Game one for the Wisconsin State Boys' Soccer Playoffs for the Kewaskum Indians had them playing host to the Marinette Marines on Thursday, Oct. 24.

This was Marinette's second long bus trip to Kewaskum this season as they ventured down this way in the early part of September. Kewaskum was hoping to send the visitors home with the same result - a win for the home team.

A really good start for the Indians came when junior midfielder Luciano Olla rose above everyone else and headed home his fellow junior midfielder Mac Hasse's cross off of an early corner kick. With less than seven minutes in and a 1-0 lead, the home team had aspirations of an easy victory.

It did take a while but the home side was able to double their lead when Charlie Gambino was able to send in a goal from an unlikely spot or angle on the field. A high launched ball, that was fed to him from sophomore midfielder Ali Olla, that just kept traveling and drifting towards the back post finally cleared a stumbling Marinette goalkeeper and did make contact with said post right into the back of the net.

With a two goal lead with 12 minutes to go until halftime, the home team wanted more. They continued to control and possess the ball and pace of play. Earning a number of more chances, they just couldn't find that third one in the half.

Campbellsport Boys Headed to XC State Second Year Straight

The Campbellsport cross country team participated in the Waupaca Sectional last Friday, October 25. The meet was held at Waupaca High School on a challenging and hilly 5,000 meter course.

With the low score of 72 points, the Campbellsport boys earned a trip to the State Meet in Wisconsin Rapids on Saturday, November 2. Watertown Luther Prep finished in second place with 94 points and will join the Cougars in Wisconsin Rapids.

It will be the second year in a row that the Cougars will participate at State as a team. Last year, the group was runner-up at the Portage Sectional and went on to place 15th at the State Meet.

Logan and Brody Nolan will be making their

third trip to State. It will be the second time for Garrett Pickering and Sawyer Dirmeier. Caleb Siebauer, Gavin Pickering, and Trent Dieckman will be experiencing the big event for the first time.

In the girls' race, Watertown Luther Prep (65 points) and Berlin (74 points) earned a trip to the State Meet. The Campbellsport girls finished in 13th place.

The Cougars closed out their season on a positive note. After facing "Big Bertha" last week at the Conference Meet, the Cougars tackled the tough Waupaca course, and all five Cougars improved on their time from the previous week. Ryleigh Volz missed a career best time by only 10 seconds. Lorelei Walker was nearly 90 seconds.

Campbellsport Board of Education Adopts 2024-2025 Budget

The Campbellsport School District held its annual meeting and budget hearing on Monday, Oct. 21 at 7 p.m. in the auditorium.

At the conclusion of the annual meeting and budget hearing, the school board began their regular meeting where they approved the 2024-2025 final budget and school tax levy.

The total school-based tax levy is \$8,953,009, down 1.83% from last year. The total revenue limit was determined to be \$7,119,729.

The equalized property value is \$1,491,915,733.

Together, this leads to a mill rate of \$6.00 per \$1,000 equalized valuation, which is down 8.63% from last year.

The general fund (Fund 10) beginning balance for 2024-2025 is \$4,007,864.04.

The net total expenditures of all funds is \$23,905,866.

The biggest expense in the Fund 10 and Fund 27 (special education) is salaries at 50% followed by purchased services at 25%, benefits at 18%, supplies and equipment at 5% and others at 2%. The biggest revenue source for the two fund accounts comes from state aid at 57% followed by local revenues at 35%, other districts at 5%, federal aid at 2%, and others.

Board Matters:

- The board approved the repair of the skylight at the middle/high school by Wisconsin Solar in the amount of \$79,241, which will include replacement of windows, seals, and a bronze re-glaze. It is expected to take two to three days to complete the project and the school would like to see it done as soon as possible.

- The board announced that the FFA fruit sale is going on until November 8.

- The board discussed goals for themselves with Deb Senn proposing a list to the other board members at the meeting. A draft with new goals as decided on by the whole group will be presented at the next meeting.

- A wording change was made in the crossing guard agreement with the Village and will need their approval before it comes back to the board.

This winter, brighten your mood and surroundings by planting and growing a few amaryllis. Your thoughts may turn to red when considering this plant but now you can find a variety of colors and flower shapes. Select the color that best suits your mood and indoor décor.

Fill your home with these beauties for the holidays. Then keep the blossoms coming all winter long. Plant several different types of amaryllis bulbs, from the southern and northern hemispheres, and you'll get a long-lasting, colorful display.

