Kewaskum School Board Approves New Elementary ELA Curriculum

On Thursday, March 14, the Kewaskum Board of Education heard a presentation on the options for new elementary ELA (english language arts) curriculum. Inconsistency, need for modification and Act 20 requirements were some of the reasons there needed to be new curriculum. After trial runs with three different programs, it was recommended the board approve the 4K-5 Amplify CKLA (Core Knowledge Language Arts) program. Based on current enrollment, the cost is \$232,954.64, but there is an up to 50% grant reimbursement offer. The board approved the adoption of the new CKLA curriculum.

Board Matters:

- The KHS wrestling team, Battle of the Books winners (Amazing Bookworms, Awesomely Cool Book Nerds, The Page Turners), and Caleb Finger and Ephraim Essinger of the ski team were recognized for their accomplishments.
- Kevin Bryant has been hired as the new high school principal.
- District Administrator Mark Bazata is working to change the look of the Board of Education page on the school district website, to include individual photos and info on members. Bazata also presented six options for a new school district seal. Each one included a mortarboard, talaria, light-bulb and book, and scale. Jim Leister wondered if there could be symbolism included to represent the community or areas within the school district.
- Summer school will run from June 10 through

Republican Legislators Seek to Change the State Constitution

Wisconsin's primary election will be held on Tuesday, April 2. In addition to the primary races for President and other state/local officials, voters will also be asked to vote on two amendments to the state constitution.

According to Ballotpedia, in Wisconsin there are two ways to amend the state constitution. The first way is for the legislature to pass the suggested amendment by a simple majority in two consecutive legislative sessions. The proposed amendment is then placed on the ballot for the voters to either support or deny. The second method to add an amendment to the state constitution is through a constitutional convention, where a simple majority of both the assembly and the senate decides to hold a convention, and then any suggested amendments are then voted on in an election. In some states, the citizens of the state can request a proposed amendment be placed on the ballot, but citizens in Wisconsin do not have this power.

The two proposed amendments deal with questions concerning the 2020 election, which was conducted during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. Many polling offices were concerned about voter safety and requested additional funding to cover the cost of sanitation measures for in-person voting and dealing with what was anticipated to be a large number of mail-in ballots. Mail-in ballots required a larger than normal cost of duplicating costs, postage and staff to count them in a timely manner. The funding that was ultimately secured was only 1/10th of

what was requested. With the government not able to provide the necessary funds to protect the voters right to vote, the private sector stepped in with grants. Communities could request grants to defray the additional expenses of conducting an election during the pandemic and 2,500 grants were dispersed across the country to every community that requested one. The amounts of the grants were based on community population. The grants were administered through a not-for-profit organization called the Center for Tech and Civil Life. A large donation from Facebook owner Mark Zuckerberg helped fund the grants.

The goal of the grants was to help reach voters with important information about voter registration, mail-in voting, early voting, polling locations and increase voter turnout despite the pandemic. Wisconsin communities received over \$10 million in grants, including \$5,000 each for the communities of Kekoskee and Iron Ridge in Dodge County, \$77,491 for Fond du Lac communities and \$78,022 for Waukesha.

Some Republicans believe that the grants only encouraged and helped Democratic communities. As the conservative group Wisconsin Institute for Liberty and Law stated, "The concerns that have been expressed regarding Mark Zuckerberg's extensive funding of election administration in Democratic-leaning communities already parallels the worries that would emerge if a donor with right-leaning inclinations were to direct their resources exclusively toward Republican leaning areas." However, grants

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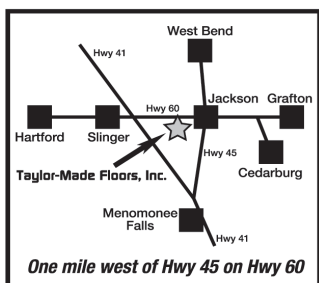
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Homeschool Performing Arts Club Presents 'The Princess Who Has No Name'

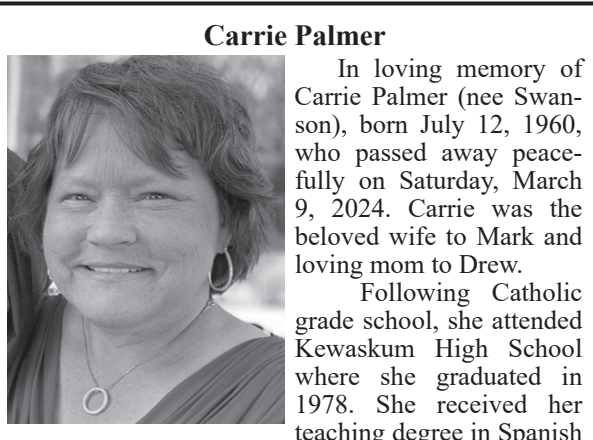
July 3. Registration begins on April 8. There are 13 new classes being added this summer.

were awarded to all communities that requested them, regardless of political leanings, and several Republican strongholds like Dodge County and Waukesha County received grants. In addition, studies did not indicate an increase in voter turnout in communities that obtained grants over those that did not request grants.

