Washington County Fugitive Apprehended from Mexico Authority

Ingmar Adir Chew Moran, a 52-year-old former Kewaskum resident who had fled to Mexico in 2020 to avoid prosecution on serious sexual assault of a child charges is now in custody in the Washington County Jail. He appeared in front of Washington County Circuit Court Judge Hetzel the morning of March 8 on the outstanding warrant and was given a \$1 million cash bond. He faces 140 years of confinement on charges of Repeated Sexual Assault of a Child and Sexual Assault of a Child Under 16 years of age. Further charges are anticipated in the future involving a second victim.

On December 18, 2020, the Village of Kewaskum Police Department requested assistance from the Washington County Sheriff's Office with the sexual assault investigation that they had been working on. Hours later, investigators conducted a search warrant at Chew's Timblin Drive apartment. It was quickly learned that Chew had fled to Mexico earlier in the day.

Over the next three years, Washington County Sheriff's investigators have worked closely with the FBI, U.S. Department of Justice International Affairs Criminal Division, Washington County District Attorney's Office, Mexican Authorities, and many more to lead us to where we are today.

"The process to obtain approval for Mexico to extradite one of its citizens is a long, arduous, and often frustrating process but in the end, hard work and tenacity paid off in the interest of justice. I was there the night of the search warrant back in 2020 and cannot describe the emotions we all experienced when we learned that Chew had narrowly avoided capture. Naturally, we all doubted whether we would ever see him again. My heart goes out to these victims and am hopeful that they will experience some level of peace knowing he is now back to answer these charges. Based on the high cash bail given, I am confident he will remain in our jail for the remainder of the justice process," said Martin Schulteis, Washington County sheriff.

Chew was taken into custody in Monterrey, Mexico in November of 2023 on these charges and had remained in a prison in Mexico City until last week, Wednesday, when he was flown to Chicago

Kewaskum Grad Earns 500th Victory

Bob Callison has been teaching and coaching others in the sport he loves since his college days. On January 23, he earned his 500th career dual victory as a high school wrestling coach. This win also made his Tullahoma (Tennessee) Wildcats the District champions.

"Two nights later, we wrestled in our Regional championship," said Bob. "Tullahoma High School won 17 matches in a row until the State Finals, where we lost to Soddy-Daisy High School. It was a great dual season."

The Tullahoma Wrestling Club bought a cake and plaque for Bob to celebrate his 500th win. Bob said that was very nice of the organization since 479 of those wins occurred while he was coaching in Arizona.

Bob, a 1985 graduate of Kewaskum High School, began coaching as a college athlete at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse. He coached the West Salem Wrestling Club, also student-taught and was an assistant varsity coach from 1988-1990. After graduating with a Bachelor of

The Man of Murphy's Hill

Charles Murphy (d.1956) is the first Murphy to come to Eden in his lineage, and in regard to the Murphys in the Eden area, one can be confident many descend from this Irish teenager of the 1890s.

Charles married Sarah Jane Daley Murphy (1881-1968) in 1908. Together they had four boys. "So there's John, Leo, James, and Ambrose. Just the four boys," Carol Murphy said. "And they have no other relatives on the Murphy side in the United States." Carol clarified that when it comes to James Murphy, there was "James B.

and James P." Carol married James P. (Leo's son) and labels her husband Jim; James B. Murphy was the son of Charles. The purpose of this story is to shed light on the man who has a hill named after him on Scenic Drive.