Most amaryllis bulbs grown in the U.S. are imported from Holland, and their natural bloom time is January through March. Exactly when the flowers will open is impossible to predict. The best strategy is to choose several different varieties and plant them three to four weeks apart during November, December, and January so you'll always have flowers coming into bloom.

Kick off the holiday season with amaryllis bulbs imported from growers in the southern hemisphere. As we enter autumn, it's springtime in South America, and these bulbs are eager to begin to bloom. Pot them up before early November for flowers in December.

Brighten the holiday season with the pure white, fully double flowers of Alaska amaryllis (longfield-gardens.com). The white blossoms with lime green throat combine nicely with winter greens. Plant the bulbs in the fall and enjoy the blossoms throughout the holiday season.

Keep the flowers coming with an early bloomer such as Evergreen, which is always quick to break out of dormancy. Its flowers have narrow, lime/chartreuse petals on 20-inch plants adding a freshness to any room. Enjoy the impressive display as each bulb produces two to three stems with four to six blooms each.

Add a bit of fun and flare with the eight-inch flowers of Dancing Queen. You'll enjoy the showy layers of ruffled snow-white petals highlighted with brush strokes of red.

If you are a fan of the popular color pink, there is an amaryllis for you. Pink Surprise Amaryllis has enormous hot pink flowers with a silky sheen and a touch of white at the tip. It is a standout and perfect as a centerpiece on the dining room table or as a colorful welcome when displayed on a table by your front entrance.

For those who prefer something a bit more subtle, check out Terra Cotta Star. The soft watercolor hues of salmon, rose, buttercream and pistachio along with its dark veins add an artistic flare to each blossom.

Showcase and enjoy your colorful amaryllis by displaying it on a mantle, kitchen counter, or entryway table. Then watch the amazing show as the first sprout appears, followed by buds and finally, its spectacular trumpet-shaped blooms. Or cut a few flowers to enjoy as long-lasting cut flowers.

Order these and other amaryllis varieties early for the greatest selection. Selecting an assortment of colors, flower shapes and bloom times provides months of beauty and enjoyment.

On Sunday, November 10, St. Martin's Church of Ashford will be celebrating another Kermis. In recent years it has changed from a sit-down meal to carry out only. Following the 7:30 a.m. mass until noon, soup, desserts, baked goods and raffle tickets will be available to purchase. The following are the many reasons why it's important to attend:

1. Thanksgiving. The event is like a pre-Thanksgiving, in which many come to church for appreciation of the past. The Kermis honors the feast day (November 11) of St. Martin of Tours, who is the patron saint of many things, including geese. You also get to see what the grounds look like with most leaves off the trees, including the view of the cross on the hill.

2. Tradition. At this point in known publications in the *Campbellsport News*, documentation exists dating the Kermis celebration to the early 1880s. Nearing 150 years, the Kermis is one of the longest annual traditions in Fond du Lac County. The celebration used to be two nights, including dances over at the hall in Ashford.

3. Timing. The harvest is already done by the feast of St. Martin's. Corn and beans is off, and the first snows usually have or are about to fall from the sky. The timing of the feast celebration is one which coincided with farmers deserving a break and treating themselves. In addition, the weather in the second week of November is typically changing to cool or damp (perfect for chicken soup).

4. Reconnection. Given St. Martin's only has one mass monthly on the second Sunday of the month, the modern Kermis allows families to connect and renew old acquaintances. There are so many family names that come through this parish - Batzler, Beck, Beisbier, Brath, Dreikosen, Emmer, Fell, Fochs, Fleischman, Hall, Hilbert, Janous, Jaeger, Koch, Pierret, Schill, Serwe, Stahl, Stoffel, Thelen and Wondra. Although this is not an exclusive list, when considering the lineage of parishioners' grandparents or great-grandparents, the listed names hit many of those who will be in attendance honoring their families.

