W.C.H.S. Granted Ownership of Neglected Dogs

Russell Quaas charged with 10 misdemeanors following animal seizure at Town of Wayne property

Last winter, more than 30 dogs, all but one of them a Jack Russell terrier, were rescued from squalor at a Town of Wayne residence, but the Washington County Humane Society (WCHS) recently announced the animals have been turned over to their care and – following extensive medical care – are officially available for adoption as of Monday, April 10.

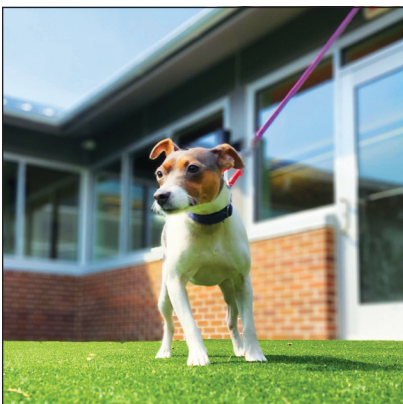
The story gained traction in early March when the Washington County Sheriff's Office reported the charges against Russell Quaas, 67.

According to the report, the Sheriff's Office

acted in late January to claims of animal neglect at the property of Quaas, which is located in the Wayne township. Upon investigation, the dogs were seized and, in March, Quaas was charged with 10 misdemeanors relating to intentional neglect of animals.

Images from the sheriff's department circulated online and showed the derelict conditions in which the dogs were forced to live. It was reported that dogs, some of them puppies, were left outside for long periods in freezing temperatures. Upon further investigation, the Sheriff's Office report stated that there was no working electricity or running water on the property. Dozens of

On Local Elections

Another election season has come and gone and with it the joy and agony that arises amid the two possible outcomes: win or lose.

The joy, of course, is usually for the winners, who will either resume or start serving their neighbors after obtaining the highest vote totals.

The agony (although I'm sure sometimes there is pain in winning an open seat, too) is for those who fell short of their campaigns' goals and who will either retool for the next election cycle or find another means to influence their community.

At the newspaper, it's now been one full year since we enacted a new policy regarding election coverage, and in the wake of the April 4 polling last week, it is clear to me that this information still needs to circulate.

For those who missed it, back in 2022, at the conclusion of the April elections, our paper's publishing company, Multi Media Channels (MMC), made the decision that political content would, largely, require payment to print. This change was made for all of MMC's publications (roughly two dozen across Wisconsin).

This call was made for several reasons, but chief among them was the lost revenue in the form of political letters-to-the-editor (by candidates, candidate's family members and supporters), which largely served as free advertising for the campaigns. Another big reason was that this publishing company prides itself on being apolitical; we do not endorse candidates, nor do we favor broadcasting one partisan set of ideas over another. It was determined that allowing a "free-for-all" when it came to campaign releases ultimately put our newspapers in unenviable positions. For some readers, it may appear as if the paper favored a candidate based solely on that candidate's willingness to use what was then a complimentary service.

This specific newspaper also used to run a feature called "Candidate Profiles", which were solicited by newspaper staff and included questions meant to introduce the area's candidates to readers. This process, which aimed to put everyone on an equal playing field, also had its own set of is-

ues: candidates often didn't follow the rules, while some would not answer requests to participate, at all. Most elections, particularly for our more rural coverage areas, also did not feature contested races. In those instances, incumbents were awarded the same space (to discuss a role they were almost predetermined to win) as a group of seven people fighting over three open seats.

Ultimately, it was time this process be reconsidered and rebuilt.

I understand why some readers and candidates were perturbed by this change. There is a perspective that we are taking away a level of transparency and that, without the profiles, it's difficult to know who to vote for.

That might be true, but it is also far more the responsibility of the municipality and the candidates to ensure transparent campaigns and access to information. This newspaper's decades-long stewardship in covering local elections has probably created some undesirable behaviors and practices within the community. In a sense, we were doing the candidates' job for them. As such, it's a good time to find an equilibrium and prepare to make changes for future election coverage.

For now, we will maintain the same policy we created last year, which is published on this page of this edition. This means candidates and campaign managers will be expected to reach out to use our services. In order to be fair, we will not be tracking down candidates for their campaign announcements, as this should be the responsibility of the candidate or campaign manager.

In the future, our election coverage is likely to change as we seek to determine a balance between what is vital information and political content; and it's important that folks understand there is a difference.