Sponsorship out of Ireland

When Charles came to America in 1894, he funneled through Canada where he spent a couple weeks and eventually came down to Fond du Lac. Carol Murphy of Eden has documented Charles's story, and is confident he made the distance from Ireland, Canada and Fond du Lac all within a year. Although the transportation

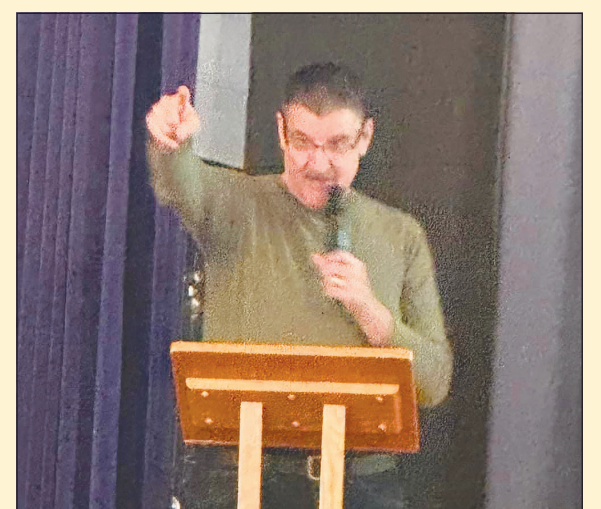

by FBI agents. At that time, he was turned over to the Chicago Police Department. Chew waived extradition to Wisconsin yesterday and was taken into custody by Washington County Sheriff Investigators at the Cook County Jail and returned to Washington County.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office would like to extend its gratitude to

all the partners who assisted in this case. In the interest of the victims, we will not be releasing any further details and ask that their privacy be respected.

According to the directive of the Wisconsin Supreme Court, as found in Supreme Court Rule 20:3.6, Trial Publicity, a charge is merely an accusation, and a defendant is presumed innocent until, and unless, proven guilty.

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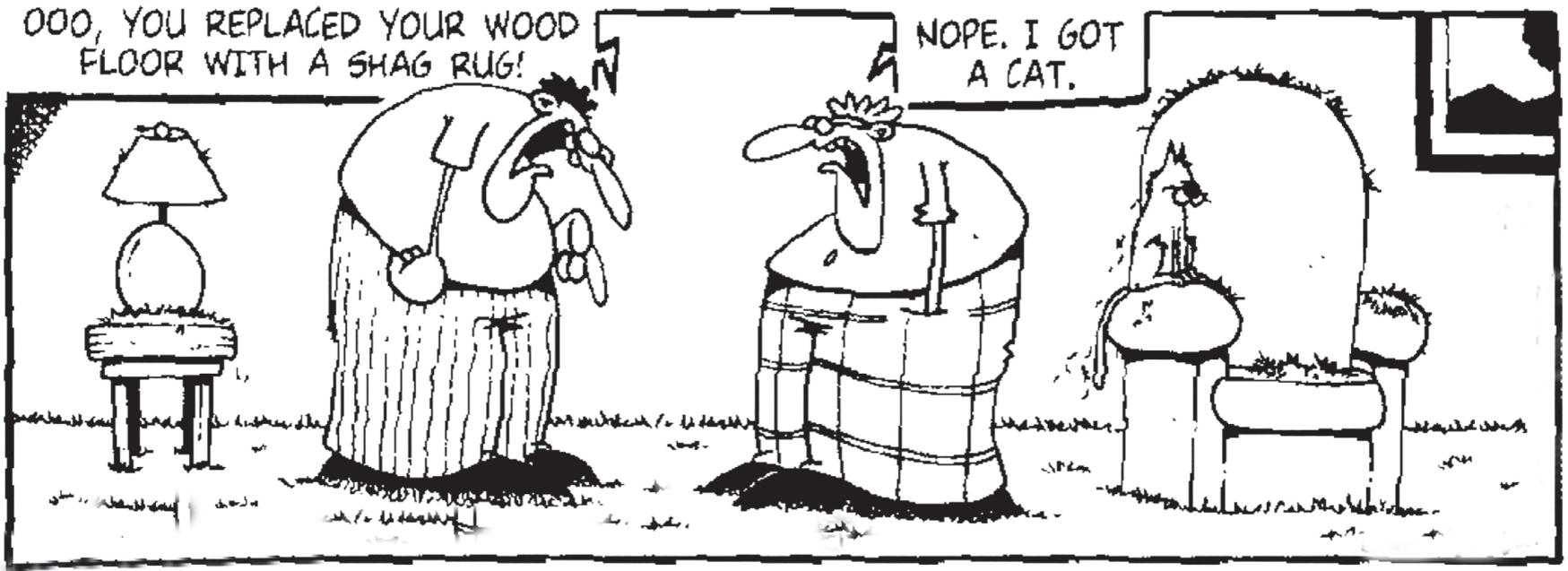
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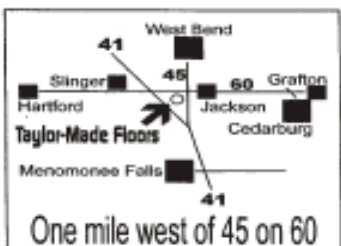