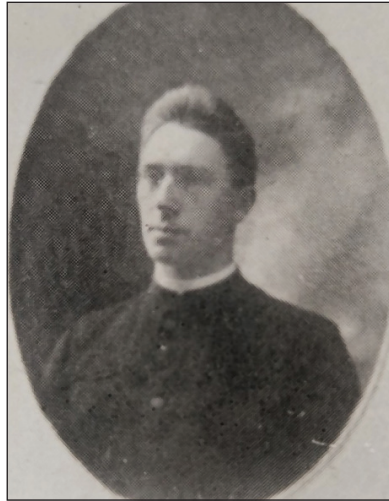
5. Sense of Community. One of the special dynamics of days gone by was when the Catholic parishioners worked together for special events like weddings, funerals and other church-related functions. The Kermis builds a sense of community down in the basement as everybody is working together to honor the church's past. I am reminded of Bob Hilbert (1934-2021), who had many ties to Ashford Township. He descended from the Hilberts who went to St. Martin's, and the Rauchs who went to the church in Wayne. He also spoke of a time where he would never miss a chicken dinner in the summer. It didn't matter the church, Bob went out of his way to support the local churches

and have a good time. His attendance at those dinners worked as a calendar of events to support. Likewise, one should consider driving out to Ashford for a good time at the Kermis whether you are from there or not.

6. Old recipes. The food served is the traditional chili and chicken soup that are homemade. In addition, spätzle can be purchased. Even the desserts become tradition, as one can't pass down the large variety of bake sale items. I have my own favorites, but am not sharing exactly here because I want some left after mass for myself! Come find out and you'll be pleasantly

surprised.

7. Efficiency. If you do not have a lot of time, you can quick pop in and stock up on your soup or chili for the week. Many have already made purchases before the mass is over. The important thing is to support the church and its history any way you can. Please understand that the event does not take a lot of time if you are in a hurry that morning.

8. Preservation. The event raises money for the upkeep and improvements necessary for the historic church. It's events like the Kermis that keep St. Martin's standing and looking sharp, while honoring those who we came from. A beautiful new church sign recently went up between Highway 67 and the parking lot. Come and see it. As always, donations to St. Martin's Chapel is appreciated.

9. Let the ringing continue. There are times when I'll be outside near the Katzenburg and hear the bells echoing in Ashford Township out of St. Martin's. It's a calling. Recognize the beauty of the old church still standing. And don't forget your role in helping make that happen. What is neat about the clientele who support the Kermis is the inclusion of people who weren't members of St. Martin's are happy to get soup, snacks and raffle tickets. The Kermis is a great source of income for St. Martin's. In that sense, the bells toll as a reminder of a beauty in those local parishes, and an encouragement to keep those buildings functioning. Too many Catholic churches in the area belong to the soil and stories alone. Take a scenic drive out to Ashford, and come celebrate this blessing that this church still functions.

