The Sheep Dip

“Did you ever hear about the Sheep Dip?” That was a question Wayne Hass asked. It’s an important location in Eden history, especially among those who grew up on Eagle Road. The answer to defining the Sheep Dip is a mixture of old farm names, healthy sheep, sizable bullheads and a unique location along the Milwaukee River.

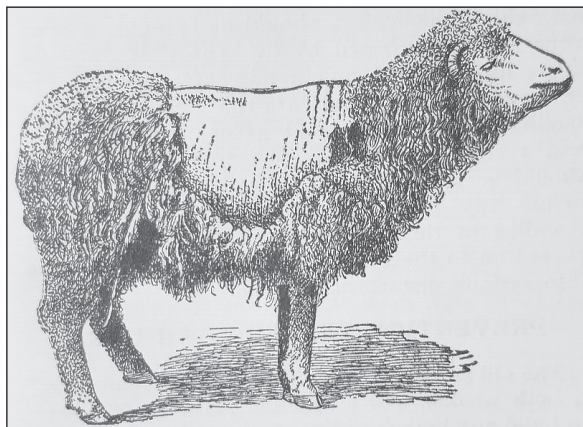

Here’s an example of how pertinent the Sheep Dip was to those living near Eagle Road that comes from an interview at Anne Koenig’s home, with Margie Odekirk and Dick Guell.

So did she call it the Sheep Dip? Anne explained what she learned from her husband Mark. “I call it the Sheep Dip because Mark’s great-grandmother [used it]—it would have been Magdeline [Braun (1827-1910)] and whoever came here whenever they did—they lived on the Hass farm. When I say they lived on the Hass farm, they lived across where the log home is now.”

Anne explained that when the Brauns got here, they built their own log home, which was on the opposite side of the road as the present day built log home. Magdeline was “quite a large lady, and Mr. Braun was not a very large man. I don’t think any of the Braun people ever were.” As is always the case in Eden history, one should specify that this last name is not spelled like the color, but rather B-R-A-U-N. She was a very industrious farm wife. “It is told, not only did she have children every year, but she cleared the brush with her hands and knees [in] that entire area... and eventually they built where the Hass farm is now.” This reference of how the location is still known as “the Hass Farm” is how farm communities still label points of interest by using land owners from previous generations. Gordon and Leona Hass moved off their farm, which was the old Braun Farm, in the early 1980s.

So Nicholas and Magdeline Braun are the settlers who cleared the land. And when you are on their land today, Anne explained, “between where Wayne [Hass] and the home farm is [where Wayne’s dad Gordon farmed], the river must go back in there. And then there was a hole.” By hole, she meant a change in the river depth that was more defined and deeper along that Milwaukee River route. In conversation, Anne redirected to her friend Margie Odekirk: “well you fished there.” Margie affirmed she knew the area. It was a simple gesture in conversation, but a won-

derful reminder of the old days when neighbors could access other’s property with mutual trust and not be kicked off for trespassing.

Now, for history placement, step back and understand where Magdeline Braun fit in. *The Fond du Lac Reporter* (Sept.26, 1910), as cited on *Findagrave.com*, notes she was born in “Rhine Prussia, Kreis Trier, Germany” in the 1820s, and married Nicholas Braun. They had married in West Bend in 1850, although apparently Nicholas already had the land in Eden. In 1910, she passed at the old homestead then-occupied by her son, Peter Braun. And the obituary follows a similar narration which Anne shared. “In the early years when she and her husband settled the Braun place in Eden, she worked with her husband clearing the land, going through the privations of the early [settlers] working by the side of her husband.”

Although Magdeline had her funeral at St. Matthew’s, the revered Rev. J.B. McFarland of St. James and St. Mary’s officiated her funeral with St. Matthew’s Rev. H. July. “The funeral was one of the largest held in the town for some time.”

