Kewaskum hosted Division Two Wrestling Regionals for the girls on Friday night, Feb. 14, and for the boys the next day on Saturday, Feb. 15.

Girls

Moving on to Sectionals for the Lady Indians are Sybil Gadouas, who placed fourth in the 126 weight class, and Aria Coronado, who placed third in the 138 weight class, and they will compete at Dodgeland on Friday night, Feb. 21.

In the quarterfinals, Gadouas lost by technical fall, but won both the fourth and fifth place matches by decision and fall, respectively, for her fourth place finish.

Coronado fell in her semifinal match, but came

back and won her third place match by fall.

Annie Chojnacki just missed a spot on the podium in the 120 weight class after losing by fall in the quarterfinals and later in the fifth place match.

Sectionals at Dodgeland begins at 5 p.m. on Friday.

Cougar Wrestlers are Regional Runner-Ups

The boys wrestling team competed at the Kewaskum Regional on Saturday, February 15 and finished in second place as a team, thus qualifying them for the Team Sectional on Tuesday, February 18. The Cougars qualified nine wrestlers to Sectionals. Logan Knoeck, Jacob Allickson, Conner Sitzberger, Porter Klotz, and Brock Bentz each won individual championships.

At 106 pounds, Logan Knoeck would make the championship by earning a technical fall and a pin. In the championship against Levi Schwarz of WLA, Knoeck found himself down by four with five seconds left. Knoeck got a point on a stalling call and then earned a takedown just before time expired to force overtime. He then defended a shot by Schwarz and got the takedown for the win.

At 113 pounds, Jacob Allickson had no problems winning his title. He earned a pin and major decision to get to the finals, where he pinned the number one seed, Wyatt Stowell of Waupun, in just 36 seconds.

At 165 pounds, Conner Sitzberger got a pin and major decision to get to the finals, where he met Moses Metzger of WLA. In another exciting match, Sitzberger found himself going into sudden death overtime tied at three. He used a great fireman's carry to earn the takedown in overtime and win the championship.

At 175 pounds, Porter Klotz came in as the four seed, but he didn't let that intimidate him as he pinned his way to the championship, knocking off the number one and two seeds in the process.

At 285 pounds, Brock Bentz also pinned all his

C.H.S. Freshmen Placed in Secure Detention Following Threats to School

FOND DU LAC COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE

On February 11, 2025, the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office School Resource Deputy assigned to Campbellsport School District received information on a threat to school safety.

Initial investigation revealed that two 9th grade students were making direct plans, comments and threats to other students and staff that involved plans to conduct a school shooting. This investigation is ongoing and the two 9th grade students have been placed in secure detention awaiting a future court hearing on criminal charges. There is no immediate threat to public safety at this time.

The Sheriff's Office takes all claims of threats to school safety seriously. The safety of students and staff is of the highest priority. We know that incidents like this can cause anxiety for students, families and staff. We want the public to be informed of this situation and emphasize school safety through the importance of telling an adult, teacher or law enforcement if there is a concern or threat of any kind. We are all working together to keep our schools safe.

Concerns or tips on school threats can also be reported to the Wisconsin Department of Justice, Speak up Speak Out website. The Speak Up, Speak Out Resource Center will respond quickly and confidentially, in coordination with emergency services and school districts, to get help to you or someone who is hurting, struggling or in danger.



Campbellsport Approves Water Plant CIP

The Campbellsport Village Board held a regular meeting on Monday, Feb. 10 at 6 p.m.

The Board approved the 2024 Strand and Associates water plant capital improvement plan (CIP) that was presented to them in November. In addition, they also approved the 2024 Ehlers and Associates water department cash flow analysis.

Charlie Kudy, Village Administrator, said, "The projected increase for 2026...is 10 percent. Then it's three percent annually after that."

The Board approved a resolution directing financial policy for fire truck replacement and resolution direction financial policy on Fond du Lac County ambulance subsidy. This approval allows for the re-establishment of accounts that were set

aside for fire truck, ambulance, and other equipment replacement that were closed around 15 years ago. The money can be put into these accounts again and will not go into the general fund.

The Board also approved the 2025 Strand professional services agreement for construction services for sewer plant phosphorus and capital improvement projects.

Earlier in the meeting, Kudy read out the department reports.

Highlights included:

- A first review of the development agreement with Robert's Homes and Real Estate was completed last month.
- Provisions have been submitted for Twin Village Estates.
- The apartments on the south side of Campbellsport are awaiting a second scheduled reimburse-

ment under the board for developers' agreements.

• The 16 acres on the north side of Campbellsport on Highway V have been listed for sale and are \$25,000 an acre. There are several developers interested and currently evaluating the property. The comprehensive plan for the property includes commercial and residential possibility.

• There are 17 acres of land available in the industrial and business park.

• The reassessment of the Village is scheduled to take place this year.

• There is ongoing work with the Ladwig Street project, and special assessment bills have been sent out to residents.

The Board convened into closed session at the end of the meeting to discuss contract negotiation.

The next Village Board meeting is scheduled for Monday, March 10.



WHAT WAS LOST

Another Ash on the Horicon Marsh

The following is an explanation why this tree in the Town of LeRoy is a likely trail marker tree.