Should more contested races become the norm in the future or if the issues in a particular race are determined significantly newsworthy in a given time and place, we will increase our coverage and approach. Perhaps, if the candidates collectively recognize the importance of local news, we could work with all as a group to host future Candidate Profiles or even debates.

Either way, this will be a process and one that takes time, and we need to follow the lead of the community. Political reporting has changed im-

Access to supportive services for parents and caregivers a critical factor in preventing child maltreatment

April is Family Strengthening Month in Wisconsin. This month and throughout the year, the Washington County Health & Human Services Department encourages all individuals and organizations to play a role in making Washington County a safe place for children and families.

This year's theme is Building Together: Prevention in Partnership. Research shows that positive childhood experiences in nurturing environments provide a strong foundation for children's physical and mental health, learning and social skills. We know children do well when their parents do well. The foundation of this effort is the dedication of local agencies that ensure caregivers have the knowledge, skills and resources they need to protect children from the risk of child abuse and neglect.

"Across our community, there are parents and caregivers who are struggling with balancing the stress of daily life alongside caring for a child. Whether it is working multiple jobs trying to make ends meet or struggling with substance use or mental health needs--balancing these pressures with parenting can at times be very difficult," says Coral Kline, Children and Families Division Manager with the Human Services Department. "While there is no excuse for abuse or neglect, we must understand what underlying issues can cause it to occur if we, as a community, wish to prevent it and help families safely stay together."

To celebrate the awareness month, Washington County is posting resources on the Washington County Facebook page for families to stay connected and ease stressors. On April 1, the county will host the Guardians of the Children-Hog City Chapter for their annual Pinwheel ceremony to observe Child Abuse Prevention Month. Guardians of the Children is a nonprofit 501(c)3 organization comprised of motorcycle enthusiasts. Their vision

is to improve the quality of life in the community by educating the public and making them aware of the steps to take in order to prevent, recognize, and react responsibly to the reality of child abuse.

April is a time to celebrate the important role that communities play in protecting children and strengthening families," Kline said. "Each family is unique, but all parents and caregivers need support sometimes. We can help by ensuring all children have positive experiences and families have the resources when they need them."

dogs were kept in crates lined with soiled and dirty pizza boxes.

The report also stated the dogs were believed to have been fed leftover pizza and animal carcasses. One of the smallest dogs, according to reports, was found inside a drawer in a trailer on the property.

Quaas, stated in the sheriff's report, was believed to be operating an illegal dog-breeding business. He was charged with six counts of intentionally mistreating animals, two counts of failing to provide food/water for animals and two counts of intentionally providing improper shelter.

During an initial appearance at the Washington County Circuit Court on April 3, with Judge Sandra J. Gienorth presiding, Quaas entered a plea of not guilty. The court set a signature bond amount of \$5,000.

"In response to concerns raised by our community and with the help of a well-coordinated response from the Washington County Sheriff's Office, 34 dogs were removed from their owner in the Town of Wayne and relocated to WCHS for shelter and care," stated an April 10 release from the animal shelter. "On April 1, ownership of the dogs transferred to WCHS."

The shelter has been boarding the animals since their January seizure, however, Wisconsin law provides the opportunity for the original owner to reclaim the animals (which would have required paying WCHS for the boarding fees for all of February and March).

"After we seized them, we became their boarder, but not their owner,"

explained WCHS Communication Specialist Joe Poczkaliski. "The deadline [to reclaim] was April 2 and the shelter hadn't received payment, so we became their legal owner on that date."

While WCHS could still provide expert care as the animals' boarders, there was certain medical care they could not provide as they weren't the legal owners.

"We had to postpone some medical operations during the period because they weren't legally ours," added Poczkaliski.

Now with all red tape cut, WCHS is fast-tracking the process to getting these dogs into permanent, loving homes.

"Spaying and neutering began this [last] week," stated WCHS via the April 10 release. "Daily care, including exercise, plenty of attention and love will continue."

All totaled, the humane society said the medical care needed for the dogs surpassed \$40,000.

Every penny was well-spent, said WCHS employees and volunteers.

"WCHS care staff has grown fond of these resilient dogs," stated the release. "Our organization as a whole is pleased to have assisted in such a meaningful case."

Quaas' plea hearing is scheduled for May 8.