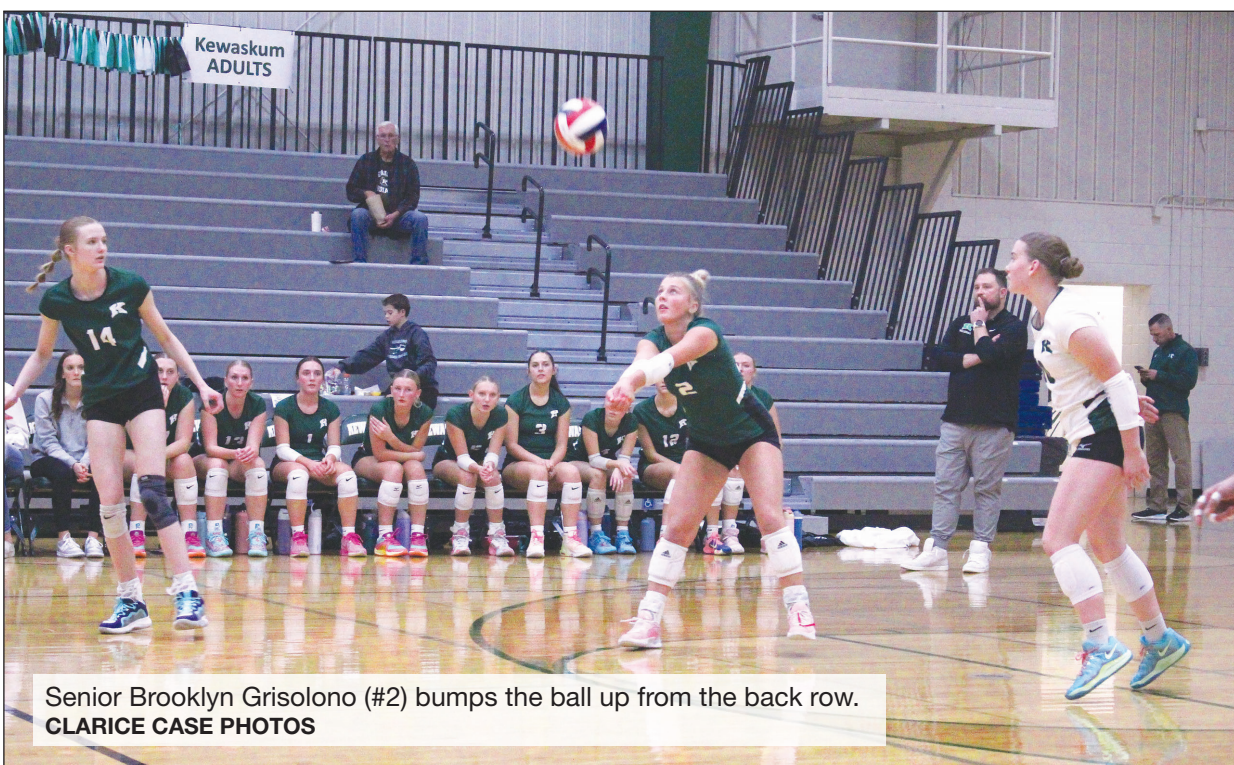

Due to winning both playoff games, Kewaskum will host another game on Thursday, Oct. 31, for the sectional semifinals at 7 p.m. against Grafton.

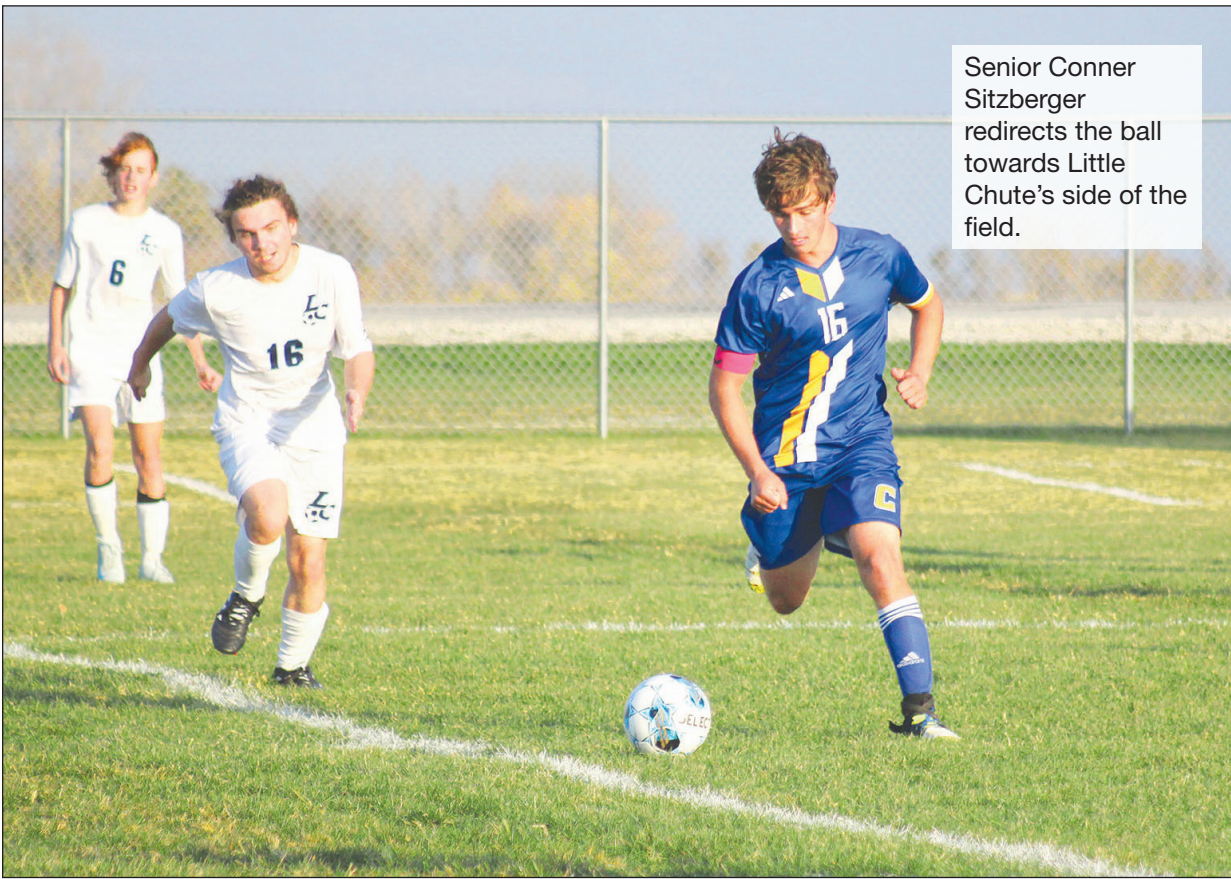


Morgan Vetter (#10) takes a hard serve from Ripon during the game on Thursday, Oct. 24.