Thus, the following is an overview of those who owned the land of the Sheep Dip – Nicholas and Magdeline were on the farm, then came her

Presentation on Natural Areas Management and Protection Scheduled

A free presentation by Zachary Kron of the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SWRPC), will be held on Saturday, Feb. 17, at 10 a.m., at the South Kettle Moraine State Forest Headquarters located in Eagle at S91W39091 Hwy 59 (one mile west of Eagle, on Hwy 59).

Zach will discuss the SWRPC's amendments to the Regional Natural Areas and Critical Species Habitat Protection and Management Plan for Southeastern Wisconsin (Planning Report 42). The goal of this plan is to identify the remaining remnant natural communities and prioritize them for protection and management. P.R. 42 was updated in 2010, but no significant updates have been made since. The presentation summarizes

upcoming changes to the plan including designation changes for individual sites and recommendations to manage for climate resilience.

Zach is a senior specialist-biologist at the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission. He earned a Bachelor's in natural resource and environmental sciences and a Master's in plant biology from the University of Illinois Urbana – Champaign in 2009 and 2011 respectively. Prior to his position at the Commission, Zach worked for the Illinois Natural History Survey, private restoration contractors, non-profit conservation organizations, and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

son Peter (1852-1933), who occupied the farm at the time of Magdeline's passing. Peter had a son Martin (1888-1967) who, according to his own obituary, "farmed in the Eden area until retirement in 1944." The concept of the "Martin Braun" farm was verified both by Dave Flood and Dick Guell. Dave explained the Sheep Dip location to a novice. "Well, you know where Martin Braun's farm was?" By Gordon Hass's farm? "That's the same farm. It was just north of there. And then west" in that vicinity. "They had what we called the Sheep Dam. I don't know how that got that name." By the 1950s, that farm was in the hands of Gordon and Leona Hass, and their son Wayne still owns the portion where the Sheep Dip is.

For clarification, both Dave Flood and his sister Mary (Flood) Dwyer reference the Sheep Dip as the "Sheep Dam."

Anne Koenig is a helpful source on the Braun family, because Anne married Mark Koenig, whose mom was Mary "May" Braun Koenig (1905-1993), whose father was John (1870-1938). While John was one of Magdeline's latest births, Peter (who stayed on the farm of the Sheep Dip) was one of her earliest children, born in 1852.

Exact Location

The Sheep Dip is both a location and an activity. Anne's point was Magdeline actually dipped sheep, and that's the Braun family part of the story. All Anne knew was that "for some reason, in that day and age, they had to dip the sheep. They had to grab them and put them in...She was able, with her strength, to sink them down in that water and get them back out...and that's how it got the name Sheep Dip."

This location was discussed with a half dozen people who had first-hand knowledge of Eagle Road between the 1930s and 1950s. Anne said in that era of the 1940s, the land "would of been right south of Cosgrove," which by 1950 was Ray Ryan's farm. The Cosgrove/Ryan farm was on the east

side, and the Braun/Hass farm was on the west side of the road which included the Sheep Dip.

Wayne Hass was gracious to give a tour of the Sheep Dip. The Milwaukee River runs in a westerly fashion in Sections 13 and 14. As it hits Section 14, it continues running west and parallel to the south of Preserve Lane. After the Milwaukee River crosses Eagle Road and into Section 15, it turns more southerly on the Wayne Hass property (Section 22).

The shaping of the water is beautiful. The Milwaukee River naturally forks and creates an island in the stream. Those two streams reconnect again into one Milwaukee River, and at the connection of the united stream is the Sheep Dip.

The Purpose of the Sheep Dip

Here is some background for the Sheep Dip of Eden. First, sheep farming was more popular during the late 1800s, and seems likely that at some point in that century Magdeline Braun was dipping her sheep in to the Milwaukee River. This seems probable because she died in her 80s in 1910, and sheep and cattle dips were common by then. For example, *The Farmer's Veterinarian* (1909), clearly demonstrates how to dip your cattle, and also the threats to sheep. In addition, sheep dips were established already by the mid-1800s in England. It's plausible the Braun family was dipping sheep by the 1880s, if not earlier.