Volunteer at Lizard Mound State Park

On Saturday, March 9, the Farmington Historical Society held a meeting that included a presentation by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) on Lizard Mound State Park, located in the Town of Farmington, which they reacquired from Washington County in 2021. Lizard Mound is a Native American burial ground with 28 effigy mounds.

In 2022, it was announced the DNR would receive a \$290,000 grant from the National Park Service Semiquincentennial Grant Program for making improvements at Lizard Mound. During the presentation, the goals for the park were shared and included preserving mound integri-

ty which means managing woody vegetation and trees, mitigating animal burrows, installing a new entrance sign and gate, conducting a prescribed burn, creating a forest management plan, doing a trail reroute, relocating the well, and updating interpretive displays and signs.

Joe Giesfeldt, deputy superintendent for the Kettle Moraine Forest - Northern Unit, said the grant has a three year cycle and since that three-year deadline is approaching, they are applying for an extension. Bad weather and other unexpected issues have prevented more work from being done previously.

The park is open year round from 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. and is free to the public. The address is 2121 County Highway A in Washington County, about four miles northeast of West Bend.

On farmingtonhistorical.org, educators and parents can find lesson plans aimed at fourth graders for Lizard Mound. The plans are currently under revision, but should be available this spring.

At the end of the presentation, Samantha Ortlieb, a park ranger, shared dates for volunteer stewardship days at the park. Volunteers are invited to come clear woody vegetation which will involve brush cutting and hauling. Tools are provided and it is recommended to bring water, bug spray, good shoes, sun protection, and gloves. The dates for the volunteer days are May 9, June 13, August 8, and September 9 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Science degree in Physical Education/Health Education in 1990, Bob moved to Arizona.

The head coaching job at Cholla Junior High School from 1991-93 in Phoenix was Bob's first position. He then became the assistant varsity coach for Bradshaw Mountain High School from 1994-97 in Prescott Valley. Then came the high school head coaching positions in Arizona; first at McClintock in Tempe from 1997-2000, then Mesquite in Gilbert from 2000-2005, Mountain View in Mesa from 2005-2016, and Casteel in Queen Creek from 2016-2023. This past season was his first at Tullahoma in Tennessee.

There were various reasons why Bob moved on to other positions, but he said the main reason was to improve family life.

"Secondly, it forced me to grow and learn as a person," Bob explained.

In 1995, Bob earned a Master of Arts degree in exercise science from Northern Arizona University.

Bob wrestled all four years at Kewaskum High School. He was a two-time Eastern Wisconsin Conference Champion, a two-time Regional Champion, and a 1984 State qualifier.

"I grew up in foster homes and broken homes so I had a chip on my shoulder," said Bob. "Coach Nell on the first day of the season talked about how wrestling was the greatest sport. I was hooked."

As a 98-pound freshman, wrestling guys his own size appealed to Bob.

Having felt and noticed the impact that Coach John Nell had on his life, Bob wanted to make the same impact on others. So he decided on teaching and being a wrestling coach as his career.

"I was an orphaned kid going through foster homes and he promoted getting a good education and a college degree, the first in my family line," said Bob. "He has made life-changing and probably generations-changing effects in my life."

The man Coach Nell called Bobby was inducted into the Arizona High School Athletic Coaches Hall of Fame in 2018. Bob was notified with a phone call during the school day.

"It was great to get the call," he said. "I called my wife, my mom, and Coach Nell. He flew down for the induction."