With the victory, the 6th grade team ended their year with a 5-3 record.

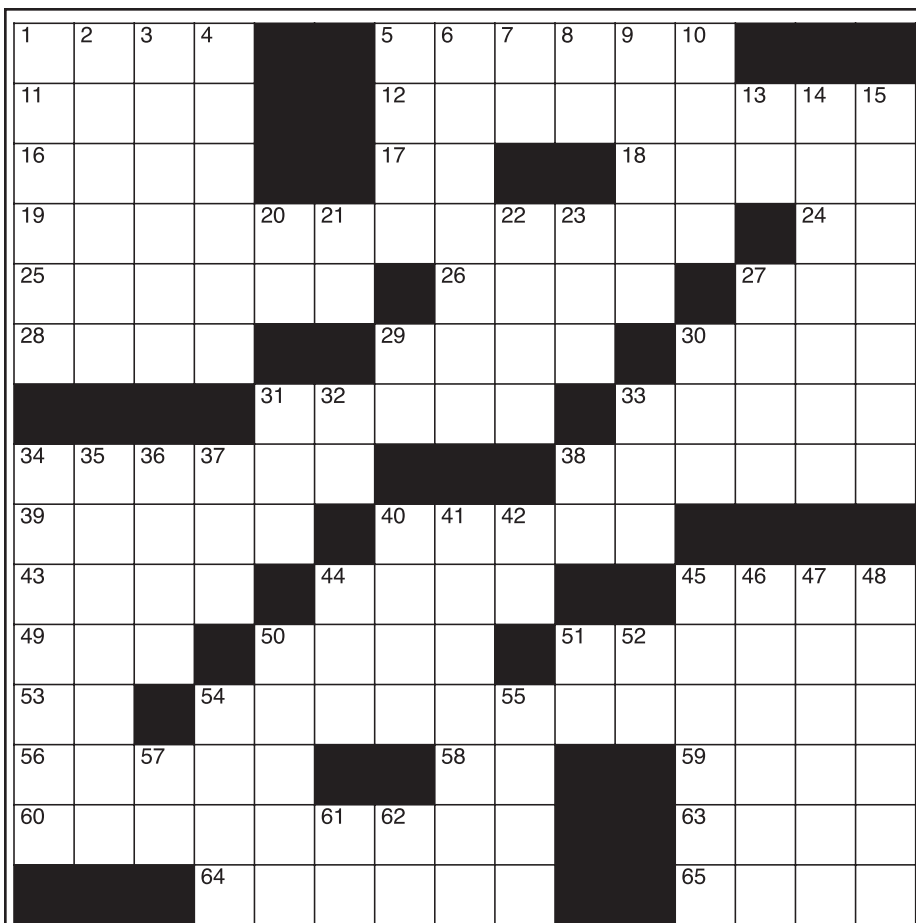
Fifth Grade

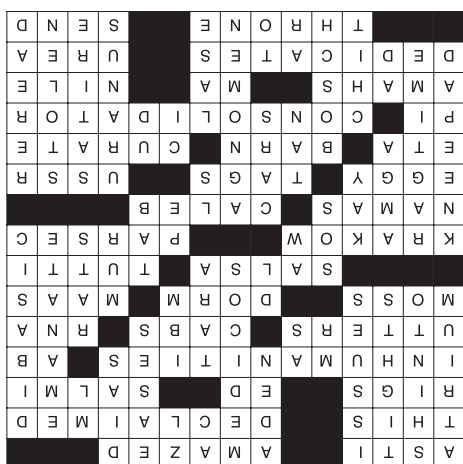

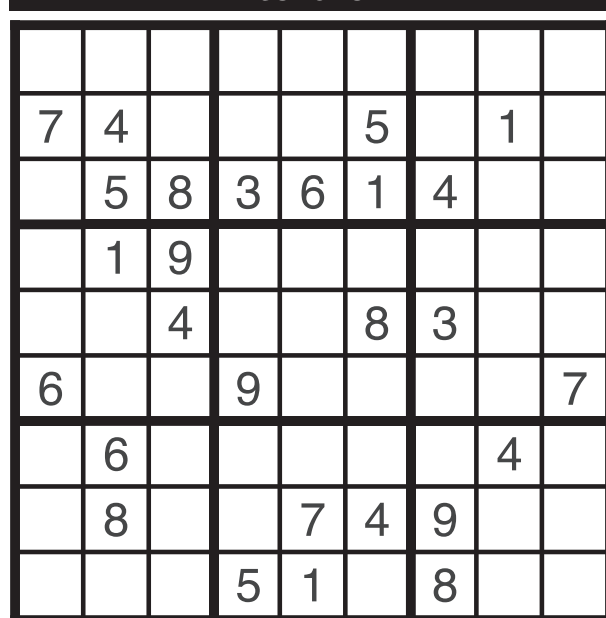

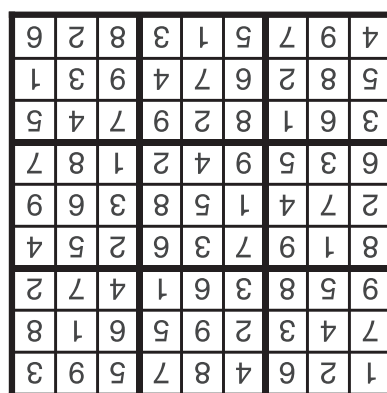

2023 Senate Resolution 71
Enrolled Joint Resolution

To renumber and amend section 1 of article III; and **to create** section 1 (1) of article III of the constitution; **relating to:** eligibility to vote in Wisconsin (second consideration).

Whereas, the 2021 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2021 Senate Joint Resolution 32, which became 2021 Enrolled Joint Resolution 13, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1 of article III of the constitution is renumbered section 1 (2) of article III and amended to read:

[Article III] Section 1 (2) Every Only a United States citizen age 18 or older who is a resident of an election district in this state is a qualified elector of that district who may vote in an election for national, state, or local office or at a statewide or local referendum.

SECTION 2. Section 1 (1) of article III of the constitution is created to read: [Article III] Section 1 (1) In this section:

- (a) “Local office” means any elective office other than a state or national office.
- (b) “National office” means the offices of president and vice president of the United States, U.S. senator, and representative in congress.
- (c) “Referendum” means an election at which an advisory, validating, or ratifying question is submitted to the electorate.
- (d) “State office” means the offices of governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, state superintendent of public instruction, justice of the supreme court, court of appeals judge, circuit court judge, state senator, state representative to the assembly, and district attorney.

