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## Campbellsport Reviews School Perceptions Survey

The Campbellsport Board of Education reviewed a summary of the School Perceptions student survey presented by Darren Sievers at the meeting on July 8 in Eden.

The student response rate came out to 58% or 622 students.

Questions fall into one of four broad categories: connectedness to the school, students' feelings on their learning, learning environment, and overall experience. The rating scale is 1-5, but the goal is to have students answer above a three.

Campbellsport scored above three in all four categories. Campbellsport was in the 44th percentile in connection, 32nd in learning, 30th in environment, and 43rd in experience.

The district's strengths were in climate or environment with the survey reflecting many students have positive relationships with classmates, teachers, and family. Student engagement was also noted.

Some of the weaknesses had to do with student behavior with students expressing concern over classroom distractions. Use of classroom time and activities and their effectiveness was also noted.

The final question is would the student recommend the school to others and that score came to a 5.72 average.

### Board Matters

- Public comments were made on not only crossing guards but the board's recent decision to only have special education paraprofessionals be offered full-time hours.
- The board approved the adoption of Wisconsin Academic Standards.
- Fond du Lac County donated science supplies that was sitting at the closed UW-Oshkosh campus.
- Campbellsport will be offering Advanced Placement pre-calculus, calculus, statistics and Moraine Park college credit and UW-Oshkosh CAPP courses.
- The district has filled 78% of its open positions.
- The Booster Club is funding a remodel of the concession stand that will include plumbing and electrical work, as well as removal of cabinetry and a rearrangement of the space.
- The Fond du Lac Area Foundation granted \$4,000 to the football team to primarily cover transportation to an early season game in Green Bay.

## Kewaskum Plans to Hold ATV and UTV Public Forum September 9

The Village of Kewaskum plans to hold a public forum regarding the legalization of ATV and UTV use in town on Monday, September 9, at 7:00 p.m. The meeting will take place at the Kewaskum Fire Department and all community members are invited to attend.

Currently, the use of all-terrain vehicles and utility terrain vehicles are not allowed to be driven on village streets. The topic of allowing these vehicles to drive through town has been brought up multiple times in the past and both the Village Board members and citizens have been split on the matter.

Those who have previously argued against the idea of opening all roads to the use of ATVs and UTVs have stated that they feel it is dangerous, specifically on Highways 28 and 45. There have also been concerns brought up regarding routes with neighboring municipalities. Those who have been in favor of the idea have claimed that many of these vehicles have seat belts and their safety has improved over the years. They have also stated that opening all village roads would be convenient for these drivers and would allow for them to go to restaurants, shops and stores in town.

The forum will allow for the Village Board to address their plans on this topic publicly and receive feedback from citizens. According to the village, their goal is for "every voice to be heard."

At the beginning of the forum, the village plans to go over the benefits and concerns regarding the use of ATVs and UTVs. Neighboring communities and their policies may also be discussed.

Around 7:30, the forum will be open for public comments. Each speaker from the community will be given three minutes to respectfully address the board by stating their thoughts and opinions. Speakers must sign up in advance, ei-

ther before the forum begins or online. Citizens who can't attend the forum or don't wish to speak have the option to write their comments via email or to the Village Hall up to three days after the forum takes place.

The forum is scheduled to end around 9:00 p.m. with a summary of the evening's discussions and possible steps for the future.

According to the village, if the board decides to approve the use of these vehicles in town, a few key steps will need to be taken to change the current rules and regulations by January of 2025.

First, the Village Administrator and Police Chief will draft an amendment to the current ordinance allowing ATV and UTV use in the village. This would take place immediately after the forum between September 10-13.

Then throughout the month of October, the public will be able to review the drafted ordinance. October 1-30 would serve as a public comment period established for written feedback to the village.

Next, from November 1-14, the village board would, again, review feedback from the public and may revise the ordinance accordingly.

