Abel Dairy Farms Near Eden will Host Fond du Lac County's Breakfast on the Farm

The original Abel farm was purchased by Johan Abel in 1857. It's believed there were 100 acres on the original farm. The current farm runs about 3,000 acres; 1,100 acres owned by the family and about 1,900 acres are rented. The Abel Dairy Farm also buys crops off another 2,000 acres from local farmers who are contracted to grow crops for the farm.

People will be able to visit Abel Dairy Farms on Sunday, June 23. From 8 a.m. until noon, the 35th Fond du Lac County Breakfast on the Farm will take place. The event is hosted by Envision Greater Fond du Lac.

Fond du Lac County celebrity guests and volunteers will be serving a large country-style breakfast which includes eggs with ham and cheese, pork sausage, pancakes, applesauce, coffee, and milk. The breakfast will be served in the Lakeview Electric Contractors Food Tent. Tickets cost \$10 for ages 13 and older, \$8 for ages 6-12, and children five and younger are free. Two flavors of ice cream cups from Kelley Country Creamery are available at an extra charge.

Other activities include a local cheese tasting tent, the Alliant Energy Foundation Farm Education Zone, a petting zoo, farm tour shuttles provided by CP Feeds, children's activities, and much more.

"We have not hosted Breakfast on the Farm before, but we did host Farm Progress Days in 2000," said Steve Abel. "That was a three-day event that was attended by about 80,000 people. It is now called Farm Technology Days."

Steve and Bill are the fifth generation of Abels to operate the farm. Steve's son, Nathan, is also involved on the dairy while he is a senior in college; making Nathan the sixth generation.

Johan had sold the original farm to his son,

George L. Abel, who in turn sold the farm to his son, George R. Abel. Allen became the fourth generation to own the farm when he bought the property from George R. Abel.

Allen and his two sons, Steve and Bill, currently own the farm. Allen has started to slow down, and most of the day-to-day operations are now handled by Steve and Bill. Steve manages the business and the dairy operations. Bill manages the cropping, harvesting, and equipment.

According to Steve, Allen purchased the farm from his father in 1971 and started with 23 cows. Steve purchased a neighboring farm in 1992.

Since 2003, there has been a large generator in place. A new generator was installed last year, and that is large enough to run the entire farm if and when the power goes out.

"In 1996, the Abels built a new parlor and freestall facility on the current site and merged all of the herds together and milked 650 cows," said Steve. "We expanded the herd to 1,800 cows in the year 2000. The current expansion was finished in February of 2023 and brought the herd size to 4,300."

The cows are milked three times a day and there are 3,850 cows being milked. There are 450 dry cows. The cows are milked on an 80-stall rotary parlor, also known as a carousel parlor.

"We use Bovisync as our herd management software," said Steve. "It's a cloud-based software, invented by Dr. David Cook, who lives only about a mile from our dairy farm."

Steve continued, "We use RFID tags to identify our cows on our facility. They are recognized by our parlor and management equipment to help us ID the cows in the parlor, sort gates, and in our barns. We also use cameras and artificial intelligence to monitor our cows in the maternity barn."

Washington County Fifth Annual Freedom Day Juneteenth Celebration

In recognition of the oldest known celebration of the ending of slavery, Washington County is hosting its fifth annual Juneteenth celebration of Freedom Day on Wednesday, June 19, at 11 a.m., at the Boys & Girls Club of Washington County (925 N. Silverbrook Dr. in West Bend). The county is partnering with the Boys & Girls Club of Washington County to cohost the event.

Juneteenth became a federal holiday in June 2021 and commemorates the ending of slavery in the United States. The event dates to June 19, 1865, when Union soldiers arrived at Galveston, Texas, with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were free. This was more than two years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, which had become official January 1, 1863.

"We began the Juneteenth celebration in Washington County not only to remember the difficult history of enslavement in the United States, but to provide an opportunity for our great community to celebrate its significance together. Knowing the history of the holiday allows us to build connections and understanding," said Josh Schoemann, county executive.

The Juneteenth flag will be flown at the 11 Washington County government buildings to recognize the holiday.