Approximately one year ago, representatives from the National Wrestling Hall of Fame showed up at a tournament to tell Bob he was being inducted for Lifetime Service to Wrestling in the Arizona Chapter. That induction took place November 12, 2023. He got chills after being told of the induction, never having thought the sport of wrestling would take him this far.

His inductions mean a lot to Bob...a lasting leg-

acy that his family, wrestling family, and friends can be proud of because they all worked together.

In his speeches, Bob spoke mostly of the great relationships he's had in the sport of wrestling and that building/maintaining relationships is the key to any successful team or organization.

"My greatest relationships are with Coach John Nell; adoptive mom, Maggie Seideman; some of my Kewaskum teammates, especially Rich Straub; my college teammates and coaches; and, of course, the many athletes I have coached along the way," said Bob.

His head coaching position didn't start that great. Bob's first team finished with a 4-19 record.

"I was just surviving at first," said Bob. "I was fortunate to have some mentors who spoke about the positive things they saw in my wrestlers and me as a coach."

He added that he continually tries to make himself better. Even with all of the coaching experience he has, he continually is learning and trying to improve.

What does the Hall of Famer enjoy the most about coaching?

"I am excited to see young men and women accomplish things they thought were not possible," he said. "I enjoy the relationship with wrestlers, coaches, parents, opposing coaches, and wrestling families and friends."

Bob and his wife, Tammy, have been married for 30 years and have four children. Ben and Brennan were each on two State Championship teams. Daughter, Kalie, won a National Cheerleading Championship. Retirement isn't on Bob's radar, but he said the one goal he has is to see 12-year-old Kaiden through the sport of wrestling if he chooses to get on the mat.

Bob gets back to Kewaskum occasionally as he always likes going back to his roots. The last time was in January 2023. His Casteel team was go-

ing to wrestle at the Cheesehead Invitational in Kaukauna. Bob thanks Coach Scott Rhoads and AD Jason Piittmann for allowing his team to practice at KHS.

"My name is up in the room, so it was great for my athletes to see that I left a legacy back there, although many wrestlers have come through there who have shattered the small achievements I made as an athlete," said Bob.

He added, "Oddly enough Braedon Scoles' dad and I were college teammates and roommates at UWL."

Bob said Kewaskum was a great place to grow up. He has some great memories of wrestling both in high school and college. Coach Nell, who also taught phy ed, health, and driver's education, was Bob's favorite teacher at KHS.

"I could talk to him about everything," said Bob. Mrs. Martin's single living class was the best class Bob had because he learned to cook, sew, and iron; things Bob said were essential as he moved through college and life.

Bob also ran track and was in the Letterman's Club at KHS. He loved going to the A&W Root Beer stand.

When he gets the chance these days, Bob enjoys hiking, camping, and fishing.

Bob, Tammy, and Kaiden live in Tullahoma, Tenn. The couple's other three children live in Arizona. Ben, his wife, Monique, and their daughter live in Mesa. Brennan and Kalie live in Gilbert. Bob has family in this area as his adoptive mom, Maggie Seideman, lives in West Bend; Brian Seideman lives in Campbellsport; and Debi (Seideman) Cross lives in Chicago.

In 2011, Bob was awarded a Kewaskum High School Alumni Achievement Award.

"It is one of the few awards I put up in my office," said Bob. "It helps remind me of where I am from. The kid that grew up there continues to push forward. I am always proud to say I grew up in Kewaskum. It is my hometown."