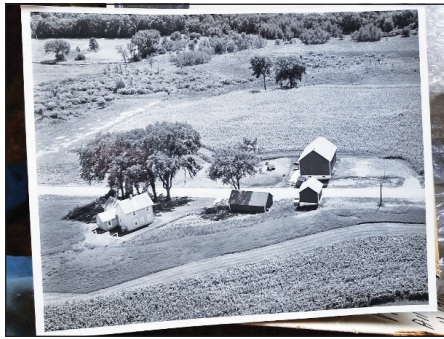

The Huck Farm Part 2

The following continues the history of the Huck Farm which existed off Eagle Road on Preserve Lane in the Town of Eden. The research stems from a conversation from Karl Ryan (b.1932) and his recollections on an aerial photograph of the farm from around 1960.

Money and Making It
The black and white photo for the Huck Farm used in this story, to Karl Ryan's memory, is taken around the time they lived there in the 1950s. But looking at the picture at his 90-plus years brings back a lot of pride of being a young 25-year-old father who finally was making his own place with his new family. Karl married Fern Bonlender in 1952, and lived with his parents over two years on Timberlane and F. There, they had their first child Mark; their second, Deb, was born when renting out the Huck farm.

The Huck farm also is a reminder of that transition period when houses got plumbing. Prior to 1955, this farm did not have plumbing or hot water. Grandpa Frank's health faded a few years before he died in 1949, and his wife Louise likely didn't have the physical capacity to make upgrades. The 1945-1955 time period is one worth considering how our elderly were trying to get by. What do you do when all the other neighbors are getting hot water and plumbing – but you are getting old and can no longer maintain a house? Grandma Louise (b. 1869) did not have a bathtub, “Just an outside toilet,” Karl said of his grandmother's house. “There was nothin' in the house. No toilets. No nothing.”



Louise Seybold Huck (1869-1969) would have been an ideal source to interview on days of old Eden. She lived nearly half a century on a farm located on Preserve Lane in Eden Township. This picture is likely taken from the 1950s, by the time she moved off the farm, which was later rented and worked by her grandsons Karl and Ray Ryan.

So, it sounded like when he was at the Huck Farm, he wasn't really making money but rather just staying even? “That's right,” said Karl who said it was a fair statement. And he had freedom? “Oh! Freedom is right. Fern was so happy to move in. We didn't have the house all done yet [before we left the Huck Farm] – the living room wasn't done yet. But the kitchen was real fancy. Put in a toilet. A bathroom. All that stuff, bathtub and everything we put in.”

Another point about this farm is the price. Farmers have a good way of remembering money, whether that be good bargains, fiscal mistakes or the way inflation has altered prices. Karl recalls that the Huck Farm of 80 acres (and a house) was transferred to Louise Seybold Huck's two children. “Grandma Ryan [Karl's term for his mother Violet] got \$2,800 and Margaret got \$2,800 for that...so that would be about \$5,600 dollars for 80 acres.” Fifty-six hundred dollars, when adjusted for inflation by the Bureau of Labor and Statistics calculator, suggests it would be worth about \$62,000 in today's money. Depending on location in the area – including Eden, \$5,600 would not even buy an acre of farmland nearly 70 years later.

The numbers are interesting because they exceed inflation and serve as a historical example on the value of the same land in the present compared to the mid-1900s.

Milking and Stalls

Karl Ryan was asked to describe

what the Huck Farm was like when he lived there. He recalls that most of the milk was picked up by Oral Krug (1917-1968). Oral had a “pretty old” truck and back in the 1950s he was still picking up milk cans. “All cans. Yeah,” Karl said, noting this was before trucks picked it up by bulk tank. By the time Karl and Fern left the Huck farm with their herd to their permanent farm, they milked about 20 cows in the Huck barn. Oral would come once a day, probably at 8 o' clock in the morning. Oral's brother John (1930-2016), according to his obituary, “operated a milk route and ran trucks for Mammoth Springs Canning Factory.” Karl's memories were more of Oral picking up the milk because Oral was substantially older than his brother John.