Then on November 18, an additional public forum would be held to discuss the final draft of the ordinance with the community.

On December 2, the members of the village board would then vote on the adoption of the revised ordinance. If approved, the village will undertake an educational campaign to inform residents of the new regulations and safe practices of the ATV and UTV use in town between December 3-31.

"This forum is a vital part of our democratic process, where we gather to discuss community concerns and explore new possibilities for our village," states the Village of Kewaskum.

All members of the community are encouraged to attend the forum on September 9 to share their thoughts and opinions on the matter of ATV and UTV use in town.

## Fair Play or Power Play?

Since 1848, our state constitution has worked well to create a fair and level playing field for state governance – you might even call it a rule book. However, our Wisconsin legislature is currently trying to change the rules by amending the state constitution. Apparently unhappy with the constitutional rule that the governor of the state has the power and responsibility to decide how to spend federal funds, the Republican led legislature seeks to change the constitution to give that power to themselves.

Our founding fathers devised a state constitution that divides the power of the government between three equal branches - the legislature, the governor and the courts. The legislature is responsible for making laws. The governor can veto proposed laws and the legislature can override a veto with a 2/3 majority. The governor is also responsible for enforcing laws and deciding how and when to spend appropriated federal funds. The courts are responsible for interpreting laws and determining if they are constitutional.

Federal money comes with specific restrictions on how it can be spent to meet specific needs. For example, during the Covid pandemic, federal funds were given to each state to help manage the pandemic, keep people healthy and alleviate economic issues related to the crisis.

Governor Evers spent the Covid funds on grants to small businesses that were having problems staying in business due to the pandemic, resources for schools to switch to online teaching, supplies to help schools safely return

to in-person teaching, economic relief, public health assistance, tourism and childcare. By giving the governor the ability to decide where to best allocate these funds, help can reach those who need it quickly. Meanwhile, the Wisconsin legislature is not always at work in Madison. The 2024 legislative session lasted from January 16 through March 14. Since that time, they have not met or worked on any legislation. If an emergency would occur when the legislature was not in session, valuable time would be wasted waiting for them to come back to work and make necessary decisions.

On August 13, during the primary election, the following amendment questions will be asked:

Shall section 35 (1) of article IV of the constitution be created to provide that the legislature may not delegate its sole power to determine how moneys should be appropriated?

Shall section 35 (2) of article IV of the constitution be created to prohibit the governor from allocating any federal money the governor accepts on behalf of the state without the approval of the legislature by joint resolution or as provided by legislative rules?

Before voting yes or no, you need to ask yourself a few questions. Would this legislature be trying to change the rules if our state had a Republican governor, or is this just political sour grapes and an attempt to take more power than our founding fathers intended? Does it make sense that such an important issue has the vote scheduled for a primary election when only approximately 20% of eligible Wisconsinites vote



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# The Schmidbauers – Hunsy and Grandma

When comparing last names in a town between a century, one can be wondering why those last names disappeared in the present. That can be said for the Schmidbauer name in LeRoy and St. Kilian. The “flattening out” of that family name was very much on the mind of Earl Kehrmeier (b.1928), as he explained the importance of that family as well as his relation to it.

The annual St. Kilian Picnic was held on July 21, and so this article is dedicated to providing an understanding of the expanse to which that name used to cover from St. Kilian to LeRoy. This first portion focuses on the family roots established around St. Andrew’s in LeRoy. In addition, her many children shaped communities beyond LeRoy as told in the second part of this story, published last week, July 18, in this publication.

## Placing John Schmidbauer

John Schmidbauer died in the Village of LeRoy at his home in 1992. According to his obituary, “Mr. Schmidbauer was the owner and operator of the former Schmidbauer’s Tavern in LeRoy, and was a blacksmith in LeRoy for many years.” In addition, “He was a lifelong member of St. Andrew’s Catholic Church, LeRoy, and a member of Mayville Senior Citizens. He was active with LeRoy baseball teams in his younger years.”

