County Task Force on UW-Extension Issues Group's Results

Josh Schoemann, Washington County executive, commissioned a task force earlier this year to address the role of UW Extension programing in the county and review how best to meet the changing needs of our local community. The task force was chaired by Washington County Supervisor Carroll Merry and included representatives from the ag community, the non-profit community, and supervisors serving on the Washington County Land Use and Planning Committee.

After holding five meetings from February through April, the task force sent its findings and recommendations to County Executive Schoemann, including:

- UW Extension services historically provided in the community have changed and Extension educators are not being used as they once were;
- UW Extension programming has redundancy in the community;
- 4-H continues to hold great value in the community and should be enhanced and expanded by working with community clubs in STEM, and educational institutions:
- Current UW Extension educator vacancies should not be filled, yet Regional Crops Educator position should be retained, and the vacant Dairy educator position should be discussed;
- The County must honor its contractual obligations with UW Extension which run through December 31, 2025.

Upon presenting these recommendations to the county executive, Carroll Merry, task force chair said, "County Executive Schoemann tasked us

with taking a hard look at UW Extension programming and ensuring the taxpayers, ag community and businesses are getting the best bang for their buck. I am particularly pleased with the consensus that we enhance 4-H. 4-H is something many of us grew up with and would like to see continue for our grandkids. It has played an integral part in the history of Washington County, and I want to see it continue to provide the invaluable service more focused on the needs of our citizens."

Schoemann commented, "I appreciate the work of this task force and especially the input from our community stakeholders. I see the many opportunities ahead of us - to grow 4-H; to connect with Moraine Park Technical College (MPTC) in educating through STEM programming; and to listen to the local community about their needs. There has been a concerning departure from The Wisconsin Idea with the UW more focused on itself, moving focus away from the real needs of our businesses and communities. Meanwhile, UW campuses are closing, staff are being laid off, programs are ending, and culture wars and antisemitism are undermining our values. Washington County has had enough. The recommendations from this task force offer a great start at reprioritizing UW funding and returning our focus to provide opportunities for our students, businesses, and community.

On Saturday morning, May 4, the Campbellsport Public Library held a ribbon cutting for their new story walk outside behind the library.

Grow Fruit in Containers

Have fun and enjoy picking fresh fruit right outside your door thanks to compact varieties you can grow in containers. Just clear some space on your patio, deck, balcony, or front steps that receives at least six hours of sunlight and get busy planting.

Consider starting with strawberries. They provide seasonal interest with their white flowers, red berries, and brilliant fall color. Day-neutral and everbearing strawberries produce fruit throughout the summer and grow well in strawberry pots, containers, and hanging baskets. Place the containers where you can enjoy their beauty and easily harvest and enjoy a few berries on your cereal, as an afternoon snack, or atop your favorite dessert.

Include a few of the relatively new compact berry bushes suited to containers and small spaces. Raspberry Shortcake® grows two- to three-feet tall and wide and is thornless which makes harvesting a breeze. They produce a bumper crop on new plant growth each season.

Baby Cakes® blackberry is another thornless space-saving berry plant. Like Raspberry Shortcake® it grows two- to three-feet tall and wide and is thornless. The white flowers and tasty fruit that form on old growth make Baby Cakes® a nice addition to any outdoor space.

Grow compact blueberries in pots adding pretty flowers, edible fruit, and great fall color to your patio, deck, or balcony. Blueberries prefer moist,

well-drained acidic soil that many of us do not have in our gardens but can provide these ideal conditions when growing in containers. You only need one plant to have fruit but growing two will more than double the harvest.

Use narrow and columnar dwarf apples as a living screen or vertical accent. The Urban Apple® series, Spire® apples, North Pole®, and Sentinel varieties are all suited to growing in containers and small spaces. The trees grow about eightto ten-feet tall and only several-feet wide. The trunk is loaded with short branches and lots of fruiting spurs for easy harvesting. You will need two different varieties of most apples, including these, for cross-pollination to occur and fruit to

He was employed for over 20 years at Weasler Engineering yeard retired in 1992. He was very active in local fund raising for volunteer social clubs: American Legion, Lions and Kiwanis as well as a rescue squad lead on the Kewaskum Voluntary Fire Department. Since 1970, Bob was a very dedicated advocate for the advancement of the sport of snowmobiling in Wisconsin, having served as the founder, instructor and president Kewaskum Snow-Chiefs and president of the Association of Wisconsin Snowmobile Clubs. 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

Turkey Hunt/Puppy Watch

I am currently in a simply crazy, busy, but positive section of my life. This week I hunted hard for turkey during the second season in Zone 1, and I did all of my hunting in a large, oak forest directly behind my house in northern Juneau County. Along with turkey hunting, my two-year-old golden retriever Red was due to give birth to her first litter.