Question one of the proposed amendments would make it illegal for any non-government funds or equipment to be used in any election. If adequate government funding of elections occurs, there would be no need for any non-government funding. However, who can say whether or not a situation such as what occurred in 2020 of a sharp increase in the need for funding and inadequate government funding might again occur. Had com-

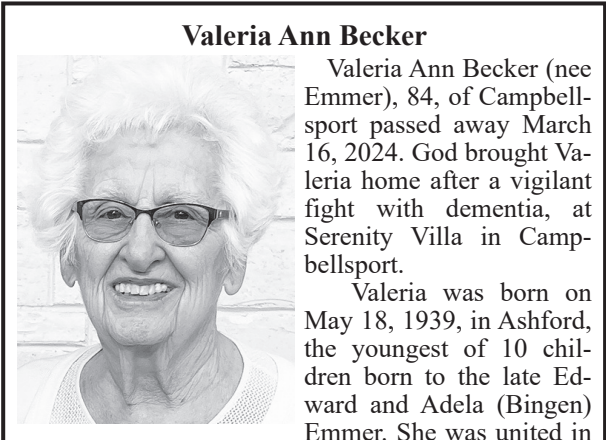

munities not had the additional grant funding in place, there likely would have been long lines at the polls, which discourages voters, and long delays in counting mail-in ballots, which creates uncertainty. Also, the wording of this amendment is vague. What constitutes funding used in an election? Would groups offering free rides to the polls be considered election funding and no longer be legal?

Question two of the proposed amendments states that only officially designated election officials may perform tasks in conducting an election. Election officials, commonly referred to as poll workers, serve as inspectors, registration officials, greeters and tabulators. Poll workers must be a resident of the community, be eligible to vote and not be a candidate for any office to be voted on

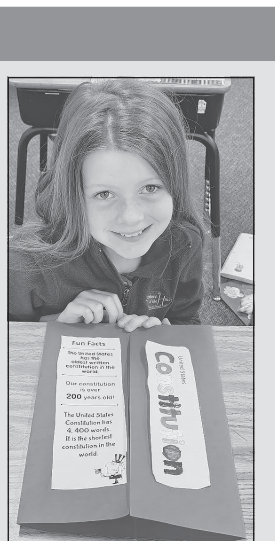

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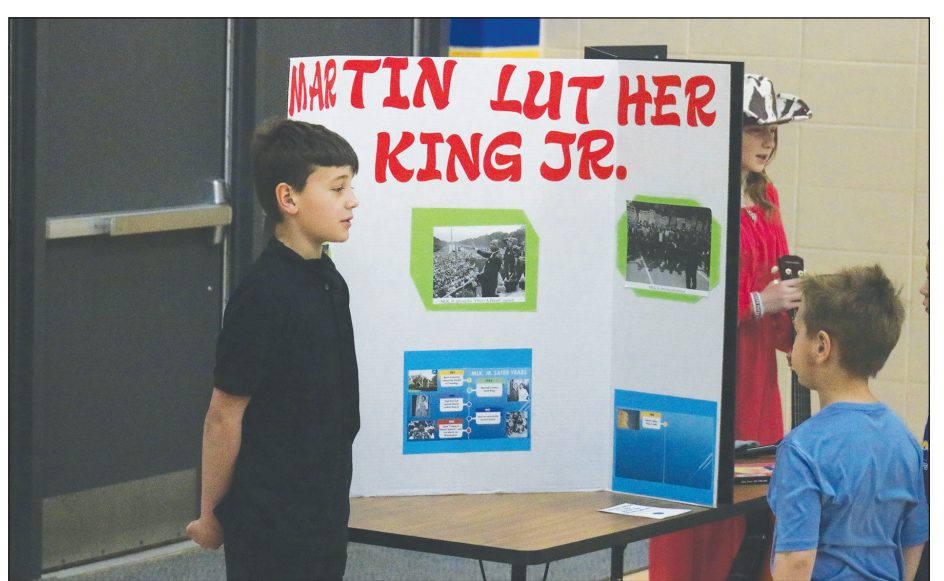

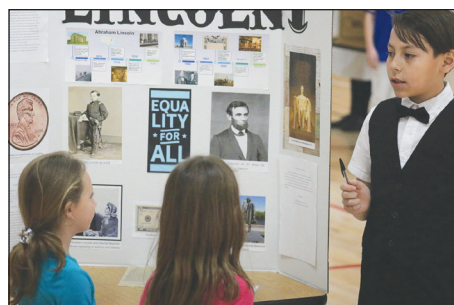


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Little Bay de Noc Winter/Summer Camping and Fishing Trip

My last trip was very physical, dangerous and an absolute blast. Every March, Jeff Moll, Doug Cibulka (lifelong buddies) and myself camp on Chequamegon Bay on the ice at Ashland. There was no ice on that part of Lake Superior, so we moved our operation to Little Bay de Noc (LBDN) which is the top end of Green Bay on Lake Michigan. As you will find out, there was never a dull moment as we did our best to catch fish and laugh a lot.