Earl’s wife Betty is the daughter of John Schmidbauer. He recalled that John Schmidbauer started out at the old blacksmith shop in the upper town of LeRoy. “I would say when John and (Betty’s mother) Rosie got married, they lived up above that blacksmith shop. That was always the story, as a young couple. And the guy who owned the shop lived next door to it.” There was not much to that blacksmith shop, and this is a different shop than where John Schmidbauer would end up working most of his career. Discussing the Schmidbauers helps recognize there were two blacksmith shops in LeRoy. Earl explained the difference. “Where John learned the trade, that was up in LeRoy – the upper town.” Kollman’s Corner is upper town; while lower town is where the church is. Meanwhile, the old Schmidbauer farm was central to

Earl Kehrmeier describes this photo of Rose (Rost) Schmidbauer (1907-1968) with her husband John, “Here’s a classic. Here’s Betty’s mother and dad behind the bar. And Betty used to tend bar there.” Betty added, “I was a bartender when I was 14.” All of John (Hunsy) and Rosie’s girls were behind the bar. Earl laughed because he went to that bar before he dated Betty, “I used to go with a girlfriend, and here was a young teenager working behind the bar. Never paid attention to her [Betty].” Earl added, “I just knew her as a Schmidbauer girl.” With their anniversary in June, Betty and Earl have been married 72 years.

LeRoy’s definition – both literally and figuratively. In addition, Earl said it is important to recognize the Weinbergers were well known for their business in LeRoy. “The store was on the south side, where the Weinbergers [also] lived in the store, and across the street is where they built the butcher shop and locker plant.” On its east side, the grocery store was adjacent to St. Andrew’s property.

Understand the following example is a reminder on how farmsteads used to define localities. Earl said that Schmidbauer farm dividing upper town and lower town is “where Betty’s dad came from,” and therefore was the childhood home of Art, Alphonse, John, and Joseph Schmidbauer. “There were four boys,” all were known in either LeRoy or St. Kilian; and there were daughters who later lived in Lomira and Wayne Township. In understanding the significance of the name and farm, Earl summarized the original Schmidbauer farm. “The Schmidbauer homestead is a farm right in the center of LeRoy. Between upper town and lower town. If looking at an old plat map, the Schmidbauer farm was on the south side of LeRoy. “The only farm in between. That was the homestead.” As one gets to before the 1940s, it is more evident of a split between upper and lower town LeRoy. If you were on the northeast side of the Schmidbauer farm at mid-century, you would be near the lower town. If you were on the northwest side of the farm, you would be in upper town. In the old days of LeRoy, the hamlet had multiple farms framing it. Earl elaborated on some of the farms of his childhood. “LeRoy was divided by the Krapfl farm on the north side, and the Schmidbauer farm on the south side, because on the north side of the

road was Art Krapfl’s farm.” Robert (1919-2002) and Pearl Keller (1926-2014) farmed “the first farm east of LeRoy; north side of the road per’n’er.” In the old days, that farm was that of Robert’s father Alois Keller (1882-1967).

## Grandma Schmidbauer’s Tavern

Earl Kehrmeier was born in 1928, and his wife Betty Schmidbauer (John’s daughter) is a couple years younger. Both have early memories of Johanna Gittel Schmidbauer, but understand that Earl wasn’t connected to the Schmidbauer family until he married Betty in 1952, and really didn’t converse with his future wife until the late 1940s. Coincidentally, both Earl and Betty witnessed Johanna running the tavern, Betty as a grandchild and Earl as a neighbor.

Betty was frank on her Grandma Schmidbauer. “She was too busy with the tavern,” so there were not memories of her being friendly with the grandchildren. However, Earl said, “She always had lunch at the bar, with rye bread and slices of ham.” In addition, there was food to keep the kids fed at the bar. “When I was a kid,” Earl said, “I always liked to go to her bar.” Dad would go for a drink there, “but I would be able to eat pretzels on the counter.”