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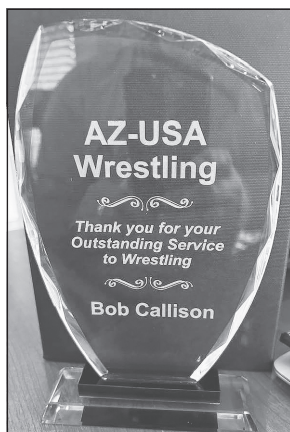

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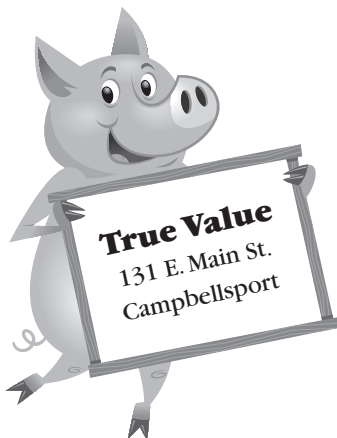
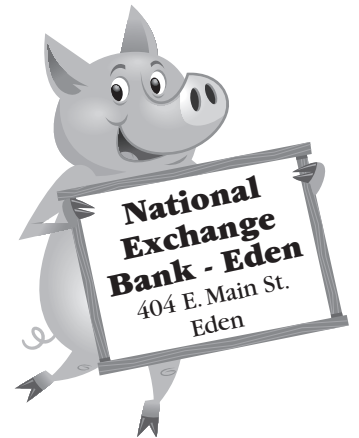

wasn't that long, there is the consideration for the communication required to make the immigration happen.

When Charles Murphy came to the Fond du Lac area, somebody covered his \$75 in the form of a sponsorship.

This is where the work of Dorothy LaPlant Murphy and Mildred Kraus Murphy come into play. Dorothy married Ambrose Murphy, and Millie married James B. Murphy. Dorothy and Millie created a family history, *From Erin to Eden*, documenting Charles and Sarah Murphy's history. This book is very helpful in filling in some gaps on what was known about Charles and Sarah. Carol Murphy credits Dorothy, a former teacher, for physically typing the book, but please note both Dorothy and Mildred helped in making the family history possible. (When Dorothy is cited in this piece, it is from her writings in this family history).

Dorothy wrote, "And so it happened that 16-year-old Charles Murphy came to the United States. He was the eldest of six children born to Mary Connelly and Thomas John Murphy. The Murphys lived in County Tyrone—now part of Northern Ireland—and were desperately poor. They knew a Thomas Kelly who had emigrated in the 1870s and asked him to sponsor Charles. It was no doubt a hard decision to make, but when Kelly agreed, Charles left home, family, and friends, and started out on a jour-

ney which would take him to Eden, Wisconsin. He never returned to Ireland."

The arrangement sounded somewhat like an indentured servitude that existed at Jamestown in Virginia in the 1610s, when those who came to America were indebted to work for those who covered the cost of the journey to America. However, Carol reaffirmed the term "sponsorship" was used to describe the financial expectation.

Dorothy wrote, "We know very little about his passage across the Atlantic, save that it was a voyage of six to eight weeks. We know he entered the United States through Canada, most likely Quebec, saying he was 18. How he reached Fond du Lac, we do not know. He arrived in the evening and walked to the Kelly home near Fond du Lac. Mrs. Kelly remarked that they had waited for weeks for the boy from Ireland. Kelly made Charles work very hard—making wood and hauling it to Fond du Lac. The work was hard and the hours long, but Charles remained with Kelly till his fare was repaid. Then he worked at various places in the city..."

In regard to the sponsorship by Kelly, Dorothy's family history said Charles's entry was 1894. This means that Charles came to the United States in the 1890s after the effects of the Panic of 1893. If Charles was really born in 1878, then he would have been 16, as many agree that Charles wasn't 18 when

he arrived in Wisconsin. The above suggests that Charles had it tough on the sponsorship deal. In defense of Mr. Kelly, this was the deal he risked in investing in an Irishman (a wonder how a payment was transferred), and during an economic recession. In addition, what was the process to get an official sponsorship to make Charles's move possible? Even if Murphy arrived when the U.S. was coming out of the economic recession, Mr. Kelly likely still would have had to have been fiscally astute on the risks he was taking. The Murphy history did not allude to where Mr. Kelly, was—except for outside of Fond du Lac.

