Tiki Beach Resort Responds to Noise Requests

About 40 people gathered in the Osceola Town Hall last Monday, May 8, after some residents complained about the noise level of music at Tiki Beach Resort on Kettle Moraine Lake.

"I have lived out here my whole life. I've never been so insulted by having such loud music," Osceola resident Angie Mitchell said. "The music is fine, just turn it down. It's too loud."

The Town of Osceola enacted a disorderly conduct ordinance two years ago that calls for noise coming from businesses to not exceed 85 decibels between 7 a.m. and 11 p.m., and not to exceed 75 decibels from 11 p.m. to close.

The Tiki Beach Resort has never been cited for violating the town's sound ordinance, according to Kayla Sellnow, who owns the resort. She said that sheriff's deputies came out last year and checked decibel readings, but it has always been below 85 decibels, so no citations have been issued.

"We are going to go off the ordinance from two years ago. What we said we thought would work. We had many meetings. We came up with a decibel rating. We said if anyone had any problems to let us know, and we would come out there with a decibel reading unit at the property line of the complaint. To this day, technically, we have not had any complaints where we had to go there and do a decibel reading at a property line," Town Supervisor Dean Kranig said.

To ensure the sound level stays within the limit at the Tiki Beach Resort, Sellnow installed equipment and put a limit on the volume so that bands cannot go above the 85-decibel threshold. The challenge is when bands bring their own sound equipment, she acknowledged.

During last week's meeting, some residents suggested lowering the maximum decibel level in the ordinance.

"Based on the fact that it has not yet been tested being an actual complaint to the town, I am very reluctant to touch this thing. We have an ordinance. I think what discussion has to center around is applicability," Town Chairperson Terry Leininger said. "To date, we have not had a complaint that this can be applied to."

"I can hear the words sitting on our front deck," said Connie Ramthun, who lives about 4/10 mile from the resort. "The way the stage is set, and the way the sound is projected, it goes right out."

K.H.S. Rocket Club Wins Midwest Competition

The Kewaskum School District states, "We ignite a passion for learning."

There's no better example of that than the Kewaskum High School (KHS) Rocket Club. Members of this club have to design an experiment, convert that idea into a physical payload and then build an 8-foot Class II rocket to house that payload.

Students work on the project at least two times a week from late December until launch weekend in mid-May at Blue Harbor in Sheboygan. Besides building the rocket, the team members design and make team shirts, create a team logo, produce a story board explanation of the experiment and develop a live presentation of the principles of the experiment. Then they are evaluated by experts in fields relating to aerospace. All the work is done by the students, under the supervision of team advisors, who are typically parents or school faculty.

The program is run through Rockets for Schools, which is based in the Midwest. This competition is one of only two in the nation that qualifies high school teams for the yearly NASA Student Launch Initiative in Huntsville, Ala. The other competition is hosted in California. Teams must finish in the top three of this competition to qualify.

This year Kewaskum High School took first

Rock Hall Couldn't be Persuaded, **Zevon Left Off List**

Back a few moons ago, when I first started this column titled "Enjoy Every Sandwich", an obligatory explanation was necessary to make sense of the phrase for readers.

In short, it is a three-word pseudo-philosophical nudge of encouragement from a dying rock and roll musician to anyone who was listening.

That rocker was Warren Zevon, and he said the words to David Letterman on *The Late Show* back in 2002. Zevon had just received a terminal cancer diagnosis, and he recorded a final album and embarked on a relatively bold press tour prior to its release. The comedian Letterman asked Zevon, not so humorously at all, what advice he had to those of us remaining.

"Enjoy every sandwich," said Zevon (and I'm paraphrasing a little bit).

Zevon died roughly one year later, and the album he was promoting – The Wind – ended up earning "The Excitable Boy" (a nickname for Zevon based on one of his songs) two posthumous Grammy awards; Zevon's family accepted what was the late singer-songwriters only victories in the annual award show. His career began in 1965.

I bring up Zevon because the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame recently announced it's 2023 class of inductees. Zevon was among the nominees, but he did not make the final cut. It was his first year making the short list, however, which many Zevon fans celebrated as long overdue.