Understand that one did not just dip the sheep in the water. Looking at postcards of sheep dips, one will figure out that they actually form a dam like structure for which the animal walks through because of the pests which needed to be killed.

One of the central threats to sheep was scab. The 1909 text notes, "Scab or itch, sometimes

called mange of cattle, is caused by a minute mite that lives upon the surface of the skin, burrowing into it. Other animals are not attacked by this parasite, although a similar one does afflict sheep," (p.241). The book's cattle dip image accompanies this story. In addition, the book dedicates an image to the common sheep scab.

Killing the scab was not just done by drowning them. The object was to run the sheep through the sheep dip station, which had to have been filled with chemicals that drenched over the wool and killed the pests. The exact brand of chemicals used in Eden, if at all, has yet to be determined.

No one on Eagle Road living can remember the Sheep Dip being used, they just recall it being called the Sheep Dip or Sheep Dam. Agnes Braun Meade (1894-1996) said it was known as the "sheep wash," but Elaine Koenig's writings suggests Agnes wasn't a witness to the washing—but that is not confirmed. This puts the likelihood of sheep dipping to before 1900. Likely, a structure was created where the Milwaukee River reunited after the island, and became three to five feet deep, for which the sheep could run across a manmade trough filled with river water and laced with chemicals. Once done, the waste water could go downstream. As Wayne Hass observed, "It doesn't sound like something that the DNR would approve of today."

Wayne also reached out to Elmer Held, a sheep farmer over in Oakfield. Elmer has Suffolk sheep, and Gordon Hass used to buy sheep from him. Held validated that sheep dips were used for external parasite control. Take for example lice, ticks or scabies. Nowadays there is a portable dip tank that can go around to farmers, and run their sheep through it. This prevents running sheep through a temporary chemical trough in a river.

Flood Memories

Mary Flood Dwyer grew up on Eagle Road, and had many memories fishing at the farm before Gordon Hass took over in the 1950s. Her stories of her parents, Harold and Catherine (Merjay) Flood, are as pleasant as the tone of her voice recollecting the past.

Recall that when looking at Eagle Road, the river runs on both sides. But much of the Flood children's memories seems to be in that vicinity of the Milwaukee River on the west side of the road. "Oh we fished there. David and I fished that a lot."

What did she catch? “Bullheads!” as if it was obvious. How big were they? “All sizes. Good.” Then she motioned ones approaching 10 to 12 inches. “Oh, my grandma loved to eat them. But *IF* we could get them skinned! Ohhhh.” Ahhh yes, bullheads taste so good, but getting the skin off without having the barbed points of the fins hit you is never easy. It doesn’t matter if its 2023 or 1940.

Which grandma ate the bullheads? “My grandma Merjay. My mother’s mother. I think when my grandma was at our house, my mother would fry them for her.”

Mary’s brother Dave seconded good times on the Milwaukee River, noting, “In the summertime, we spent a fair amount of time down there.” He swam, fished bullheads and caught crawfish. “I did catch a sucker...maybe once or twice.” How big? “Not too big. Maybe the size of a good sized perch.” Reflecting on the river on the west side of Eagle Road, Dave said, “I used to spend a lot of time down there. And there was the Sheep Dam down there—we used to go swimming in it.”

Please note Dave and Mary were both interviewed, but not together. Their comments were very helpful and consistent, and provided someone a generation older than Wayne Hass who could validate details on the Sheep Dip. What came from Dave and Mary were pleasant memories on the river in Eden Township.

On Dangers and Depths

There was not an actual dam there in his childhood, Dave said, “But there was a built up area. And it was a deeper place in the river.” He reaffirmed that there was no man made structure of the dam in his memory, it’s the fact that there is a split in the Milwaukee River that creates an island, then it reconnects. And when it reconnects, there’s a larger current or hole. It was in that vicinity where it was deeper than the kids swam.