There is a "Thos. Kelly" in Section 17 of Empire Township to the east of Reinzi Cemetery in the 1890s plat map. This is within reason what people would say is 'near Fond du lac.' Also, that section aligns with being reasonably close to future jobs of Charles Murphy at Lake DeNeve. Also, because of the hard times in the early 1890s, it would make sense that Thomas could have owned a large parcel of land (at least 120 acres in 1893) for which Charles got wood from.

Around Fond du Lac

When Charles paid off his fair for sponsorship, he was a young man. Carol is not certain on Charles Murphy's birth year, "He lied about his birthdate because he was either 14 or 17." He may have said he was 18 to suggest he was of age to come to America, depending on how regulated that was in the ports of Ireland or Canada. Carol said the birth certificate had some Gaelic on it and claims a birth of 1877. Charles's monument at



St. Mary's Cemetery in Eden says he was born in 1878. "The Murphys were dirt poor," Carol said. So Charles left Ireland and took the risk he took in coming to America.

Once Charles paid off his fare, according to Dorothy's writings, "Then he worked at various places in the city—among them a shoe shop and Kaufman's Meat Market, always sending money to his folks in Ireland. Often orders were delivered to the customer's homes. Sometimes the butcher would assure a customer that his order was on the way when it hadn't even been cut. Of course the delivery boy—Charles—would feel the customer's wrath for being late."

Dorothy also wrote, "Charles found discrimination against the Irish too. Signs would read 'Help Wanted' No Irish Need Apply. Carol elaborated on that family history. There is a story where Charles "went to G & L [Giddings & Lewis], and it said, 'No Irishmen Need Apply.'" It was one just many stories of anti-Irish bigotry rampant in the late 1800s. Often the signs simplified the sentence to "N.I.N.A.," as the hatred was so normalized it became an acronym. "And that was the way he found the United States," Carol said. "'No Irishmen Need Apply.' Welcome?"

What was Charles's feelings on the Ireland he left versus what he experienced in the new city that he found? "He came to Fond du Lac. He worked for a guy butchering meat in Fond du Lac. And he wanted to get a better job so he could buy a farm," Carol said. He eventually came to Eden Township, but the process from landing in



Carol Murphy was a nurse at St. Agnes hospital for 52 years. And while acquiring family history information, she took this picture to Marcella "Sally" Reilly Williams (1922-1998). Sally's job at St. Agnes was to collect the money daily for those to watch television, for back then it was a dollar a day to watch it. Sally was one of the Reilly 17, and was immensely helpful in verifying the Reillys, Murphys and Irene Vandergrinten.

The following is how Carol's research was comprised in Dorothy LaPlant's writings, "The William Reilly and Charles Murphy families were close friends. This picture of the two families was probably taken on a Sunday gathering about 1921 at the Reilly farm. Pictured from left to right are Lillian Reilly, Irene Van der Grinten, Coletta Reilly Abhold, William Reilly [holding Coletta], Emmett Reilly [in front of his father], Mrs. Kit Reilly holding Donald Reilly, James B. Murphy, Leo Murphy, Charles Murphy holding Ambrose Murphy, George Reilly [in front of Charles], John Reilly, Sarah Murphy, Helen Reilly Gaffney, Leo Reilly, Mary Reilly Barnes, John Murphy [off to side by himself]."

Irene Vander Grinten (holding Lillian) was helping take care of the Reilly Children. There was a lot of Vander Grintens, as it was another big family in South Eden.

There is another photo that goes with this image. One is that of George Reilly (b.1913) and Leo Murphy (b.1914). This helps identify two of the children in this larger photo of the two families. Because of that separate photo of the two, it validates in the group photo George Reilly is actually in front of Charles Murphy, and next to Leo Murphy who was a similar height. Because Charles is holding Ambrose (b.1920), then the picture was taken in the early 1920s. Coletta Reilly (Abhold) was the 10th Reilly child born in 1921 on May 4. Because Sally identified her father holding Coletta, the picture is likely taken around the fall of 1921 or the spring of 1922. Sally was the 11th Reilly born in May of 1922, so it's possible Kit is pregnant with Sally in this picture. Understand that there are only nine Reillys in the picture, because Sally wasn't born and Lawrence, the oldest, was institutionalized. Sally's description to Carol matches because Lawrence was no longer living at home, and John Murphy—the oldest Murphy boy, would be older than 10. **SUBMITTED**

Fond du lac to owning a farm in Eden took at least 15 years.