Known for the hits "Werewolves of London", "Keep Me in Your Heart", "Poor Poor Pitiful Me" and "Hasten Down the Wind", Zevon's initial big break came via Linda Rondstadt, who covered several of his songs throughout the years (including the last two I just listed). While he was enigmatic and struggled with consistency, Zevon's music permeated the Los Angeles rock scene of the '70s and '80s, and his sound, energy and

prose inspired contemporaries like the Eagles, Jackson Brown, Bob Dylan, the aforementioned Rondstadt and Bonnie Raitt. All of those individuals and Eagles were inducted to the Rock Hall.

By almost every objective measure, Zevon is deserving of being a rock and roll hall-of-famer.

The Rock & Roll Hall of Fame is an interesting thing, though. As someone who studied rock and roll music from a historical standpoint, I at least have some credibility when stating bluntly: it really doesn't mean a thing.

That's not to say folks who end up getting enshrined at the Rock Hall's Cleveland museum shouldn't be proud of the accomplishment, but more so that, over time, the selection committee of the Rock Hall has proven itself pretty inept at identifying what is and is not "rock and roll" and who the vital players were and how they influenced the genre. They've made up for this in recent years by correcting some massive oversights over the decades, but the process is needlessly slow and arbitrary.

In comparative terms, it simply does not (and never has had) the same prestige of the professional football hall in Canton.

It's just something fans of this type of music accept and live with. It's a fantastic museum! But, it's not the be-all-end-all list of relevant rockers of the past.

Nevertheless, it's still fun when folks who are long-overdue for the honor finally receive it, and while Zevon did not make it in this year, his addition to the shortlist is an encouraging sign that one day, finally, he'll earn the benign title of being a hall-of-famer (nevermind he did not live to see it happen).

It may not mean much of anything, but for fans of the inductee's music it is nice to celebrate, be nostalgic and enjoy what very well could be the last remnants of an authentic American art form. Rock and roll will never die, but, right now, it does seem to be taking a very long nap.

In the words of Warren Zevon, "I'll sleep when I'm dead!"



One pass will be available per family, and passes will be distributed on a first-come, first-served basis.

To get a state park pass, stop by the checkout desk at the Main Library or at the Allen J. Buechel Branch on Fond du Lac's east side. Library patrons will need to decide which date they plan to use the pass before they visit the library, must have an active FDLPL card, and

must have a vehicle with Wisconsin license plates.

plans. Ultimately, I guess I 'Found Myself' with this opportunity."

They aren't disclosing the long-term plans, but Schumacher believes that there is a very large opportunity with the business.

"Step one was to maintain and improve. Step two was to rebrand. And step three was finding ways to grow," he said. "We've seen a lot of demand for our products and have not been able to fill \$1 million dollars' worth of orders over the past couple of years."

The State of Wisconsin awarded Kewaskum Foods a \$150,000 matching grant for a significant project.

"We are planning to use those funds to purchase two double-house smoke houses so we can increase our capacity," Schumacher explained. "This will give us an 80% increase in smoking and cooking capacity for our sausage line, a much-needed change for our business."

With Judd's leadership and knowledge base, Kewaskum Foods will be able to better train people in the art of sausage making.

"There is a lot of science around the process, and food safety is a critical component to our business," Schumacher said. "Ultimately, we'd like to build a formal training program so that we can fuel our growth."

Gov. Evers, P.S.C. Announce 'Internet for All Wisconsin' Listening Tour

Gov. Wisconsin could expect an allocation of \$800 million to \$1.1 billion to implement the state's five- year action plan for broadband and approximately \$25 million to implement the state's Digital Equity Plan under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law's 'Internet for All' programs. In December 2022, Gov. Tony Evers and the PSC announced the nearly \$6 million federal investment for the state to develop these plans by gathering local input from Wisconsinites in broadband access and digital inclusion activities.


All high school students are eligible for this honor. Students are nominated by their teachers and then chosen by department.

However, not everyone is bothered by the noise.

"We feel that weekend entertainment at the resort is a very positive addition to our lives. The resort owner takes great care in hiring very good bands of all different genres so that there is truly something for everyone. My husband, my neighbors and I, we all look forward to fishing on the lake with fantastic music in the background. Last year we joked that we were fishing to the oldies. We feel that this lake and the Tiki Beach events are truly heaven on earth and we cannot wait to have our friends and family join us this summer," said Michelle Harrington, who lives five houses from the resort.

"When we look at actual numbers on the subject, they are open from Memorial Day to Labor Day, which is only 105 days of the year. Of those days only 45 have music during the day, and only 30 have music into the evening, so that is literally 12 percent of the year that has music only 8 percent of the year with evening music. Again, that is 92 percent of the year quiet on the lake with no music. Because of the Tiki Resort and the Dundee bars and all their music, we are a destination for tourism," Harrington added.

