

Campbellsport Community Brings Family Home

This is a story when a community works together to do something bigger than themselves.

Our story starts when Joe Wurzelbacher started receiving chemotherapy treatments for pancreatic cancer in Ohio in the early months of

Joe and his wife Katie made the decision to ask Chris Schanen (Katie's dad who was the long time owner of Campbellsport's Ben Franklin store - now the current True Value hardware store) to see if any houses were available in the Campbellsport area.

Joe wanted his family to move back to his wife's hometown to have a support system in place for his wife and their three kids.

One common theme from the family was it isn't a sign of weakness to ask for help, but it is a sign of strength to know when to ask for help.

"I think Joe knew his fight was almost over which made him want us to be settled and supported back in my hometown," said Katie Wurzelbacher.

Schanen reached out to the Campbell-sport Lions Club which connected him with Joel Fleischman at Drexel Building Supply in Campbellsport.

"Hopefully, the contributions of the entire community brought some peace and comfort to the Wurzelbacher family," said Campbellsport Lions Club Treasurer/Secretary Josh Blatz. "The Lions Club organization was grateful to be able to provide some assistance with this project."

Fleischman reached out to the family to tell them that he might have a solution to their hous-

ing needs and wanted to set up a meeting with the family.

The family didn't know what to expect during the meeting, but Fleischman laid out a plan and then said these great words to the Wurzelbacher family, "We are going to build you a house and bring you home to Campbellsport."

Joe and Katie were in shock over the home building project proposal and were speechless after Fleischman presented the initial plan.

"The response from the Campbellsport community was truly humbling," said Katie. "We were facing a very hard reality, but all of these people swooped in to make our life a little easier in our time of need."

The next two weeks after the Drexel meeting were a blur of packing and preparing to move several states away for the family.

Timon Perron Trucking Inc of Campbellsport offered a semi-trailer to move the family possessions from Ohio to Wisconsin to make it easier

on the family.

"Family has deep importance to the Perron team, and we felt it was important to help move the Wurzelbacher family to Campbellsport," said Owner Ike Perron.

On August 16, the 2,048 square foot housing project began under the direction of Drexel Project Manager Todd Cartlon and Roberts Home of Fond du Lac as the main constructor.

The family moved into Immanuel Lutheran Church in Campbellsport on August 19, after Pastor Paul Cerny and his congregation gave their parsonage for the family to live in while Drexel built their house.

The project was a group effort of many local companies which were happy to be a part of this





important housing project.

Geoff Baumhardt Excavating LLC of Campbellsport started excavating the site on August 21.

"It was an honored privilege to be associated with this build," said Baumhardt. "As a small family owned business, we want to give back to the communities we work in."

Samuel Joe Wurzelbacher, "Joe the Plumber", passed away on August 27, succumbing to his cancer which was eight days after reaching his mission of getting his family back to his wife's hometown.

"I believe he felt a great sense of relief and sense of peace that his final mission (goes to back the military background) for his family was complete," said Katie.

The Fabric foundation for the house was laid on August 28. Drexel was excited about the opportunity to try the new Fabric foundation with this housing project.

"We called it the Drexel experiment," said Cartlon.

The house construction continued throughout the next couple of months with Drexel and Roberts Home leading the way.

During the project, Drexel employees noted feeling a higher presence around them, saying, "Not long after [his] Joe's passing, while Joe's phone was in Katie's possession at a different location, Joe's location was pinging over the housing construction site."

One of the other local companies on the project was True North Roofing LLC out of West Bend who did the roofing on the house.

"It was great to be a part of the light that guides and uplifts those in their time of need," said True Roofing Owners Dan Suffern and Doug Adams. "We are building a stronger and compassionate community by working together."

Lucky Penny Carpentry of Fond du Lac was part of the project where Drexel put a special touch on staining the door frames and trim the same as the cabinets and painted the doors white.

The house was complete and ready to be revealed to the family on December 13.

"Joe was with us when we saw the house for the first time upon completion and our first walk through as a family," said Katie.

"Drexel is honored to supply happiness to this special family which came into our working lives," said Carlton.