Dorothy wrote that from the butcher shop, Charles moved into farming. "In the early 1900s, the DeNeve family operated a dairy farm and resort on Lake DeNeve. There were cottages on the lake and people from various cities would come and spend the summer there. One popular sport was sailing on Lake Winnebago. An interesting story is told of a boat being blown across the lake to High Cliff where a cache of furs was discovered in a cave, probably left by Indians or trappers."

In regard to DeNeve,

Dorothy explained, "Charles became manager of the farm. The DeNeves were good employers, but Charles' dream was to own land (probably because of his family's experience in Ireland). So when the opportunity to buy 86 acres in South Eden arrived, he left their employ and bought 'the old place.'"

The Old Place

According to family history written by Dorothy LaPlant Murphy, "The marriage ceremony was performed in the home of the Rev. Taugher in Fond du Lac....This was due to the fact that St. Jo-

seph's Church had burned on the 'Night that the Churches Burned'—September 25, 1908. On that night St. Peter's Lutheran Church, the Congregational Church and the Grant School all burned. After a wedding breakfast the couple boarded a train for a honeymoon in Chicago. Upon their return they resided for a year on the Nick Goebel [sp?] farm on Lake DeNeve, then moved to the farm in South Eden."

Dorothy's writings suggest they were in Lake DeNeve for about one year before they moved to the old place. "Four boys were born at the 'old place' — John, August 8, 1911; Leo, August 13, 1914; James, February 15, 1917; and Ambrose, October 17, 1920." In addition, "The farm was hilly and stoney, but not unlike Ireland. There was a large frame house," that had a wing on it, and "a cistern to catch rainwater, a stone granary, and a log barn." A passed down photo from 1910 labels the original farm "the old place."

Dorothy also wrote, "When the adjoining farms was acquired in 1924, the family moved just over the hill from the 'old place.'" The new "location was more favorable for travel. One of the previous owners had painted the picture of a World War I nurse on the upstairs wall. It remained there till the room was remodeled in 1953. In 1946, Charles and Sarah moved to the Lloyd farm on Hwy K, living there briefly with their son James and then moving to the Village of Eden to retire."

Mother Missed

There are many rea-

sons why Charles's story was hard. Perhaps the most difficult was that he never got to see his mother again. We know Charles stayed in contact with his family and wrote letters and sent home money.

"Grandpa Charley wanted to go back to see his mother, and he never got back," Carol said. The whole story is rather sad. "You know: 14 year boy...he didn't have enough money." The poor kid, literally and figuratively, came over here by himself. "But he always wanted to see his mother one more time, and never did." It's something hard to comprehend, many of our ancestors lived in South Eden their whole lives, yet ironically descended from people who risked it all to leave the mother country. They did the unthinkable, in that they left their homeland. Many of our grandparent's and great grandparent's lives were centered on location in Eden Township, when in fact a previous generation made the big leap over the ocean from the Island.

Carol reflected on the perspective for an Irish mother to have to let a son go. She spoke like a short poem, and the periods which follow are only for when she paused. "A young fella. Sent a child by himself. To another land. On the boat."

In regard to her husband Jim, when he

asked Grandpa Charles, "Can you tell me about Ireland?" Charles's typical response was, "I'm an American now. I don't want to talk about the old country."

Besides that it was painful to reflect on what was left in Ireland, Charles normalized into the United States in an time of political fears over "hyphenated Americans," a term common in the Teddy Roosevelt era of the early 1900s, which coincides with Charles's acclamation to South Eden. The stories Carol has preserved matches the concerns an Irishman would have trying to fit in to a largely Protestant America who at the time despised Roman Catholics. In addition, the rejection of Irish he saw in the early 1890s on his arrival likely stuck with him, and made him more aware of what he said publicly and to others.

