The Case for South Eden


There is a problem geographically within the Township of Eden in regard to its history. It is my hope the following will rectify the inaccuracy and unfamiliarity to our past that occupies the present maps of Fond du Lac County. Without any doubt, it is clear South Eden should be on the map. The following are the logical and historical justifications.

Gap in the Map

Eden Township has only two geographical locations in the existing map within the original township. By geographical locations identifiable on a map, I mean unincorporated areas (like Marblehead) or incorporated villages (Eden) or cities. In the case of Eden Township, only Marblehead and Eden are on the map. One might suggest Twin Lakes, but even if this third location counts, it is rather close to the village of Eden.

Comparatively, the areas outside the village of Eden seem to leave a huge gap until the next mapped locations. First, the entire bottom half of Eden Township has no locations (18 sections or square miles). Because Marblehead (Sections 6 and 7) and the Village of Eden (Sections 8/9 and 16/17) are in the northwest quadrant of the township, there is still the northeast quadrant of the township (Secs 1-3, 10-15) which have no geographical location. In addition, as you move to northern Ashford Township, the first

The 2023 championship season for the A's has been over for a few months now, but recognition for their successful summer continues to roll in.


In the Rock River League, where the A's took home their first Grand Championship since 2012, the following players were honored for successful individual seasons.

Washington County Names Significant Permit Fee Reductions

SENIOR DINING MENU

Washington County completed a review of the Land Resources permitting and review fees resulting in significant fee reductions in the 2024-2025 Budget approved by the county board in November. Josh Schoemann, county executive, initiated the review aimed at lowering the overall regulatory cost of home construction and platting, and to mitigate the impact on the price of housing.

The Next Generation Housing (NGH) initiative prompted the review as the county worked with local municipalities involved in NGH developments to change some of the zoning regulations and fees to lower the cost of the homes. The objective is to provide housing opportunities that will allow working individuals and families to remain in Washington County

and build equity through home ownership.

"Reducing the cost of development leaves more money in the pockets of homeowners and businesses and furthers the mission of creating an environment for our citizens to enjoy our authentic quality of life," Schoemann said.

Most Land Resources fees will be reduced by an average of 50%, with some eliminated altogether. The county fees affected are primarily in subdivision and stormwater infrastructure review, permits located in the County – regulated shoreland, floodplain and wetland, non-metallic mining, and septic system installations.

Early Morning Crashes in Auburn, Investigation Continues

Alcohol believed to be a factor in the initial crash

On Sunday, Dec. 31, at 1:10 a.m., the Fond du Lac County Communications Center received a call of a one-vehicle accident on Hwy 45 near Sandy Road in the Township of Auburn.

Deputies with the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office and Washington County Sheriff's Office responded along with Campbellsport Ambulance and Kewaskum Fire and Ambulance Service.

Preliminary investigation showed that the vehicle was traveling southbound and entered the west ditch, striking a culvert. The vehicle then overturned several times before coming to rest. There were five occupants of the vehicle, four of which were ejected during the crash.

After being ejected from the vehicle, a 19-yearold Hartford woman was struck by another vehicle. She was drug from the scene and located by Washington County Deputies three miles from the initial crash site. The female was pronounced deceased at the secondary scene. Three other occupants were transported to medical facilities with serious life-threatening injuries. One occupant was transported with non-lifethreatening injuries.

Hwy 45 was re-routed for approximately four hours by the Fond du Lac County Highway Department and Wisconsin State Patrol while the Fond du Lac County Reconstruction Team investigated the crash.

The investigation into these two crashes remains active and ongoing, and alcohol is believed to be a factor in the initial crash. The following additional details are being released at this time.