The sound ordinance applies to other venues in the town, not just the Tiki Resort.

"It's not just Kettle Moraine Lake, we've got Dundee, we've got Sportsman Park. We have all these things; they all raise money. They

donate money back to the community," Tom Hinchliffe said.

"I'm of the opinion that the ordinance should stay as is. There are approximately 15 weekends of summer for the Tiki Bar to run, which is a short time for a seasonal business to make their living," said Ed Fellion, who lives with his wife less than 200 yards from the Tiki Bar. "I ask the board not to handcuff the seasonal business."

Isaac Baker, a town resident, said he thinks sound travels because the stage faces the lake.

"This can be fixed really easily,"

Baker said. "You just switch the stage around."

Dr. Toby Watson, who is the person who developed the resort and owns property there, and Sellnow said at the meeting that they would look into changing the directions that the speakers face. In addition, Watson told Baker he was open to walking the property with him to find a solution.

"The business is willing to work with the community. Let's let them make some changes, and we can do some monitoring," Kranig said.

"We will monitor everything. If

you are concerned about the noise, call me. And I will endeavor to get there ASAP and get a reading from your property to the letter of this ordinance. We worked way too hard to throw this thing out. I'm proud of the work that the people who were involved in this did because it was difficult," Leininger added. "What concerns me is what is said outside of this building. We need to always keep at the top of our mind to keep building things up. And that is exactly what happened tonight. People got together, they talked, they were respectful, and I think everybody comes out of here knowing a little something new. If we continue to do that, we are going to be OK."

The Tiki Beach Resort on Kettle Moraine Lake is scheduled to open on Monday, May 22 at 1 p.m. Live music is planned for every weekend through the summer.

has the same semiautomatic capabilities as an "assault rifle." I bet more people are killed in mass shootings with pistol rounds than ARs.

Now let's think outside the box. I Googled top reasons for deaths of Americans 20-24 years old. The number one reason (42%) were poisonings (drug overdoses with a smaller percent of vehicle accidents). In 2021, in the U.S. 106,000 people died of overdoses. That equals 8,833 per month. In the first paragraph of the May 11, Rural Writes column, the author said, "that in just a few months there were over 20 incidents of random shootings." If we are to be concerned about the deaths of young people, think deeply about those numbers: 8,833 drug overdoses per month compared to 20 random gun incidents in two months. I wish the "blue dogs" would deal with the amount of drugs pouring across the border because of what I think is a complete open-door policy at the border. Talk about insane.

D.H.S. Details End of Emergency COVID-19 Response

COVID-19 prevention and precaution remain a priority as response programs transition

The federal government has announced the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency will end May 11. In Wisconsin, case numbers, hospitalizations, and deaths from COVID-19 are significantly lower than they were during the surge in late 2021 and early 2022, and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) has been making plans to move away from an emergency response to the virus.

The federal public health emergency has been in place since early 2020, and it gave federal and state governments flexibility to waive or modify certain requirements in a variety of areas. Associated legislation provided funding and additional flexibilities to help combat the virus.

DHS continues to transition its emergen-

cy COVID-19 response programs and services. Some programs, including COVID-19 testing and vaccine services, will continue to undergo changes in the coming months.

"The declaration of a public health emergency helped support Wisconsin's efforts to combat COVID-19 with resources that saved lives statewide," said DHS Secretarydesignee Kirsten Johnson. "As the federal public health emergency declaration nears its end, DHS will continue to shift our COVID-19 response operations. However, it is critical that Wisconsinites know this does not mean COVID-19 has gone away. The virus remains a threat to health, and we must continue to care for ourselves and each other."

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

Definition

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally- occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are byproducts of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

Indians Upset Warriors on the Road

On a beautiful 70 degree day, the Indians came off the bus ready to hit. Lead-off batter Donny Zillmer got hit by a pitch and the next five batters (Austin Reichel, Hunter Loser, Dylan Soyk, Derek May and Austin Loehr) all hit singles. After a strike out, Carter Curtin placed a perfect suicide bunt down to take a 5-0 lead before the host Warriors had a chance to bat.

The first two batters reached for the Warriors, but that was all Indians' starter May needed to settle in and retire the next three to end the inning.