Wednesday, April 24 High 53, Low 31

Here is my goal: hunt turkey with my compound bow and, by the end of my seven-day season, have a litter of pups and, hopefully, put an arrow in a gobbler. I would hunt the first three days in a food plot behind my house, and that is an entire different story. I created this food plot four years ago with the goal of having a place for my daughter Selina and, just as importantly, for my girlfriend, Michelle Chiaro, to hunt for both deer and turkey. The food plot was literally carved out of an oak forest/hazelnut brush with a chainsaw and a rototiller. For two years, Michelle and I loved the food plot and then, on 6-15-22, Michelle passed away unexpectedly, and I have not been able to spend time in it. This turkey hunt would be where I attempted to get past that demon.

Hunt 1. Up at 4:00, set up in my blind at 5:00, I saw one hen and there was very little gobbling. I was at peace and that was more important than harvesting a turkey with my bow.

Hunt 2. Thursday - I did not see a turkey today but had an incredible experience in the after-

noon with 15 high schoolers from Necedah as we worked on a fishing area for our community. We cleared brush, hung bird houses and I think everyone enjoyed the experience.

Hunt 3. Friday - I called a jake in and was too hungry for a tom experience to fling an arrow at it. So far, three hunts, only two birds spotted.

Hunt 4. Saturday - Red is swelling up so fast that it is almost unbelievable; this will be my 16th litter. I started when I was 22. I truly do raise and create a quality golden retriever and am proud of that. I relocated about three-quarter's of a mile south of the house in the same forest. This is where Selina has harvested seven toms and many others have been whacked, including Michelle's first and only bird which was a 25-pound gobbler and an incredible memory. We did a full body mount on it, and it is in my livingroom; Michelle passed away before the taxidermy work was complete. I did not see or hear a turkey today.

Hunt 5. Sunday - Lots of rain. Cold weather. I love it. Mother Earth is coming back to life: it would be so cool to see a normal summer weatherwise. Red is now uncomfortable and, on my mind, all the time.

Hunt 6. Monday - I am worn down from either hunting, doing hobby farm work or concern about Red. I saw a hen this morning, not a single gobble. When I came home from my afternoon hunt, I heard whimpering in my living room, next to the turkey mount but on the floor. Red had given birth to two pups. Sleeping would not be a part of this night, once again. When I left to go hunting at 4:45 a.m., my mood was excellent but very wore down.



There was six bundles of gold in my living room. When I returned after a pretty cool hunt where I saw four turkeys, there was another pup! Six males and one female.

If you are interested, I have some quality golden retriever pups! My busy season is here and will last until December, Life is positive. I miss Michelle!

develop.

Grow your compact berry bushes in pots 12- to 16-inches in diameter and at least 10-inches deep. As the plants grow and mature, move them into larger, 20- to 24-inch containers. Your columnar apples will appreciate a bigger container that is 20-inches wide and deep.

Use pots with drainage holes and fill them with a quality potting mix. Check soil moisture daily and water thoroughly whenever the top few inches of soil are starting to dry. Reduce ongoing maintenance by incorporating an organic moisture-retaining product like Wild Valley Farms wool pellets (wildvalleyfarms.com) into the potting mix. This sustainable product reduces watering by up to 25% and increases air space for

Supplement the nutrients in Wild Valley Farms wool pellets as needed with a low nitrogen, slowrelease fertilizer and eliminate weekly fertilization. Add the slow-release fertilizer soon after planting and again mid-season if needed. Do not fertilize in late summer as that can stimulate lateseason growth that can be damaged in winter.

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to provide extra winter protection. Insulate the roots by grouping plants together and surrounding them with bales of straw, bags of potting mix, or similar materials. Or move plants to an unheated garage for winter and water whenever the soil is thawed and dry.

Another option is to grow these plants in nursery pots and set them in decorative containers for summer. When winter arrives, move the potted plants out of the decorative containers and sink the nursery pots in a vacant part of the garden. Lift the plants out of the ground in spring and set them back in their decorative containers for the growing season.

As you master these fruit plants, and if space allows, expand your small-scale orchard to include citrus, figs, dwarf cherries, plums, and peaches. You'll enjoy the flowers, shade and of course the tasty fruit.



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
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As any new hobby in my household, we (ok, he) went overboard. He stocked up on puzzles, bought a board, glue and frames for our completed masterpieces. This is set up right next to our new puzzle swap. Drop off a puzzle, pick one up. All sizes accepted and just be sure the puzzle you donate is in good condition and all the pieces are there. 





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