Occupants of vehicle involved in initial rollover crash:

- 19-year-old female operator form Hartford deceased;
- 17-year-old male passenger from Iron Ridge transported by ambulance to Froedert Hospital Milwaukee with critical injuries;
- 16-year-old female passenger from Theresa transported by ambulance to Children's Hospital Milwaukee with serious non-life-threatening injuries;
- 17-year-old passenger from Milwaukee transported by ambulance to Froedert West Bend with minor injuries;
- \bullet 21-year-old passenger from Iron Ridge transported by civilian vehicle to Aurora Medical

Center Washington County with serious non-lifethreatening injuries.

If you have any information on either of these two related crashes, we are asking that you contact the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office at 920-929-3390 or the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's tip line at 920-906-4777.

More information will be made public as law enforcement continues to investigate these related crashes.

The sheriff's office appreciates the various first responders and assisting law enforcement agencies across multiple jurisdictions who worked together to locate and account for all involved and assisted our deputies in this complex investigation.

January 2 Update

On January 1, a 19-year-old West Bend man was identified as the driver of the vehicle that struck the 19-year-old female driver of the first crash and fled the scene in his vehicle prior to the arrival of emergency personnel. It is believed that the occupants of the vehicles were known to each other and that they were traveling together. He has been arrested on suspicion of Hit and Runcausing death (Duty to report accident; assistance following accident). He remains in custody in the Fond du Lac County Jail awaiting an initial court appearance. Additional details about the crash and subsequent investigation will become available in the criminal complaint when filed with the court. No further details are expected to be released until that time, as the investigation remains active and ongoing.





Wisconsin Residents - Check Your Property Tax Bill to **Ensure You Receive the Lottery and Gaming Credit**

WIS. DEPT. OF REVENUE

The Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) is reminding Wisconsin residents to check their current property tax bill for the lottery and gaming credit. The credit provides direct property tax relief to qualifying taxpayers on their property tax bills. Lottery proceeds are paid into a separate segregated state fund. The lottery credit is displayed on tax bills as a reduction of property taxes due.

To qualify for the lottery and gaming credit, you must be a Wisconsin resident, own a dwelling and use it as your primary residence as of the January 1 certification date of the year the property taxes are levied – in this case January 1, 2023. If an owner is temporarily absent, typically for a period no longer than six months (ex: hospital, vacation, incarcerated), the primary residence is the home where the owner returns. Principal dwelling means any dwelling the owner of the dwelling uses as their primary residence.

To receive the credit, an eligible property owner

must file an application with the county treasurer where the property is located or, with the city treasurer if the property is located in a city that collects taxes under state law. A property owner may claim only one primary residence. You cannot claim the lottery and gaming credit on business property, rental units, vacant land, garages, or other property that is not the owner's primary residence.

If a property owner is eligible for the credit as of January 1, 2023, but their property tax bill received in December 2023 does not show the credit, they may:

- · Claim the credit by applying to the municipal (town, village, or city) treasurer where the property is located, by January 31, 2024.
- File a late claim application (if missed the January 31 deadline) with the Wisconsin Department of Revenue by October 1, 2024.

11 sections south of Eden Township have no mapped location. Thus, it's almost the size of a township that expands between Ashford (unincorporated on Highway 67) and Eden Village, for which there is "no place" to locate on a map.

Uneven Distribution in Eden

To understand the discrepancy of mapped locations. Look at the mapped locations in what is and or formerly Ashford Township – this includes Elmore, Saint Kilian, Ashford, Campbellsport and Golden Corners. The source for this is one of the best maps in the country – DeLorme, which has a great reputation for state atlases. The 2020 DeLorme Atlas for Wisconsin still has the same locations on its map within Ashford Township (p.79).

Another township whose borders are filled with five mapped locations is Lomira. It has the villages of Lomira and Brownsville, as well as the unincorporated areas of Knowles (population "not many"), Nasbro, and Golden Corners. Recognize Golden Corners is a significant marker of two townships because it is on the Ashford/Lomira town line.

In contrast, the whole township of Eden has two mapped localities, and that's all in the northwest quadrant of the township.

Population is Not a Requirement

In addition to the above arguments, please recognize when making the case for South Eden, the population of a concentrated area is not required to put a place on the map.