When it came to the milk can storage, Karl said, “We had an old water tank. Stuck it in there at night.” It worked as a tub in which the cans were exposed to water. It was a steel tank. “Then you'd fill it half full, then you'd set the can in the water.” At the Huck farm, they never continuously ran cold water over the cans (some farmers did). When it came to the tank, “You wouldn't fill it that full. I never got a lot of milk then. Till the cows all started freshening,” and until he got new heifers that calved then started to milk. He reflected: “... [It] took a while to get started. We never got [much]. Maybe lucky we got two cans of milk.” And those two cans were for



When this author's students at Oakfield High School ask me for advice on their family histories, I tell them to ask their grandparents who are living about their parents and grandparents who are dead. These are the most important stories to salvage before time runs out. I have been lucky that my grandfather has lived during my first 40 years. I hope you find his stories meaningful beyond family history. This is one of my favorite pictures of him looking at his farm off his bench. May his reflections provide you a mirror.

a day's worth from the herd.

This story provides context for many young farmers breaking off from their parents in mid-century Eden Township. How do young dairy farmers come of age on their own? Well, besides a dedicated wife, Karl had the help of his brother. That being said, it would take many years for Karl to learn how to farm, work his father's land, learn from his brother Ray, leave his parents farm, and build a young herd on the rented Huck Farm. Can many 18- to 25-year-olds at this time comprehend the efforts required to make a farm a homestead in the 1950s at the same age? Mind you, this Huck Farm isn't even where Karl and Fern would spend the majority of their lives.

Karl continued to elaborate on the years it took to build up a herd. He is not embarrassed by the two cans of daily milk at the Huck Farm and shouldn't be. There is a patience and work ethic required. Yes, he ended the Huck farm with about 20 cows. But he probably started with only 10 to 12 cows.

There were probably eight stalls on each side of the barn. After a while, he added more stalls where

Frank Huck's horses had been, “then I put cows in there.” This is another important dynamic, as horses were largely replaced by what changed in agriculture in the 1950s. So, Karl replaced the locations where the horses went so a couple of cows could fit in. That's how a herd from 10 to 14 likely went from 18 to 20. In that replacement of horses off the Huck Farm, some select cows would sit freer in the barn and he'd bring those to a stanchion to be milked. Karl never recalls a horse being on the Huck Farm when he arrived as a renter in 1955(ish).

The Huck Farm Photo

The following are some explanations of the professional photo taken of the farm around the late 1950s. First, looking at the top left quadrant, there are circles in a line running past the tall lawn trees. Southeast of the house Karl recalls there were apple trees that were cut down and were all gone by the time the photo was taken. This is noteworthy because as old as this photo is (60-plus years), one has to wonder when those apple trees were planted. What stories did they witness with the origins of the farm?

Next, notice the barn is on one side of the road, and “the nice granary” is on the other. Both run in a north/south direction (that is, the same direction) and are split by the driveway (now Preserve Lane). Between the house and the granary is a building running parallel to the driveway. It's “a little machine shed. That's where we kept our car.”

They stored wood in the extension of the house closest to the clothesline [white squares left side of house]. He explained the process of unloading the wood with a manure spreader – “Drive up with it and throw it in that window,” Karl said matter-of-factly in his pieced descriptions. As he said this, Karl pointed to the north end of that extension on the house with a white outlined window. (Note the door that's facing the photographer.) They took the route of throwing wood through the window and put it right in the house. Where did he

get the wood from? “From Ray [his brother]. Always helped him, and he gave me wood. We’d load up a couple [manure] spreader loads, and I’d bring it home and throw it in there. It was a lot of work. Then at night you had to carry it in and put it by the stove. And then burn it at night. I think it was elm or white ash. It was good wood. We always cut it a year or so ahead.”

Karl concluded looking at the picture, “That was a nice little house.” It might not have been the case when he started; but it was when he moved on. The picture overall gives Karl Ryan a sense of pride because it shows a farm left better than what it was when he arrived with his wife Fern. And the barn “was



in nice shape when we left. Ray had it, then he put a barn cleaner in it and everything.” Karl had a lot of manure to clean up in that barn, “I kept it all nice and clean. Wheeled it all out in a wheelbarrow. Manure [that is].” The Huck barn had no manure track in that barn. “Dump in on a pile, and then in the spring you had to put it all on the spreader.

In Part 1 on the Huck farm, Karl Ryan explained how his Grandpa Huck likely took milk cans to the cheese factory by horse, even until the 1940s. Karl recalled circles ingrained into the bottom of the wagon from the milk cans. The photo is included as an illustration of horse transportation for milk at mid-century. The picture was dated Feb. 2, 1947, and labeled “Mervin hauled milk with horses” because roads were blocked. The photo is courtesy of Karen Brown of Waupun, and likely from Wisconsin. It is evidence of the time when trucks and milk haulers started to get milk to the factory, but horses were still useful as a backup on this unknown farm when the weather made the roads bad.