This housing project was a collaboration between the Campbellsport community in helping complete the mission of bringing the Wurzelbacher family back home.

"I don't think there is enough space in the article to properly acknowledge them all and express my gratitude for everything they have done for my family," said Katie.

The story of Joe and his family won't be the end just because the house is finished, but it is a legacy story which will live on due to the love of family, compassion, helpfulness, and community connections that will have a lasting impact for years to come.

Sketchy Ice

Hello friends.

I have all the right tools to be doing some heavyduty ice camping/fishing this winter and unfortunately keeping good ice has made ice travel (at least coming home alive) a bit of a challenge.

One of my newest toys is the Ion Alpha and mine is with a 10-inch auger. Last winter I used an Ion for the first time and was amazed at how easy and quiet it was to handle. I got an extra battery and have not had to use it and to be perfectly honest, I do not miss my propane auger at all.

Anyways, back to this crazy trip that I went on. Since the ice in the north this winter is pretty sketchy for a snow machine, ATV or pickup truck, I had to pick a spot to camp where I thought I could catch fish and hike in by foot. My hikes would require two round trips and each time I would be pulling two fully loaded Otter sleds. I chose the Trempealeau lakes which is a backwater of the Mississippi River and is literally a sportsman's paradise. I had camped approximately eight years ago and caught several northern pike, including a 40-incher and did well on panfish.

Wednesday, Feb. 1 High 52, Low 30

First, I had good news and that was that there was seven inches of solid ice for what is my favorite sport, and that is camping/fishing on the ice. Naturally, I had my golden retrievers Ruby and Red along and they were as excited as me as we began trek one, which would be about 700 yards pulling maybe 200 pounds.

Both treks went well, and I put out two tip ups for gators and rigged a Finicky Fooler with a large "goldy" for perch. I was over about four feet of water that had a muck bottom. I had two hours of daylight left and lots of work to build camp. I caught one jumbo perch and a little one, no action on the tip ups, and no cares as I had two nights in

paradise and knew I would figure out the fish.

The pups sleep in my Eskimo Fat Fish 4 with me and I have them sleep in an Otter sled, so they stay dry. It was so warm tonight that for maybe the first time ever I did not use my heater.

Thursday, Feb. 2 High 54, Low 31

Today would have been my girlfriend, Michelle Chiaro's, 52nd birthday and my guess is that had she not passed away, she would have been on this trip with me. I was up long before daybreak, it was very foggy and my holes from the day before were not iced over. I did the two tip ups and the Finicky Fooler plan and right away caught a beautiful 28-inch gator which is perfect for boning and eating. It was not long, and I had company and by midmorning, there were eight of us fishing a maybe five-acre area. Three of the guys were using an airboat and everyone was from the area, and we all got along very well.

Fish catching was slow, but I was having a blast as I cooked pork chops in my outdoor kitchen and on occasion talked to my neighbors. The fish were slowly adding up and I knew by the following afternoon something cool would happen. At about 1

I went back to camp and worked on some gear. About 20 minutes later, I was standing at camp




Oliver Luedtke


Meet the FFA Officers










Fun For All Activities

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



The Horticulture & Landscaping students did a majority of the management of the system with some help from the Agriscience B class. Each unit holds 144 lettuce plants, which grow to maturity in 25 days. This is about half of the time of lettuce grown in soil in a fraction of the space as well. The two hydroponics systems produce about six pounds of lettuce each week, which is harvested and used by the KHS cafeteria so that all students can enjoy it at lunchtime. These systems give the students the chance to be a part of the food supply chain right in the classroom.

State Fair Ice Cream Booth







The Campbellsport wrestlers traveled to Kewaskum for the Division 2 WIAA Regional on Saturday and finished second as a team behind first place Kewaskum, thus qualifying them for a trip to team sectionals on Tuesday, Feb. 13. 



Freedom was forced into a three pointer right before the final buzzer which resulted in a defensive rebound for the Indians.


Kewaskum finished the game on a 17-4 run in the final minutes to secure the 52-51 comeback, road victory.