DeLorme Map is still placing Nasbro, Golden Corners and Hamilton on maps. Nasbro is an old quarry company town west of Lomira and north of Knowles. In Golden Corners, the cheese factory isn't even there anymore and it's unclear if people younger than age 50 use the term for the intersection south of Camelot Golf Course.

Meanwhile, Hamilton too was essentially a quarry company town in the Town of Byron on the south side of B but west of 175. Please note a 1944 map of Fond du Lac County reinforces that Hamilton is not on 175 (formerly Hwy 41), but rather somewhat west. I had a recent conversation with someone who lived in those former company houses before they were torn down. This source, Pat Dilling, reinforced the use of Hamilton was not on 175 but rather west of that off of B. Pat lived there for approximately a dozen years around the 1950s and early 1960s, and her location of Hamilton was on the south side of B. At that time, there were more than a half dozen houses there. They are now long gone, but Hamilton is still on the map.

It is important for future generations to know locations that were significant to our past. They also create talking points when one is referencing a place in the vicinity to go. Recognize this piece is supportive of Nasbro, Golden Gorners and Hamilton as mapped locations. The point in regard for South Eden is that you don't need a hamlet or five houses together to be on the map.

Written Evidence of South Eden

In addition, South Eden has been documented in use. For example,



South Eden Wildcats sweater. As the daughter of Leo and Fern Reilly, she knows her South Eden history. She came to the Campbellsport library presentation on South Eden in October. At the end, she pointed out that she has this historical artifact. "I just want to let you know I have a South Eden Wildcats sweatshirt....But you had to be South Eden. There were 13 of us that had them, and I still have mine. I do not know if it fits or not, but I told Joanie Ryan [Wettstein], a good friend of mine, which is Ray Ryan's daughter-when they moved over there to that side [Eagle Road], she wore one, but I reminded her she wasn't South Eden." However, in defense of Joanie, she lived in South Eden for a while when her parents worked Maurice Flood's farm on halves in the 1940s. Joan added with some humor and truth, "We always knew South Eden was wonderful, and we were very important people." The Wildcats of South Eden originates in the days when St. Mary's of Eden did the CYO plays. This brought back memories of working with Frank and Florence Flood, and Jim and Jeanne Braun. But there was a whole group of South Eden kids "and we all wore the same South Eden Wildcats sweatshirt." Joan added sarcastically, "But there was a few that got in there that really weren't [from South Eden], like I said, that kinda of upset us [jokingly]. But I still have mine." In addition, "when we were in high school, that was your night out-Monday night was a good night. You went to CYO; you often didn't get home very early." PHOTO COURTESY: JOAN REILLY


at Shepherd of the Hills, there is a display that honors the artifacts of the old churches from which the parish descends from. Labeled on those relics are items which came from St. James Church. But rather than the label saying "St. James," they are labeled "South Eden." St. James Church lasted from 1865 to 1971, and was located on Highway F but west of V. There was also a prior church located on Murphy's Hill on Scenic Drive. This mid-1800s church was built by early Irish Catholics and lasted until the one built in 1865.

In addition, photographs of St. James Cemetery in later years explicitly show the sign at the cemetery said "South Eden." This



includes different signs of both the 1990s and early 2000s. In addition, the monument honoring dozens (of those who no longer have their own headstone) clearly labels the site as South Eden.

Another example is the old signs of Phil Majerus's deer pen, which has been called "South Eden Preserve." Likewise, Rick Heisler recalls Elwyn Ketter used the term "South Eden." Heisler also pointed out that Jack Majerus used "South Eden" as a clear definition of where he had lived. Accordingly, Jack's wife Irene had "South Eden" on her license plates so we can safely conclude her position on this topic. Jack and Irene's children still use the term.