SECTION 3. Numbering of new provision. If another constitutional amendment ratified by the people creates the number of any provision created in this joint resolution, the chief of the legislative reference bureau shall determine the sequencing and the numbering of the provisions whose numbers conflict.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2023 legislature; and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday of November, 2024; and, be it further

Resolved, That the question concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

“Eligibility to vote. Shall section 1 of article III of the constitution, which deals with suffrage, be amended to provide that only a United States citizen age 18 or older who resides in an election district may vote in an election for national, state, or local office or at a statewide or local referendum?”

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT AS TO THE QUESTION

The Wisconsin Constitution provides that “[e]very United States citizen age 18 or older who is a resident of an election district in this state is a qualified elector of that district.” Wis. Const. art. III, § 1. That language is repeated in Wisconsin statute. Wis. Stat. § 6.02(1).

The referendum question would modify the language in Wis. Const. art. III, § 1 to provide that “only” a U.S. citizen 18 or older who resides in an election district may vote, and it would specify that only such individuals may vote in an election for “a national, state, or local office or at a statewide or local referendum.” It also would add definitions of what “local office, “national office,” “referendum,” and “state office” mean. 2023 Wis. S.J. Res. 71.

A “yes” vote would vote to modify existing article III, section 1 of the Wisconsin Constitution to provide that “only” a U.S. citizen 18 or older who resides in an election district can vote “in a national, state, or local office or at a statewide or local referendum.”

A “no” vote would vote not to change Wis. Const. art. III, § 1 of the Wisconsin Constitution.

**If the voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word "exempt."

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot.