Betty respects both of her grandparents; they just had different personalities. Grandma Schmidbauer was running the tavern by herself since her husband Andrew died in 1936. Meanwhile, Betty said of her other grandma, “I was very friendly with my Grandma Rost. That was my mother’s mother. They lived in upper LeRoy... So, I was a lot friendly with her. I would go to her house all the time.” In defense of Grandma Schmidbauer, “She was too busy involved with the tavern – not that she didn’t love us any less than Grandma Rost, but she had too much other things to do.” The com-

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
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

While the Village of Campbellsport Village Board meeting on July 8 was spent primarily on crossing guard discussion, there is a bit more to report on.

### Board Matters

- Christine Coulter has been selected and appointed as the new Deputy Clerk-Treasurer.
- The Barton Road lift station project is expected to be completed in October. The Ladwig and Poplar Streets project has begun with sanitary and water main work being done in the last week. The road is closed to through traffic, and construction hours are from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Fireman's Park projects are expected to begin the end of this month.

- The public safety committee was created and the members appointed were Tim Gellings, Janet Hafemann, and Matt Schwai.
- Budget planning for 2025 is underway.
- The village reassessment will take place in 2025. The village has been out of compliance since 2020. The 2023 assessment found the village to be at 73% compliance, but the target is 100%.
- As of meeting time, the water plant capital improvement plan was 90% complete. The village was awaiting a final submission from Strand Associates.
- The Campbellsport Fire Department's standard operating guidelines (SOGs) were approved by the board.
- Ehler's proposal for a water utility cash flow analysis and PSC application services was approved.

- The board approved rezoning of three single family residences to nostalgic residences, and zoned three locations with a planned unit development overlay.
- Sixteen new homes have been permitted this year. Since 2021, there have been a total of 48 new homes, but with three more to add, the total as of meeting time is 51.
- Seventeen acres of commercial land is for sale in the industrial park.
- The village is looking for a part-time police officer and a full-time firefighter/advanced EMT.
- Discussion was held on the village's flag display schedule.
- It was estimated 580 fish fries were sold on Wednesday, July 3 at the Campbellsport Firemen's Picnic.

parison is valuable in understanding the way elders of the past sometimes should not be judged by social norms of the present.

Earl said the Schmidbauers “ran a good bar.” Betty remembers how busy it was. Earl said for context, you have to remember this was the era before easy-access liquor stores became mainstream. He jumped to when John Schmidbauer took over the tavern for his mother by the 1950s, “We didn’t have liquor stores. Monday night I would go there and help my father-in-law, and maybe a farmer would come in and buy four or five/six cases for the week. And I’d have to carry ‘em up from the basement. The cooling room was down there.” It wasn’t as if one could go to the grocery store or liquor store to get liquor or beer in volume in 1955. “They went to the tavern and bought it.”

There is a picture priceless to Betty’s family, which has been printed in the *Mayville News* and elsewhere, which shows 423 years between the five men playing cards at Schmidbauer’s Tavern in the 1940s. Betty still has the original caption and photo framed because one of the five men is Rheinhold Rost (1862-1957). “That picture is of my grandpa playing cards. Grandpa Rost,” Betty said. “He was a friendly guy, but not real outgoing. Though years ago, old people didn’t bother too much with the kids.” The photo is important because it validates old farmers having a good time playing cards at Grandma Schmidbauer’s Tavern. Unfortunately, the original photo’s caption does not recognize that the person running the location was Grandma Schmidbauer (1870-1955), who by then was almost 75 during World War II.

**Back to Hunsy**

John Schmidbauer took over the tavern for grandma, a transition that likely merged with his blacksmith shop days fading. It is not that Hunsy’s blacksmith shop closed exactly, but certainly around 1950 the demand for blacksmithing declined. The following are some key memories of John.