Saturday, March 9

High 35, Low 20

First challenge, find ice, not open water to begin our hike to pull our gear for a 48-hour fishing and camping trip. That goal was met on the east shore of LBDN at Vagabond Resort. A very nice place to check out and with just enough ice to start our journey. The journey which was a combination of pulling two canoes and five Otter Sleds loaded to the hilt would require us to use electronics, a map, and common sense to find what we hoped would be fishable water over what was seven inches of ice.

We chose the west side of Center Reef which was a solid two-mile trek and incredibly physical. Second challenge, a north wind of sustained 20 miles per hour with gusts much stronger blew in lake effect snow from nearby Lake Superior and it was nasty with a capital N. We each put out three tip ups and went to work setting up two Eskimo ice shacks and rigging them with propane lights, heat, and a kitchen, along with three cots which my pups Ruby and Red (who is probably pregnant) really enjoyed once we laid sleeping bags on them.

The flags were popping and there was a northern pike bite taking place with beautiful gators being caught. Just after we got the worst of our chores done, one of our guys fell on the powdery, snow covered ice and sustained a major injury that may affect his ability to run high hurdles, climb rock walls, and maybe even drag deer for The Red Brush Gang.

We cooked great food, caught lots of gators, but no walleye, and witnessed Mother Nature mad as heck at something as she beat the snot out of our camp and each of us when we went outside.

Sunday, March 10

High 36, Low 22

We had a new dilemma as soon as we woke up this morning. Be-

cause we had drilled three holes in our kitchen shack to fish out of and due to deep snow building against our shacks/floors flooded. This meant we had to do the miserable job of moving our camp that was soon in 10 inches of water. Slippery when wet would be the best description of our task.

All day today the gators were biting well, and I was winning our gator bet with a 34.5 when Mr. Moll got extremely lucky and caught a 35.5. As hard as it was to act out, I was happy for him. At about four, my buddy Doug Cibulka caught a 20-inch walleye and that made us very happy. At about six, the wind slowed down a bit, our mood was excellent and, whamo, I got a flag and caught a 22.5 inch walleye. The entire night we were believers in more walleye, but it did not happen.

The next morning we had the horrible job of breaking camp and then dragging our loads back to shore. The sun was softening the ice and nothing wanted to drag with ease, not to mention that we were done in. When we got 100 yards from shore, which was two full hours of Death Drag, it was open water for the last 30 to 80 feet. We had hip boots, chest waders, and canoes and, as always, made it home safe, sound and somewhat beat up.

Climate change and lifelong buddies can beat a guy up!

A Trip to Remember

This week's column is all over the map: good, bad, danger and sad! I have to be very vague to fit it all in!

Saturday, February 24

High 40, Low 26

The pups and I arrived in Kipling,

Michigan, which is the north end of Little Bay de Noc (LBDN) just as day became night. We actually arrived with a snowmobile in tow and were coming from another trip. There was not enough daylight to head out on the ice and so two golden retrievers, both in heat, and their papa slept in the cab of my truck.

Sunday, February 25

High 44, Low 30

Here is where crazy sets in. The landing I wanted to use had too much open water and so I had to change my plan. I would be pulling four sleds with my Polaris "Classic." I figured I would have to travel about three miles to get to where I wanted to live, fish and camp for the next three nights. First challenge, jumping an expansion crack while pulling four sleds, today it was easy. Next, I had traveled maybe two miles when I came to open water. I stopped, let the dogs have a break and went around what was maybe an acre of water in the middle of a sea of ice.

I went by a camp of pop-up shacks, and they would end up being about 800-yards from where I decided to make my camp which is where three rivers come into the north end of LBDN. There was open water 100-yards from camp, and I put out three tip ups and started the job of building camp with my Eskimo shack as my base. At noon, I had a flag, and it was fish on, and it was a good one, after a ten-minute battle my line went limp.