Voting for President and Vice President

A vote for candidates for President and Vice President is a vote for the presidential electors of those candidates. A write-in vote for President and Vice President must designate the name of a presidential candidate.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

When using an electronic ballot marking device ("ImageCast Evolution-ICE") to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote.

Spoiling Ballots

If a voter spoils an optical scan ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it may be inserted in a security sleeve so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at an election to be held in the several towns, villages, wards, and election districts of Fond du Lac, on Tuesday, November 5, 2024, the following question will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law:

2023 Senate Resolution 71
Enrolled Joint Resolution

To renumber and amend section 1 of article III; and **to create** section 1 (1) of article III of the constitution; **relating to:** eligibility to vote in Wisconsin (second consideration).

Whereas, the 2021 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2021 Senate Joint Resolution 32, which became 2021 Enrolled Joint Resolution 13, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1 of article III of the constitution is renumbered section 1 (2) of article III and amended to read:

[Article III] Section 1 (2) Every Only a United States citizen age 18 or older who is a resident of an election district in this state is a qualified elector of that district who may vote in an election for national, state, or local office or at a statewide or local referendum.

SECTION 2. Section 1 (1) of article III of the constitution is created to read:

[Article III] Section 1 (1) In this section:

- (a) "Local office" means any elective office other than a state or national office.
- (b) "National office" means the offices of president and vice president of the United States, U.S. senator, and representative in congress.
- (c) "Referendum" means an election at which an advisory, validating, or ratifying question is submitted to the electorate.
- (d) "State office" means the offices of governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, state superintendent of public instruction, justice of the supreme court, court of appeals judge, circuit court judge, state senator, state representative to the assembly, and district attorney.

SECTION 3. Numbering of new provision. If another constitutional amendment ratified by the people creates the number of any provision created in this joint resolution, the chief of the legislative reference bureau shall determine the sequencing and the numbering of the provisions whose numbers conflict.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2023 legislature; and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday of November, 2024; and, be it further

Resolved, That the question concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

"Eligibility to vote. Shall section 1 of article III of the constitution, which deals with suffrage, be amended to provide that only a United States citizen age 18 or older who resides in an election district may vote in an election for national, state, or local office or at a statewide or local referendum?"

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT AS TO THE QUESTION

The Wisconsin Constitution provides that "[e]very United States citizen age 18 or older who is a resident of an election district in this state is a qualified elector of that district." Wis. Const. art. III, § 1. That language is repeated in Wisconsin statute. Wis. Stat. § 6.02(1).

The referendum question would modify the language in Wis. Const. art. III, § 1 to provide that "only" a U.S. citizen 18 or older who resides in an election district may vote, and it would specify that only such individuals may vote in an election for "a national, state, or local office or at a statewide or local referendum." It also would add definitions of what "local office," "national office," "referendum," and "state office" mean. 2023 Wis. S.J. Res. 71.

A "yes" vote would vote to modify existing article III, section 1 of the Wisconsin Constitution to provide that "only" a U.S. citizen 18 or older who resides in an election district can vote "in a national, state, or local office or at a statewide or local referendum."

A "no" vote would vote not to change Wis. Const. art. III, § 1 of the Wisconsin Constitution.

Office of the Fond du Lac County Clerk To the voters of Fond du Lac County:

Notice is hereby given of a general election to be held in the several wards in Fond du Lac County on November 5, 2024, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are listed under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, together with any referendum questions submitted to a vote, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification*
- sign the poll book

***If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.**

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth and then proceed to a machine to cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter. If a voter is unable to state their name and address, an assistant may also do so for the voter.

Voting for President and Vice President

A vote for candidates for President and Vice President is a vote for the presidential electors of those candidates. A write-in vote for President and Vice President must designate the name of a presidential candidate. A write-in vote for a candidate for President only will be counted. A write-in vote for a candidate for Vice President only will not be counted.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. When voting for President and Vice President, the voter shall fill in the oval next to the set of candidates (ticket) for President and Vice President for whom they intend to vote. To vote for a Presidential ticket that does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the names of persons of their choice in the spaces provided and fill in the oval next to the write-in lines. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an **electronic ballot marking device** to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall use the tactile pad to type in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. When voting for President and Vice President, the voter shall use the tactile pad to select the set of candidates (ticket) for President and Vice President for whom they intend to vote. To vote for a Presidential ticket that does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall use the tactile pad to type in the names of persons of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall use the tactile pad to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall select "no" if opposed to the question.