The Indians picked up right where they left off in the top of the second with a single by Reichel and sacrifice fly by Loser to extend the lead to 6-0. Waupun hit a double and single to score one with no outs, but May stranded them with a pair of fielder's choices and a strike out.

C.H.S. Track Building 'Championship Culture'

changing," culture... it's stated Campbellsport Head Track Coach Derek Toshner, who has revamped the program since taking the position five years ago.

Last week, on Tuesday, May 9, during their home invite, three school records were broken - a fourth was broken earlier this season. Derek shared with his athletes at practice the next day that almost half of the school records have been broken over his first five years

"When one kid starts to be really good, that sets a fire," Toshner observed.

Senior Aubree Koenings broke the discus record of 119'3" set by Dawn Zuengler in 1978 back on April 13 at the Markesan Invite with a distance of 126'8". She has been throwing since sixth grade, but started throwing disc as a freshman.

Last week Tuesday, senior Josh Dontchenko broke the pole vault record of 12'10" set by Tom Campagna in 1973. He had scratched his first two jumps of the night. Before his third attempt, Assistant Coach Shannon Toshner mentioned Campagna was there to watch him. After some more words of encouragement, Dontchenko surpassed 11 feet and set a new record of 12-11.00, nearly 13 feet. He has only been pole-vaulting for two years. The big difference between this year and last year was a change in attitude. He admits that he got more serious about the event, traveling to Waukesha to train at an indoor facility over last summer and winter, and focusing on his emotions as it can be not only a challenge physically, but mentally.

Then the girls 4x400 relay comprised of sophomores Sienna Hewitt, Capri Constantineau, Lydia Toshner and freshman Kameron Rohlfs broke the time of 4:15.9 set in 2002 with a 4:12.4. With that time, they are ranked fifth in the state. They attributed part of their success to training they received at XLR8 Sports Training, LLC. in Appleton. They have been working on their form, lengthening their strides, and moving their arms properly to run faster. Their new goal time-wise is to run a 4:10 or be first in state.

Feeling inspired by the girls relay, the boys 4x100 relay, "ran out of their minds," said Derek Toshner. Just last year, the record from 1982 was broken with a time of 44.81. Unexpectedly, one year later, that record was broken again by juniors Ben Timm, Emmet Homuth, Mason Willacker and sophomore Emmett Gonnering with a time of 44.74. They believed their handoffs were the difference maker on Tuesday.

"We got those like down pat," said Timm.

Overall, the boys placed second and the girls placed fourth as a team on Tuesday.

"So far, the boys have won the Markesan, Ripon, and Waupun Invitationals. The girls took second in Markesan and third in Waupun," said Derek. "Historically, we were bottom to possibly middle of the pack in these invitationals."

'This is not the program we were five years ago, not even close," he added.

When he came back to Campbellsport five years ago, there were around 18 kids on the team. Now. there are nearly 60.

"I had to like weed out the old system," Derek explained. "When we started, I really focused on the freshman and then by the time they were seniors they had only seen my system... It just took some T.L.C., love, and some recruiting from Shannon."

When asked what it has been like having Derek and Shannon as coaches, Koenings said, "I love them. They have always been there by my side to help." She added that they are always positive and there to encourage and help improve.

Dontchenko, when talking about the season, said, "I really got to know my coaches a lot more and I appreciate them a lot... 99 percent of it was coaches, my teammate and people supporting me."

"Every year, the kids have been getting better and better," said Derek.

On Monday, May 15, the team competed in the Flyway Conference Meet hosted by Winnebago Lutheran Academy at North Fond du Lac High School. Details from the conference meet will be available in next week's paper.

"This is a team that can win conference and do something that has never been done in the school's history –for the girls. The last time for the boys was 1969 and 1973," Derek told the team. "I believe in you guys and you should believe in yourselves."

Campbellsport will participate in the regional at Grafton on Monday, May 22, their sectional will be at Milwaukee Vincent on Thursday, May 25, and the state meet is June 2-3.

While the entire team is focused on conference and the remainder of the season, Derek already has some thoughts about the next year.

He is losing one boy, Dontchenko, who already has his mind set on trying to defeat the pole vault record at Milwaukee School of Engineering next fall which is 16'9".

"I have fun with this, why stop?" he asked rhetorically.

And the team will be losing four girls, including Koenings, who will also participate in track and field at UW-Stout, along with Hannah Lueck, Elli Scannel and Ella Goebel.

As for those that will be around next spring, Derek thinks, "They are going to be so dialed in; it is going to be incredible."