The Sheep Dam was deeper than the river just upstream. Dave Flood guessed the depth. “Oh, I’d say about four feet.” The water might have been deeper in the 1930s. Dave reminded the depth “would depend a lot on the time of the year. In the spring of the year, you’d have deeper water. And in the late summer, the level would drop.”

Mary continued on her Milwaukee River memories. “Whenever it looked like a storm was coming, Dave and I would go down to the river. It was right at Hass’s house there. Right off the bridge. But we didn’t fish on the bridge, we went down and stood on the grass... And then, we also used to ride a cut-off barrel. A barrel that was like this—cut in half,” she said as she motioned with her hands. “There was a Sheep Dam up that crick. Did you ever hear of the Sheep Dam?” Then Mary answered the question, “I think it was deeper than the stream. I was always afraid of the Sheep Dam.” When asked on depth, she couldn’t guess. “I don’t know. But I was always afraid it was too deep to wade in. I don’t think we ever waded in it, because it was too deep.”

During the research, there was a story told where someone heard a child almost drowned in the river by the Sheep Dip. This could not be substantiated, but Mary’s fears above are noted. In addition, Joan (Cosgrove) Hau did validate that she was told to keep away from the Sheep Dip in the 1930s. “Well, I know it was there and we were never allowed to go near it. I was always under the impression it was very deep.” Then she laughed

lightly. Perhaps our perceptions of danger and depths are different as a child. But her parents forbid her to go there.

One of the neat things about the Sheep Dip is how the story fluctuates. We know Magdeline Braun was one of the first to use the Sheep Dip, but we don’t know the last. The Sheep Dip kept sheep on the farm remarkably clean, yet ironically such chemicals in the river, if they were used, were obviously toxic. The location was perceived by some as a torrent to the stories of old, but quite calm when seen in the present. The Sheep Dam was known to all the kids on that road that connected 45 and Hwy F in the 1930s. Today, the public knows Eagle Road but almost nothing of the Sheep Dip.

Regardless of the contrasting findings, this is one of many places of old Eden which harken to the past. The Sheep Dip is worth remembering because it is not just the old ways of raising sheep and the hard work of settlers, but that of childhoods and simple streams.

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Something About Selina

Ever since December 15, my life has pretty much been on the same track and that is/was spending time with my daughter Selina before she moved to Missoula, Mont.

First it was graduation, then it was Christmas, followed by a 10-day trip to Mississippi where we camped and hunted deer and hogs. Next it was moving her from Stevens Point, a simple going away party and this last week, loading up my truck and 12-foot trailer and moving her to Missoula where she is now a biologist (as of Monday) for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

My run with Selina started back in 2000 and, this week, I am going to write about some of my incredible memories.

When I realized that I was going to be a father, I used to slow dance with Selina's mother and talk to Selina. Sounds crazy, but I did this with regularity.

When Selina was born, she was breached, which meant things became serious during her birth. As soon as she was born, she looked at me and smiled, that is how Selina got the name "Goof," which I use almost daily.

I am an outdoor writer and live off the land as much as possible and this also includes hobby farming on a large scale. By the age of three months, I carried Selina everywhere that I was working such as planting trees, gardening, cattle, firewood,

and I would set her down and have my golden retrievers stay with her.

Without trying, I turned Selina into a person that loves to canoe. When she was two years and four months old, I took her on the Chipewewa flowage in early May. I had purchased a small kids paddle for her and tied her on a rope so that if she fell in, I could pull her back into the canoe. It was cold, Selina fell in the "Big Chip" while paddling and I pulled her back to the canoe. Selina started crying and I figured it was because she was cold. She then told me it was because she had lost her paddle and that was why she was crying. We retrieved the paddle, built a camp, and dried her out.

I was extremely active as a single parent with Selina's schooling. When she started kindergarten, I took her

on her first day, introduced myself to her teacher and from then on, for the next five years, volunteered in her class once a week teaching the kids outdoor stuff.

