs was her typical self. Madi is so versatile and she does a little of whatever her team needs to come out on top. She finished with 13 points, nine rebounds, four assists and had four blocks in 34 minutes. The future New Jersey Institute of Technology Highlander earned first team all-conference this year, and typically took on the role of defending some of the top players from the opponents.

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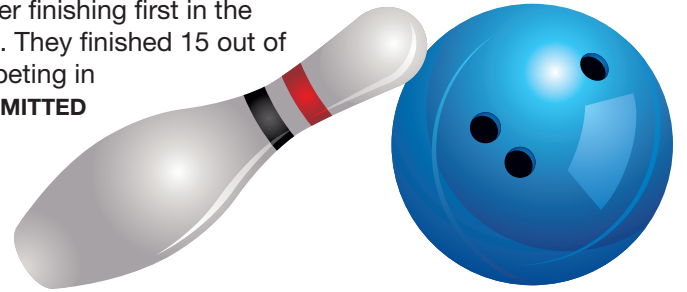

Campbellsport had to adjust defensively to compete with Brillion. Head Coach Ethan Elliott said it was one of the few times this season where they didn't have the height advantage.

Offensively, the Cougars stayed true to their style of play, trying to control the pace and create the opportunity for good shots.

"Unfortunately, we had some possessions where we didn't value the basketball, and they got some momentous plays," said Elliott.

The Cougars would continue to play catch-up all night, but never come back.

The final score was 74-55.

McCarty, Cole Kaehne and Jordan Ebert combined to score 46 of those 55 points with 18, 15 and 13, in that order. Ebert was hot from beyond the arc making all three of his three-point attempts.

In addition, Ayden Fleischman scored four points, Kody Koltz scored three points and Brady

Loehr scored two points.

In regards to where things went wrong for the Cougars, Elliott said, "We had a few turnovers that led to easy baskets. There were other possessions where we forced Brillion to miss, but did not complete the possession with a rebound. They were tough on the glass and got too many second-chance points. Those are crucial plays in a game that has little room for error."

The Cougars had two more turnovers than the Lions with eight, and only 12 rebounds compared to 23 for their opponents.

"It was a bummer to lose, but they got a taste of what sectional basketball is all about," said Elliott. "Hopefully, that adds to fuel to the fire for guys returning next year."

As for this season, Elliott said, "The season was amazing. I could not be more proud of this group for battling through a tough stretch in the middle of the season to find themselves playing for a share of a conference championship. We fell short of that, but they picked each other up and won a regional championship. No one will ever be able to take that away from them. They earned it and they deserve to be proud of that. One of our biggest goals of the season was to be playing our best basketball when playoffs rolled around - I'd say we did that."

This season concluded with four Cougars receiving Flyway All-Conference awards.

McCarty was named Conference Player of the Year, and received First Team All-Conference and defense honors. He finished his high school basketball career with 1,057 points and 808 rebounds.

Ebert received Second Team All-Conference. Fleischman received defensive honors and an Honorable Mention. Kaehne received an Honorable Mention.