Different Type of Irish

The Irish in Eden settled by the 1850s, around the time the first log Catholic church was built on a hill on today's Scenic Drive west of its intersection with Timberlane Drive. In the early 1900s, Charles Murphy would eventually purchase the farm that included that hill. This first church, the predecessor to St. James (1865-1971), is described as being on "Murphy's Hill." This is true, but with qualification that the log cabin church on the Murphy farm existed before it was a Murphy farm, and was not yet Murphy's Hill. Charles Murphy does not own land in South Eden on the 1910 Fond du Lac plat map of Eden Township; but he owns 160 acres by the time the 1929 (about) plat map comes out. By the 1910s, Charles started to buy the land in Eden. Then in the 1920s, Charles enlarged his parcel to include more to the west of "the old place."

Murphy family is unique in that the family wasn't a first generation Irish in Eden. Many other families had been established in Eden Township and South Eden particularly already for 30 to 40 years by the time Charles arrived in the Fond du Lac area. Charles didn't even own land in Eden until

a half century after the Irish arrived in South Eden.

Contrasting families with longer South Eden lineage would include the Ryans and Floods. James Flood and son Christopher were well established by the 1850s. So too were Patrick and Rosa (Cahill) Ryan, whose descendants include not only the Ryans, but also Timblin and McEvoy families. There are many other families whose roots go back to the 1850s South Eden. Charles Murphy's is not one of them.

Questions for Charles Murphy

Charles passed in 1956, and his travels from Ireland to Eden leave many questions. One that came about was in regard to relating to other families in the area. What was the Reilly family for Charles? Because Charles had no Irish family in America, who did he depend on for comfort fitting in to his new community? There is a picture of William Reilly's family spending time with Charles Murphy's family, around the 1920s. This image is an important picture to preserve for South Eden posterity. The Reilly's had been here longer. However, the Reillys weren't in Eden since statehood either. Perhaps their late arrival compared to other Irish around South Eden was a connection the two families shared. Clearly based on pictures surviving in Dorothy, Millie and Carol Murphy's collections, the Reillys and Murphys were very close in early to mid-1900s South Eden.

In addition, why did Charles hide his comments on the old country? Not all Irish did this. For example, William A. Titus wrote in *Echoes from Old Eden* (1948) how Billy Beirne (who lived west of what is know at this time as Hickory Heights) wailed on the English and how much he disliked the world power that controlled his ancestors. Beirne "berated England on every occasion" (p.20). Carol Murphy argues that Charles Murphy wasn't that type. However, recognize that Charles might have been more impacted by World War I. What would it be like

to be Irish, and oppose the English? Such opposition is a big deal within the United States in WWI who was siding with the British. Indeed, while the U.S. sided with Britain in 1917, the Irish were ready to split from their mother country. It would be interesting to ask Charles to explain how the Great War helped censor his opinions, or if they did. This might explain why Charles conversations with the younger Jim Murphy (grandson) focused on being an American, rather than Irish.

Charles Murphy's story is one of perseverance. He came with nothing, Carol Murphy said, "Then he worked and saved his money and bought a farm. So it worked out and he worked hard." When Charles died, his four boys were on four different farms in the township he had settled. His story included being rejected for work at G & L in the 1890s because he was

Irish. Carol commented on her husband Jim, Charley's grandson, "And I always said that it was so ironic that Jim ended up working there. When he [Charles] applied, it said 'No Irish Need Apply.'" Jim worked at G & L over three decades, while also farming the land that was his father Leo's. Perhaps it was ironic or coincidental, but it's also very telling the acceptance of the Irish the grandson had which the grandfather did not.

There is one last question in regard to Charles Murphy. Here an Irish boy, who came to America through Canada by himself, has a hill in his honor in Eden Township. Older Eden Township residents still call the hill west of the intersection of Scenic and Timberlane Drive "Murphy's Hill." What would his mother and father conclude on the decision of their Charles to risk it all for a chance in the United States?