When the kids were too old for my lessons, I started KAMO. Some of my favorite experiences were being her mentor for spelling bees and speeches as well as DECA which she went to Nationals for as a junior and senior. I would cook supper, Selina would study in her room and then give her presentation to me, she could handle constructive criticism.

Bear hunting. Selina hunted black bear in northern Juneau County at the ages of 10, 13 and 15. When she was 11, we hunted 19 nights and on two occasions we had a huge sow come in with 1.5-year-old cubs which are legal to harvest and do not go

into the den with their mother at that age. The sow was huge and presented very easy shots. Selina passed on her and I agreed with her decision. When Selina was 15, after hundreds of hours running baits and sitting in stands, she harvested a beautiful bear and all was perfect in our world.

When Selina was just starting her freshmen year in high school I set her up at the Necedah National Wildlife Refuge as a volunteer and it soon became known that she could do both manual labor and brain work on the computer. That winter, Selina told me that she was going to become

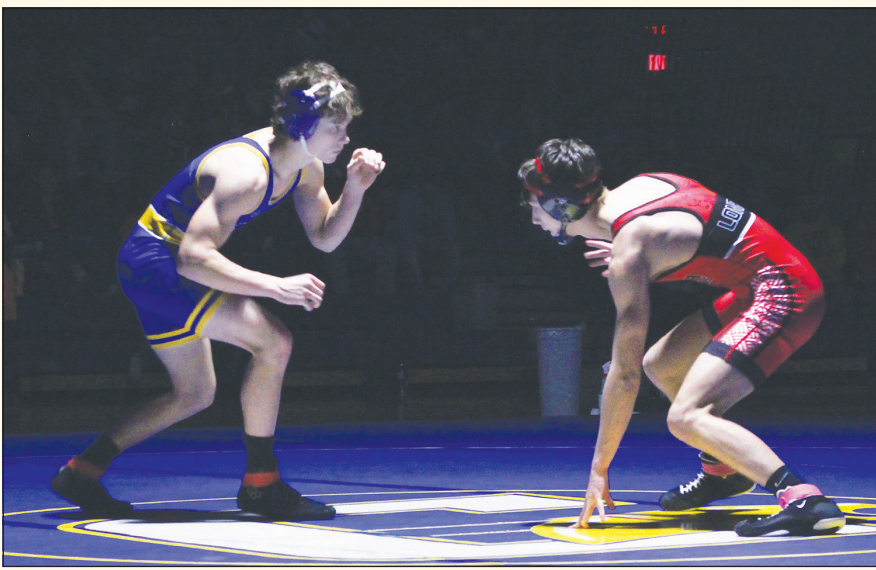

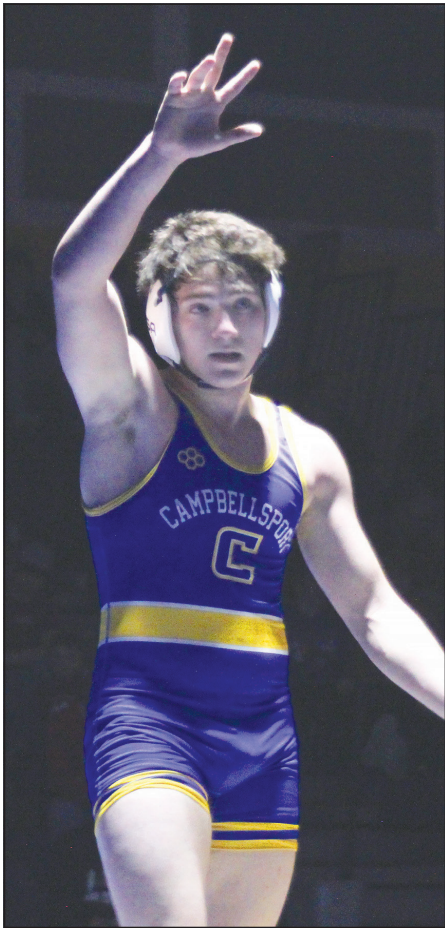
Cougars Down Lomira 32-31 to Run Streak to 226