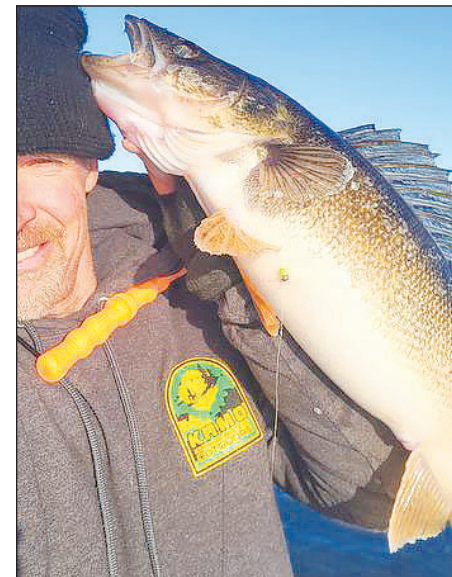
Towards dark, I pulled a tip up and started jigging in my shack with a Buckshot Jigging Spoon tipped with a minnow. After a bit, I had a hit and landed a 19-inch walleye. That made me very happy.

No more action and at about 9:00 I could hear an airboat. It was being launched from shore, came across some open water with red and blue lights on, I knew this was not good. The boat was well lit, kind of like a carp shooters boat and when it pulled up it had Masonville Fire Department on it. There were several people in it, and I was asked if I was the one that went through the ice. I told them I was on good ice and was fine.

I watched as this rig and another coming from my southwest approached the open water I had driven

around. Then I watched what was a rescue operation of two airboats trying to help people in the water. I figured/hoped all was well as they went back and forth to shore several times. This experience was very much a bummer to witness!

Monday, February 26

High 51, Low 29

I had a light go off on one of my tip ups at 5:30, the fight was awesome and was I ever surprised when I caught a beautiful rainbow trout. I went back to the shack; it was still dark, and I figured I might as well jig. I was working a Buckshot Jigging Spoon and it got smacked really hard. The fight was on and it was a challenge, low and behold I caught a 29-inch walleye.

An hour later it is light out and my daughter Selina calls me from Missoula, Montana, and I get a flag where I caught the trout. I put Selina on speaker phone, and it is fight on as I was spooled in no time. I talked Selina through the whole experience and holy moly I caught another 29-inch walleye.

By 10:00 a.m., I was getting nervous about last night's experience and the expansion crack I would have to jump. I broke camp and headed back to my truck, the crack expanded, and I was scared to jump it with four sleds in tow. I made the jump, was electrified with relief, looked behind me and saw that my rope had broken and three sleds were on the other side of the crack.

Everything worked out until I went to a local sport and found out some really bad news. A snowmobile and a utv and occupants went into the open water and one of the fisher-

men did not survive.

Heckendorf Earns First Team All-Conference

As the winter sports season comes to a close, a former high school basketball player from the Washington County area finished off a stellar season on the hardwood closing out her collegiate basketball career. Jordyn Heckendorf, a native of Kewaskum, and graduate of Kettle Moraine Lutheran High School (2020), added more accolades to her repertoire. The senior point guard for the Martin Luther College Knights, earned First Team All-Conference honors in the Upper Midwest Athletic Conference (UMAC) which is a member within NCAA Division III Athletics. The UMAC consists of eight teams within central Minnesota and northern Wisconsin.



Heckendorf paced the offense for the Knights averaging a team high 12.4 points per game which was seventh in the UMAC. On the season, Heckendorf visited the free throw line 86 times where she connected on 72-86 from the charity strip for a team best 83.7% finishing second in the UMAC. The point guard's vision for the

court was displayed as she led the conference with 83 assists averaging 3.2 assists per game. Despite being a 5'5" guard, Heckendorf was also the third leading rebounder on the team and placed top 15 in the UMAC grabbing 117 rebounds averaging 4.7 per game. On defense, the guard poised

nightmares for opponents ranking fifth in the conference with 53 total steals. Rest was a rare occasion for Heckendorf as she logged 824 minutes in 25 games averaging a team high 33 minutes per game placing second in the UMAC.

Scoring wise, Heckendorf notched double figures in 18-

25 games including a stretch of nine consecutive games with 10 points or more. The senior was instrumental in leading the Knights to a six-game winning streak, their longest since 2011-12. During the winning streak, the Knights recorded their first win since 2016 over conference foes Bethany Lutheran College and University of Minnesota-Morris. In her final two games of her career, Heckendorf combined for 46 points (23,21) and eight assists, permanently cementing her name in the Martin Luther College record

books, despite a shortened 12-game season in 2020-21 due to COVID-19. Heckendorf now sits fifth in all-time career points with 960 and fourth in all-time career assists with 260.

Heckendorf concludes her college basketball career as a three-time All-Conference UMAC player. Head Coach Dan Gawrisch acknowledged Heckendorf's contributions to the team by saying, "Jordyn's pursuit of excellence has impacted and will continue to impact this program in significant ways."