In addition to County Executive Schoemann's proclamation, the Juneteenth celebration of Freedom Day will feature:


Celebrating Fatherhood: Reflections on Father's Day



Yellowstone National Park (YNP) is the original magical kingdom. Established as the first national park in 1872, it encompasses over 2.2 million acres over three states. The park has something for everyone—majestic mountains, thundering waterfalls, geysers, thermal features, rivers, green valleys, towering pines and abundant wildlife. Some of the park's wildlife residents include black and grizzly bears, wolves, coyotes, foxes, elk, pronghorn, bighorn sheep, deer, moose, eagles, osprey and, of course, the bison, or fluffy cows. Fun fact—more visitors are injured each year by bison than by bears, because tourists try to take pictures with the large bovines who can run 35 miles per hour, weigh up to a ton, have sharp horns and a cranky disposition.

The calves from Abel Dairy Farms are raised at Kansas Dairy Development in Garden City, Kan. until they are about six months of age.

"At six months of age, they go to Oshkosh Heifer Development in Oshkosh, Neb., where we are partners with seven other dairies from Wisconsin," explained Steve. "We have a total of 3,650 young stock between the facilities. We also raise about 2,500 of our own Holstein/Angus cross beef animals in Nebraska."

Due to the site limitations, Steve said the family probably won't add many more cows.

"If we do expand, it will probably have to happen on a new site or by acquiring another dairy," he added.

The Abel family is not particular about the brand of machinery used on the farm. Crops include 3,000 acres of corn silage, 1,800 acres of alfalfa haylage, and 200 acres of wheat.

"Most years, we harvest four cuttings of alfalfa, but on occasion, we have done five crops if the timing is right," said Steve. "We are firm believers in cover crops to help with soil health and erosion control. Alfalfa also plays a big role in both of those."

Abel Dairy Farms has a manure digester. Steve provided some information about the system.

"We partnered with Northern Biogas and built three methane digesters and will be producing renewable natural gas," explained Steve. "It will capture all of the methane from our manure and scrub it into natural gas before it is injected into a natural gas pipeline and used by customers."

Steve continued, "To put it in perspective, it will produce enough natural gas to heat about 1,000 homes for a year or power 2,000 cars for a year."

As you can tell, the Abel family spends a lot of time operating Abel Dairy Farms. But the three owners are involved in other pursuits as well. Allen owns a horse farm called Abel's Stardust Stables. He and his wife, Tracy, breed, raise, and sell Gypsy Vanners. Steve is the Chairman of the Fond du Lac County Board of Supervisors. Bill is an officer on the Eden Fire Department.

The Abel family is excited to welcome people to their farm for Breakfast on the Farm. All parking is at the farm located at W4050 County Rd. UU, Eden. Traffic should enter the farm using US-45 to County Road UU.

KEWASKUM PUBLIC LIBRARY**



Last week, a patron came in to register for our adult craft night and had cash in hand to pay for it. I was confused until I realized it was for a program at a different library. We don’t charge for programs, and I hope that we never need to. Since I have been in management in the library field, I have always felt it is important to provide free and equitable services to the community. Ensuring that what we provide is fair for all, charging costs for programs may not allow others with limited means to attend.

With costs increasing for many of the resources that libraries provide, I know of other locations reducing their offerings to be within their budgets. That is becoming a trend, sad as it is. Some of this is fallout from the pandemic.

During COVID, libraries changed in how people used them. Virtual programs, e-books and streaming services grew. Resources offered in library only, were now available free from home with your library card, such as Ancestry, a genealogy website. The digital library grew with circulation increasing upwards of 30%. New streaming services such as hoopla were now commonplace. Now, several years later, library visits have gone up the past couple years with a surge of physical checkouts and in-person program attendance. However, the library services used at home are still expected from our patrons. Unfortunately, the cost and availability of some of these offerings have made it difficult for libraries to keep up with their patrons’ needs.

Ancestry is back to only being available in the library, which is a decision made by a state department. Hoopla is becoming cost prohibitive, and I know of libraries that have made the decision to no longer offer it. We have had to cut the amount that each patron can check out monthly to stay

within our budget.

Digital book costs are rising. In truth, purchasing e-books through our consortium Wisconsin Digital Public Library is much more expensive than books in print for libraries, even though it is cheaper for the consumer to purchase an e-book. Furthermore, the licensing for these digital materials is difficult and I am glad I am not on that decision-making committee.

We are approaching budget season, and I will do my best to continue to provide what we already are with hopes to add to our services. With our operating budget expected to increase exponentially mostly because of our move, I know it will be a struggle. We continue to look for creative ways to always offer the best we can for our community. Whatever this budget will change for us for next year and beyond, you can take my word, that there will not be any charges for attending and participating in our programs.