And you didn’t have no loader.” His brother Ray didn’t milk in the barn when he took it over but used the Huck barn and “just raised the young cattle.” This might be when the photo was taken, as Karl, when asked to date the photo, only said this picture best represented what the farm looked like after it was cleaned up. “Otherwise, it wasn’t

that clean when Grandpa had it.” The point wasn’t to attack Grandpa Frank Huck; he got old, and grandma couldn’t keep up the property. Contrary, the image captures a 90-year old’s recollection of what it meant to have his own place he could shape during his twenties. Karl Ryan is happy the barn still stands.

There are no proven facts showing the Village of Campbellsport's water supply is a public health risk factor other than it exceeds a limit that has been viewed by many municipalities and engineers as very debatable, according to a statement from Village President Rick Heisler. A notice was published March 26 at the request of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency calling attention that the Village was in violation of the MCL level for gross alpha in the water supply. Heisler released a written statement at Monday's Village Board meeting letting people know that the Village is trying to deal with the radium issue, but the DNR has given the Village little information. Heisler has talked with State Senator Carol Roessler, who has shared information she received from the University of Wisconsin Extension. Heisler said DNR testing over the past months has shown inconsistencies. He said the inconsistencies, unanswered ques-

tions, and lack of commitments on the part of the DNR are causing a great deal of alarm to the public. The Village will continue to stay on top of the issue and inform the public of any information that he gets.

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Bug Tussel Eyeing Campbellsport for Internet Service, Sarauer to Retire in August

The village of Campbellsport held a regular board meeting on Monday, April 10, with all members in attendance.

For a large portion of the meeting, a group from Bug Tussel Management gave a presentation to the board regarding implementing wireless internet service in the village.

The presenters stated that the type of technology they are trying to implement is typically found in larger cities and is usually unavailable to smaller towns and those who live in the country.

Bug Tussel members explained that they are looking for rural communities to test their high speed internet route in. The business is hop-

ing to grow their customer base and become another option for those who are not satisfied with their current internet service.

The company stated that they will place a fiber route through town along the main road and might consider expanding this around the village to increase coverage.

Bug Tussel mentioned that they will put nodes on light poles, buildings or whatever they can use to help place the router around the village. Each node can cover up to a quarter of a mile of coverage and will be completely wireless.

The company acknowledged that this would be a test run for their system and they might need to correct things as the technology gets set up.

If Bug Tussel's wireless plan were to be successful in the village, they

mentioned that the company would offer village residents a discounted rate on their plans for the next five years.

"I have been in contact with Bug Tussel on how this would work for Campbellsport and I think this would be a great step for us to take with a county wide partner," stated Village Administrator Charlie Kudy.

No decision was made during the meeting and the village will be in contact with the company as more information is received.

Eye Candy Works

Each spring, I load up my canoe and drive over to De Pere on the Fox River and paddle-troll for walleye.

Walleye from Green Bay swim to the dam at De Pere and can go no further, so they spawn there. Lots of large walleye (the limit is one over 28-inches) means lots of fishermen from all over the Midwest in what can be true "combat" fishing.

I have caught two over 30-inches and several over 28.

This year, as you are about to read, I did things totally different at least for myself!

My stepson Travis Dushek is 31, lives near Portage and is a self-employed carpenter. Travis, and there is no one that will argue with the following statement that knows Travis, is the most go-for-it outdoorsman on the planet. He seeks, enjoys and goes back for more, and it does not matter if it is deer with a bow, ducks or dog training.

In the spring it is working Wisconsin's walleye run.

Travis is not your average fisherman as he uses an 18.56 Pro/Drive, which – in simple terms – is a mud motor on a flat bottom boat. In this case, it is top-of-the-line in both areas.

The first weekend of March, I was

on Little Bay de Noc living on the ice, and Travis was fishing on the Fox at De Pere with his fiancée Ann Shabin. We spoke on the phone and, over two days, they caught more than one hundred walleye.

The way that Travis fishes is like a predator, and he is very good at it. By using spot lock on his 50-pound thrust Minn-Kota, he works the river below the dam.