First, his nickname was Hunsy. Earl said this is because Hans is short for the name John, but with the German accent in LeRoy Hans sounded like “Huns.” Therefore, John became known as “Hunsy.” (It is spelled as it sounds here.) Even Earl said “Hans” with a distinct “ah” sound, then went back to Hunsy with an “un” sound, as if that the latter was more commonly used in LeRoy. Betty said even her son John was called Hunsy in high school at Mayville. One cultural question is the relation to Huns in World War I. John’s brother Art, who later was a blacksmith in St. Kilian,




Photo and caption dates back to World War II. The caption reads, “An almost daily routine in LeRoy is this gathering of old time card players. served during World War I. Given the hatred towards Germany in the Great War, the propaganda pushed by the Wilson Administration said, “Beat Back the Hun.” It was a reference to the Huns and lineage of the old Germans, artistically portrayed in posters as barbaric. Therefore, was Hunsy’s nickname self-censored in his early days? Not only was his nickname German, but it also sounded like the ‘Huns’ the U.S. was fighting in World War I. In addition, it would have been worth asking him when his nickname started, especially given the two world wars, both of which were against Germany. Of course, there is nobody living who could answer those questions. And it is all the more interesting given his brother Art’s service to our country. In defense of the Schmidbauers, one can see the tavern image of Grandpa Rost at Grandma Schmidbauer’s Tavern has war bond signs hanging in the background supporting the U.S. war effort.

Betty went on to describe her dad. “He was a caring person. But he didn’t show it emotionally.”

Earl seconded Betty, “It was typical. They didn’t hug and kiss. You didn’t say, ‘I love you.’ Betty’s been sorry so many times, that she never hugged her dad when she could have.” Betty affirmed both her desire, and her father’s indirect affection. As Earl explained, “He was so kind... When the trucker went to Milwaukee, he would ride along in the cattle truck, and he would come home with dresses for each of the daughters.” “Which was very unusual,” Betty added. Earl continued, “The cattle trucker would maybe take him down to Wisconsin Avenue, and he’d go in stores and come home with dresses.” Betty said, “We’d always say, ‘How did he know the sizes to buy?’” This is when Betty was young, maybe five to seven years old. Frank Feucht (1899-1967) was the cattle hauler. Earl said Donnie Feucht (1933-2015) is the son who took over for Frank Feucht trucking, “And then his son Dennis really expanded the business.” In those days, Hunsy likely hitched a ride, and Frank was probably happy to have some company. Betty described a different era, “They did that. Somebody would go along for the ride.” Earl explained in those days, it would be possible Frank was at Schmidbauer’s Tavern, and Hunsy might say to Frank, ‘Well next time you go to Milwaukee, I’d like to go along with you.’ And that was LeRoy in the old days. Professions including tavern keeper, blacksmith, farmer, butcher and cattle hauler crossed paths between upper and lower town.

Besides his love for his children, John Schmidbauer worked hard, a trait Hunsy clearly learned from his mother. Earl said John “could come to our farm and shoe horses at four o’clock in the morning. He’d come right to the farms and shoe horses until 8 then he’d open up the blacksmith shop. He’d sharpen plowshares and do welding and things in the blacksmith shop.” So, he basically worked all day? “Yeah. He was a hard worker.” That’s not even including the hours Hunsy was putting in the tavern and helping his mother. Earl went on to conclude, “Her dad was an elegant man.” Why? “He was the best father-in-law that could be in the world. He always was helpful. Always said a kind word. Never talked about anyone. And you could never get in an argument with him. If he had opinions, he never left anybody know it. And his three brothers were a lot like him. All three.” Including Art? “Yeah. He was a very nice man too.” Earl paused, and added, “And none of them had any sons. Art. Jesse – that’s Joseph, Ollie [Alphonse] and John. None of them had sons. They only had daughters. So, the Schmidbauer name went flat in LeRoy.”