New Country in Washburn County

Hello friends,

As I have mentioned, I am in a crazy busy period of time with my job, gardens, pond, volunteering, and family. This week, my daughter Selina flew home for a few days for one her college roommate's weddings, and as usual, we pegged out the fun meter. Then, there is this job that keeps me on the go and pays my bills. This week, I was given a tip about a unique chain of lakes in Washburn County called the Spider Lake Chain, and I headed that way with my golden retriever, Ruby, to canoe, camp and hopefully, whack some bluegill.

Friday, May 31

High 67, Low 48

You ever get so busy that your head is spinning and confusion is part of your reality? Things are not that bad but close for me. Today, my golden retriever, Ruby, and I started what would be a very cool adventure where it was just the canoe, gear and who knows what is in front of us until we see it. The Spider Lake Chain is a series of five lakes that I would find out are a bass fisherman's paradise, and you feel like you are back in 1970, as far as a peaceful location.

Kind of bad luck would come my way very early in this trip when just as I found a campsite on an island, that had not been used yet this year, it started raining. The rain was just a drizzle at first, but the confusion part of my reality did not have quality rain gear along or the right tarp for my tent and I would be sleeping on the ground.



is true mountain driving and not for the faint at heart. Entering the park from the northeast takes you into the Lamar Valley which is renowned for its abundant wildlife. Huge herds of bison can usually be seen here along with elk, pronghorn, deer, coyotes, foxes and bear. Moose and wolves are more elusive, but also make their homes here.

The eastern entrance is in Wyoming and the closest city is Cody. Entering from this entrance, you drive the very scenic Buffalo Bill Highway and are near the large and beautiful Yellowstone Lake. Big-horn sheep can often be seen alongside the mountainous roads entering the park.

The southern entrance is close to another beautiful park,


Grand Teton National Park. Moose can sometimes be seen along the waterways heading into the southern entrance and the views of the Tetons are incredible. The closest city to the south entrance is Jackson, Wyoming.

The west entrance, by the city of West Yellowstone, is the busiest one. The majority of restaurants, shops and lodging are located here. The west side is closest to the thermal features such as Old Faithful geyser and Prismatic Springs. Old Faithful lodge is beautiful and in the lobby there is a countdown of when the next geyser eruption is predicted. Large herds of bison can often be seen in the area and bears also often frequent this part of the park. Grizzly bears are more com-

mon on the west side of the park, while black bears are more likely to inhabit the east side.

In the center of the park is the Hayden Valley, another great place to see wildlife, and the Grand Canyon of Yellowstone. Included in the canyon area are two very impressive waterfalls, upper and lower falls, with various viewing sites. There are several waterfalls in the park, some of which can be easily seen from the road and some which require hiking.

YNP is a beautiful destination, but visitors need to keep in mind that they are not in a zoo but in a very large wilderness. If you do any hiking, it is advised you go with a group, talk while walking and always carry bear spray. Bear attacks are rare, but do occur, usually when a bear is surprised by a hiker or a mother bear feels her cubs are threatened. Bear spray can be purchased at any gas station or store near the park and many hotels will rent it or even loan some to you. In addition to the often cranky bison, elk can also be very dangerous if provoked or they feel their calves are in danger, so it is wise to give all animals a wide berth. Keep small children and unaware adults close at

all times. Not only can the animals be dangerous, but wandering off a boardwalk onto a thermal feature with temperatures of 198 degrees can be deadly. Many parents use child backpacks or harnesses to keep their small ones safe.

There are several lodges in the park, which are beautiful and

quaint, but also old and quite expensive. Reservations typically need to be made a year in advance. There are many campgrounds in the park with less expensive accommodations in addition to hotels, campgrounds, cabins and homes to rent in the areas outside the park.

While there are a

few restaurants at the lodges and some grills in the visitor centers, many people bring their own food and drink into the park and picnic at many of the scenic picnic grounds that are available. Food selection is limited and there are often long lines in the park, so bringing your own lunch saves time, money and is often a healthier option.

Cell phone reception can be sketchy in YNP. Do not rely on your phone for travel directions. Instead, use a satellite guidance system like Garmin and use the map that you will receive at the park entrance. If you stay on the main roads, it is almost impossible to get lost in the park, as the roads create a large figure eight. Check weather and road conditions before entering the park each day, as especially in May and September/October, some sections of road in the higher elevations may be closed due to snow.

Yellowstone National Park is a treasure that everyone, if given a chance, should see at least once in their lifetime. To make the most of your trip to YNP, make plans in advance, be patient and watchful while in the park and remember to not pet the fluffy cows.

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