1. **Correct species and age.** Having read the *Dodge County Pioneer* on a potential trail tree in Oakfield Township, private property owners mentioned this massive tree. The ash's circumference is pushing 16 feet and is a spectacle to behold among a couple of old oaks at the start of the Horicon Marsh. Tree calculations of a circumference suggest this tree dates its origin to somewhere between 1720 and 1770, depending on if it's a white or green ash.

2. **Unusual bend.** Though hard to date the exact year of the bend, an unorthodox branch shoots south/southwest at about four to five feet off the ground. Any tree book will tell you the canopy of an ash tree will form more of a lollipop canopy. In contrast, the tree branch extends nearly 50 feet running parallel to the Marsh soil. Many in the area would be familiar with the lower branches of oak trees running horizontal. Ash don't normally grow as such. In short, this ash tree has a south-pointing bottom branch that grows like an untrimmed oak tree in an open plain.

3. **Direction.** The tree points in the same direction of at least two trees in the neighboring township to the north with likely branch bends pointing south/southwesterly. You will notice that the south pointing branch does not have a symmetrical branch of the same stature on the opposite side. This would suggest an intentional bend to the south.

4. **Vicinity.** There are now at least five plausible trail trees above or below the Ledge on the east side of Horicon Marsh. The location of this one is on the eastern edges of where the Marsh begins and as the Ledge and outcroppings of elevation end. This is a reminder that private property owners need to check their land in the vicinity where the Horicon Marsh meets the Ledge.

5. **Plausible narrative.** Besides age and the right location, this tree is not in a position that would pull such an unusual bend. For example, although it is

by a property line, it is not a situation where the tree's branch was pushed to lean away from the woods and reach for the open sun. It would not take much to mold this branch, given the heavy Native American traffic up and down the Marsh in the 1700 and 1800s. Also, because this branch was not competing within some woods, it stands to reason that the arm comes out considerably (almost 50 feet) to the south/southwest detached from a standard canopy. The branch is so old its circumference measured two feet from the trunk is still more than six feet.

6. **Questions remain.** There is a second branch that clearly was entangled, but it is hard to say when that one was shaped. Also, we must continue investigating the remaining ash in the area before they are dead from emerald ash borer, as the fate of this likely tree is written by its curdling bark. How many can we identify before it's too late? Thanks for reading previous articles. We are starting to accumulate considerable evidence of remaining marker trees.




Kewaskum Village Board Amends ATV/UTV Ordinance to Address Speed Limit Concerns

The Kewaskum Village Board recently amended its ATV/UTV ordinance to clarify speed limits and permitted roadways for off-road vehicle operation. Initially, the ordinance set a maximum posted speed limit of 35 mph for ATV/UTV use on designated village roads.

However, a local ATV/UTV club identified a stretch of Highway H, extending eastbound from Kettle View Drive into the village, where the posted speed limit was 45 mph, leading to confusion regarding vehicle operation. In response, the village board approved an amendment allowing ATV/UTV use on that portion of the roadway.

Additionally, the amendment extends legal ATV/UTV operation to other areas within the village where the posted speed limit is 45 mph, ensuring consistency and clarity in the ordinance.



It is already well into the second month of the year and librarians across the state are relieved that their annual reports have been completed. The annual report is a requirement by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction for all public libraries in Wisconsin. Briefly, it is a compilation of our performance over the past year. It highlights programs, projects and activities that occurred during the year as well as details of our normal operations. It is also a lot of work, and a big sigh of relief is breathed when it is completed and submitted.

Here is our 2024 wrap-up:

We circulated 40,258 physical items and 7,360 electronic ones. These numbers are down a little from the previous year, but just less than 1% for the circulation of books, movies and other items. I think that is amazing, considering we were closed for about a week and were not easy to get to with the ongoing construction. Compared to other libraries' statistics for 2024, we did very well.

Electronic check-outs are digital circulations and include eBooks through Libby, use of online databases such as Universal Class and Ancestry and hoopla usage. That continues to grow in use.

Kewaskum Public Library registered 365 new cards, one per day! With our new location much more visible than our prior one, we had people finding us who were not aware we existed. It was nice to meet so many new readers. A total of 26,871 people walked through our doors, the front and back ones

and visited with us. Some attended programs – 3,928 people at 163 programs. But we also reached out to schools, daycares and assisted living centers and met with more than 1,100 seniors, students and children to promote literacy.

In 2024, we had success with major accomplishments and additions to our collection. When we moved, we added more community space including meeting rooms, semi-private study areas and are in the process of transforming the vault into a local history room with all sorts of exciting features. We added new programs for our community including yoga, Lego Lab, Silent Book Club and more. In conjunction with the Kewaskum Historical Society, another genealogical resource, *Newspapers.com* was added to our ever-growing collection.

More people are using the library in different ways. I have witnessed in the same afternoon, people logging into to our computers to file for unemployment, parents connecting while their children play with toys or the interactive boards on our walls, students using study rooms to do their homework, older adults browsing our magazines and newspapers, a small group having a meeting in the conference room, children cozy reading on our comfy chair, and scores of patrons checking out items. In 2024, people that used our library saved a total of \$745,000 in checking out items as opposed to buying them.

The library had a great 2024 and I look forward to more opportunities to share my love of life-long learning in 2025.