The Post Office

Probably most significant in ushering the use of "South Eden" is a source indicating a South Eden Post Office. Richard Bartell of Oakfield has done considerable research on the unique aspects of local history, including post offices. His information preserved shows South Eden as a one-year-wonder of a post office. "Established June 17, 1878, with Samuel M. Kuter [as postmaster] and discontinued October 29, 1878. It was located in Section 20, T14N R18E in Eden



The U.S. government created a surveying and grid system upon the creation of the Northwest Territory in the 1780s. Townships usually were 36 square miles. In time, new villages and cities or unincorporated areas developed over the original township. In the case of Eden, Marblehead's sprung up in sections 6 and 7, and the village of Eden has expanded into parts of sections 8,9, 16 and 17. However, when compared to other townships, Eden has a vast landscape without a mapped location (as shown by sections with an X). In contrast, both the townships of Lomira and Ashford have five mapped locations. Such a vacancy suggests there is room to put South Eden on the map. SUBMITTED

Township."

Mr. Kuter matches a Samuel Monroe Kuter (1843-1929) buried in Reinzi Cemetery, whose spouse was Emeline Odekirk (1852-1923). Findagrave suggests they married in 1871, which might explain why Samuel was in South Eden in the 1870s. Odekirk is still a common name in Eden Township, including the name of the cemetery east of F & V's intersection. However, Emeline's parents are buried in Reinzi too, so this branch of Odekirks might have been more partial to Fond du Lac than Eden.

So why was Emeline buried in Reinzi? The 1880 publication, The History of Fond du Lac County, was very helpful. In a paragraph on James J. Odekirk, it defines the early settler who came from New York after marrying his wife Almira Kelyer in 1846. This source explained that they had two children, Alice and "Emma (now Mrs. S. M. Kuter)," (p.986-7) This citation matched Emeline Odekirk with her father, but also explained Emma had three deceased siblings: Harriet (1847-1847), James (1848-1853) and Julia (1857-1857). This was interesting, as the father of these three children are buried with his three prior deceased children at Reinzi Cemetery. However, this is also the same man ("J.J. Odekirk") who in the 1874 plat map owns the farm around what today is known as Odekirk Cemetery. The information brings up the predicament of where a farmer should bury his child in 1847 when there was no fitting place nearby for burial. Thus, all of James J. Odekirk's children are buried in Reinzi, and not on his farm on highway F east of V, even though that has become known as Odekirk Cemetery. Did he choose Reinzi because there was no closer option in 1847?

Now, back to the concept of South

5 Years Ago January 3, 2019

Campbellsport native Chelsea Schmidt feels she has found her calling teaching abroad. Chelsea has been teaching at Gunangdong County Garden School in China for three years and she loves it. She teaches English to third grade students and is one of the approximately 150 international teachers at the school. Chelsea graduated from Campbellsport High School in 2009 and earned a degree in elementary education and special education at UW-La Crosse. She taught for twoand-one-half years in Wisconsin before taking the position in China. The school is a boarding school with about 80 percent of the students living there during the year. Sitting on approximately 82 acres, the school has about 4,300 students and 600 teachers.

David Mowry, a Campbellsport Village Board trustee, served his last meeting as a board member. He will be moving out of the village.

Eden's post office, which Emeline's husband ran. The area was also compared to the 1874 plat of Eden Township. There was no Odekirk or Kuter name in Section 20, which is north of F (Vincent/ Leo Ryan's old farm) and is the section that also includes the farms on either side of what became Timberlane Drive before the sharp bends heading north towards V. The post office existed in 1878, and there wasn't another big plat for the county until the 1890s. Section 20 in the 1893 map didn't have any Odekirks or Kuters in Section 20 either. However, at least we known Emeline grew up just east of South Eden, and her husband was in a position to work at the only South Eden post office.

Besides being helpful with Odekirk history, Bartell's records are solid evidence "South Eden" isn't merely a mid-1900 invention. In fact, the reference to the post office means South Eden's origin dates back 145 years. It's time to put it on the map in the present, in honor of our past. Future writings will clearly define the boundaries of South Eden, and its people.