Tonight, we fished from 8 p.m. until 8 a.m., and I learned about his newest idea, which is creating his own color patterns with crankbaits. In simple terms, during the month of March, Travis fished at De Pere

for seven nights. He came up with the idea to buy blank crankbaits, invest some money in air brushes and create incredible patterns that catch walleye.

So, I have to admit, I kind of wanted to be in my canoe as we idled up to the area below the dam in Trav's boat, but it was also very cool to watch him go to work, and all I had to do was fish and observe. I didn't even have to bring a rod and reel and Trav had me choose one of his "Eye Candy Custom Baits" (he just came up with the name and got an LLC

in the last four weeks). I chose a pattern of pink, brown and green.

Here is how you fish: throw your crank downriver and twitch it, let the current and the crankbait do all the work.

It took six minutes, and I had a hit and caught an 18-inch walleye. A half-an-hour later, I had caught four and was "NOT" missing my canoe.

Travis is on a cold spell at first and working every rock pile and drop in the river that he knows of. We worked a spot for five-to-10 minutes and then moved 20 or 30

yards to another, keep the Minn-Kota on spot lock and catch fish.

At first, the evening was slow, but we both knew it would heat up. The northeast wind was a challenge to handle the boat in and not let your body get too beat up, but the walleye added up. By the end, I think we were at 24 and both of us felt great.

Travis had the big fish, which was a 25-incher but at about 4 a.m. I caught a 27-incher.

What amazed me about this entire experience was that over the course of four weeks an idea was hatched, the thought process went forward, the investments were made and fish-catching crankbait patterns developed.

When Travis was a kid going to school in Necedah his two favorite classes were phy-ed and art, and he was really good at art.

When I took Travis duck hunting for the first time, he was six, and we laid in a picked corn field, covered ourselves up and watched the sky. I did some whacking that day and it was very obvious by the look in his eyes that he was hooked.

At 8 a.m., we had landed and released 42 walleyes, both of us felt great and I was not missing my canoe a bit.

Next up is a trip to Canada!

The Indians started conference play on Wednesday, April 5, as they traveled south to play the Chargers of Kettle Moraine Lutheran.

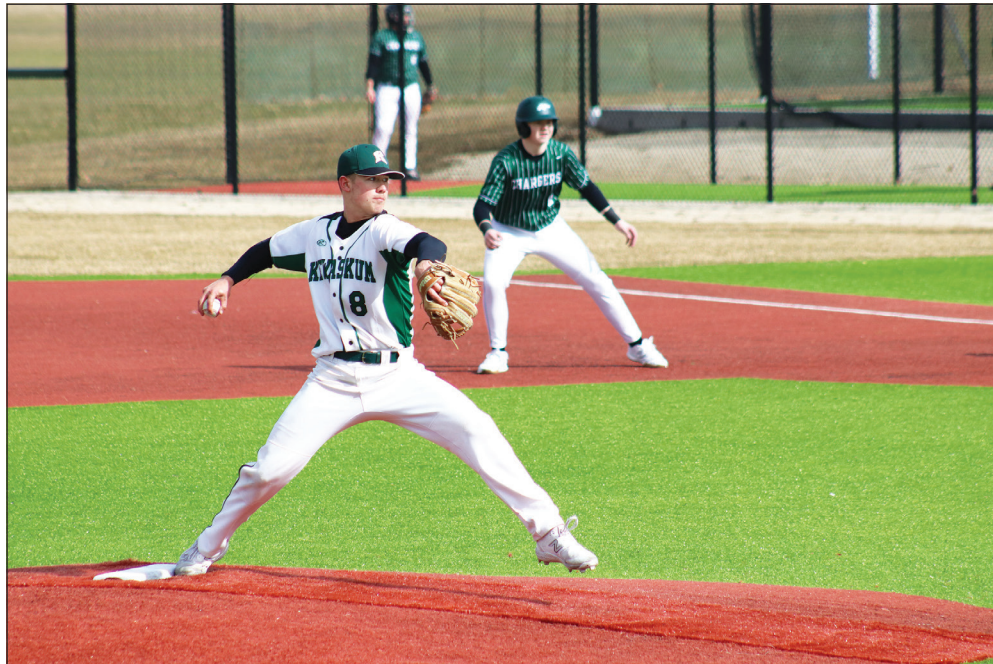
Kewaskum Splits Double Header with Kettle Moraine Lutheran