Spoiling Ballots

If a voter spoils an **optical scan** ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than **three** ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an **official optical scan** ballot is marked, the voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device.

The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

The following is a sample of the official ballot:

Notice to voters: if you are voting on Election Day, your ballot must be initialed by two (2) election inspectors. If you are voting absentee, your ballot must be initialed by the municipal clerk or deputy clerk. Your ballot may not be counted without initials (see end of ballot for initials).

General Instructions

If you make a mistake on your ballot or have a question, ask an election inspector for help (absentee voters: contact your municipal clerk).

To vote for a name on the ballot, fill in the oval next to the name like this:

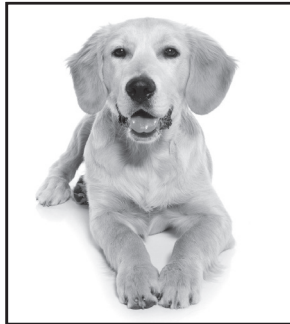

Pre-Rut Bow Hunt and Camping Trip

Hello friends,

I think that you will find this week's column a tad bit different, with an interesting point of view thrown into it. If you disagree, that is fine, but be nice.

Wednesday, October 16
High 63, Low 27

My plan was simple - drive to the Durand area for a three-night, four-day bow hunting trip on the backwaters of the Chippewa River. This is a remote, very hard to get to location and if you are blessed with harvesting a deer, getting it out of the swamp can be a challenge. First set back - I am driving on the interstate, and my mood is excellent when I realize that I am one day off on the date that I have to leave for my Montana elk and mule deer hunt. Staying three nights on this hunt would only give me 48 hours at home before I have to leave. This hunt is now cut short to two nights.

Here is the zinger for this hunt. On my elk and deer hunt, both Selina and I have deer and elk tags. I am thinking we are going to make some meat. What I would like to harvest on my Chippewa River hunt is a buck or a very young deer. Why a young antlerless deer? Because the quality of the meat is absolutely incredible. Think about it this way - the taste of a 27-inch walleye compared to a 15-incher, a rooster compared to a young fryer, a steer compared to an old bull.

On this hunt, I paddle to where I set up my portable stand, and I have seen some beautiful bucks here. On my afternoon hunt, I saw very little sign of the rut but was well past due to sit in a tree and watch the world. A half hour before dark, I had a very large doe cross a marsh and come right at me. I made and stood by the decision that she was going to live be-

cause I want a young deer or a buck.

Thursday, October 17
High 72, Low 35

I recently rebuilt my 14-foot duck skiff that had way too many leaks. Unfortunately, it still has a leak but as long as I pull it out of the water when I get to my stand and back to camp, I am fine. For myself, the adventure is what I seek in my bow hunts. I am pretty sure that by this point in my life I could have found a cush situation for bow hunting and put a hurting on some big bucks but that would bore me.

This morning I did not see a deer. This afternoon a humongous doe offered me an easy shot at 17-yards. She was actually smelling where my shoulder had brushed up against a tag alder branch. No matter what you think or do, they can smell you. This doe was the largest that I would have harvested in my life but she was given a free pass, and I had no regrets.

Friday, October 18
High 73, Low 41

My paddles to the stand are either

going to the stand in the dark or back in the dark, and as I have written in the past, I paddle by a beaver lodge, and it is crazy funny and interesting how the local beaver family attacks me by splashing their tails in the water as loud as they can, and in some cases I even get water on me. In the dark, you have to have nerves of steel and keep on paddling.

I am always on my stand a half hour before daylight and I have to admit that for this hunt, I was simply too early for the rut but had no choice as I am heading west. Just after daylight, a young deer appeared from out of nowhere and was seven-yards away. It was too close to pull back on and then was in the brush. I had no cares, but it was the kind of animal that I am looking for. The big,

old stuff will come in Montana.

About an hour later, I give a grunt on my grunt call and a deer comes at me pretty steady from across a marsh, and I am thinking, tasty critter. At 10-yards, I let an arrow fly that made perfect contact and thus my goal of a young deer was met. I hunted another two hours for a buck and had no luck. I dressed my deer, paddled it back to camp and in 45 minutes had it skinned, quartered and iced. In the future, I am going to harvest more

young deer as no matter what anyone try's to say, the quality of the meat supersedes the "I've gotta shoot the old, tough as leather goat."

Montana and mountain adventure, here we come!