Regardless of the name fading from modern usage, Grandma Schmidbauer had to be proud of the tavern, which Hunsy kept going.

# A Professional Hunting Dog Trainer and His Pup

*Hello friends,*

I have something new for you and I think that you are going to like it. My golden retriever, Red, was bred with an excellent sire named Max. Max is owned by Jim Steurwald of Deforest who is a very ambitious grouse hunter. Jim would have had first pick of the litter, but he passed that onto Gregg Brda who is the owner of Wind River Kennels in Fond du Lac County near Campbellsport. When Gregg came to pick up his pup, he proposed the idea of me doing a series on the progress of his new pup, Rio, "Ree-O." This series will be updated every few months and could easily take 2-3 years.

Gregg has been a full-time hunting dog trainer since 1991 and has been a "finished" Hunt Test judge for "HRC" for 18 years. Folks, there is so much to say to tell this week's column in the space that I have that I am going to have to be very short on each subject.

**Friday, July 12**

**High 86, Low 62**

I knew Rio would have the potential to be a great dog when I watched him until the day Gregg picked him up. Today, I would start my professional introduction into how you "really" start a pup. I would be given a tour of Brda's set up and, most importantly, two men would take a day and get to know each other as they began a long project.

First, the kennel. I have never seen such a clean, well thought out, and easily disciplined kennel in my life. Gregg trains by the month,

sometimes gives classes, and his low profile and effective discipline is something that should be on a tv show. Barking or whining is not tolerated. I would spend two days at Wind River and generally if a lab, golden retriever, or Boykin gets verbal in the kennel, Gregg tells it to stop. It is almost like he has a connection and every dog in the building loves and respects him.

The kennel has the ability for each dog to be inside and out and for the most part, each dog does its business outside, and I think it is fair to say that my new friend is very much on top of his game as everything is clean enough to do surgery on each kennel floor.

Gregg Brda is 74 and addicted to duck hunting and, [in] reality, very much like me, created a full-time in-

come out of doing something that he loves.

Rio, OMG as in Oh My God! Today, I would watch Rio do land retrieves, and on the next day we trained, I watched Rio do water retrieves that were all of 40 yards. I watched Rio as Gregg would say "be a problem solver," carrying the bumper in the middle after realizing that swimming with it by holding an end was more difficult.

Basic rules: first start out with a paint roller with a pup, light to carry, not a fan of tennis ball, too easy to compress which can later create damage while retrieving birds.

Gregg does not like toys and most importantly, never play tug of war with a retriever.

Today we trained with two men that are very much into their lab and golden retriever and were doing triples with well-disciplined dogs. Gregg showed me a blind retrieve that he did with a golden retriever named Reno that was unbelievable to someone like me that will never hit that level. Everything is lining the dog along with verbal, hand, and voice communication.

One basic tip I was told more than once - training is training. You take your pup out of the kennel, it is kept on a rope in the early stages and you work with it so that it realizes getting out of the kennel means "work which is fun." If what is being worked on does not work, that session is over, you do not want to make the pup dread training.

Eighty five to 90 percent of retrieving is enthusiasm and when a dog of any age is bringing back a bumper or duck, it is verbally rewarded as soon as it starts its retrieve back.

Holding onto the bumper until it

comes to your hand is a must and "hold" is mentioned more than once as the pup approaches, and 2-3 retrieves and put the pup away as you do not want to bore him or her.

Gregg Brda does not care if you hunt but he is a strong believer in that if you own a retriever, they should be active, that is what they are bred for.

Last for this week, some dogs do not like riding in a vehicle. I was told more than once, too many people only put their dog in a car or truck to go to the vet, that is big no-no. Make rides fun. Gregg pulls pups behind his atv in a crate in a trailer and just puts along and makes it fun. In reality, everything that Gregg Brda does in his training is about positive and enthusiastic adventure.

In a few months, I will write about the next step with a pup named Rio!

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
