C.H.S. Art Club Guides Young Artists on a Creative Journey

Then a stop in New York City introduced them to graffiti-inspired pin-making. The trip stopped in Japan for a snack, where the kids created an aquarium with koi fish (Swedish Fish and Goldfish). The journey continued to Peru, where students practiced traditional weaving techniques. For a creative twist, the young artists then blasted off to Mars, where they sculpted aliens out of clay.

The food provided turned out to be more than enough, so Family Promise was able to invite people who had transitioned out of their services to come in for meals.

This spring, a Peace Church member has generously offered to match all donations for Family Promise dollar-for-dollar up to \$5,000 through May 31.


| RURAL WRITES |

Washington County Issues Fire/EMS Grant Funding

Washington County has designated \$1,000,000 of one-time funding in 2025 to support Fire/EMS efforts at the local level. These grants will provide financial assistance directly to local municipalities that fund eligible fire departments and fire/EMS organizations to assist with the provision of critical staffing, training, and equipment.

All Washington County municipalities are eligible to receive the funds, except for the City of West Bend, which is set to receive the majority of funds in the lead lateral grant program. Dollars will be distributed with proportional shares calculated based on population, equalized value and emergency call volume.

"These grants represent another positive outcome from the county's meetings with all chief local elected officials over the past two years," said Josh Schoemann, county executive. "Shared revenue allocations such as this help our municipalities stretch their budget dollars that otherwise would be absorbed by the increased costs facing Fire/EMS."

Each municipality received an award letter and must approve and accept the grant through a resolution process with their elected boards and councils. Twelve of the 19 eligible municipalities have approved the funding so far.

Among the uses the funding can be used for includes hiring fire and emergency response personnel, and incentives for volunteer recruitment and retention. Operations and safety costs are also covered for contract cost increases in excess of net new construction, EMS/Fire equipment such as personal protective equipment and specialty access vehicles, EMS training, updates to stations, and wellness and fitness.

D.N.R. Encourages Kids to Participate in 2025 Youth Turkey Hunt April 12-13

WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds families, mentors and young hunters that there’s still time to plan and participate in the 2025 statewide youth turkey hunt April 12-13.

Each year, the youth turkey hunt gives hunters under 16 the opportunity feel the excitement of turkey season and gain valuable hunting experience before the regular turkey season begins.

What Youth Hunters Need To Participate

Youth hunters must have a spring turkey license, wild turkey stamp and valid harvest authorization. All of these are available online through Go Wild or at any license sales agent around the state.

Youth hunters may use a harvest authorization for any period during the youth hunt, but they must hunt within the turkey management zone indicated on their harvest authorization. Harvest authorizations not filled during the youth hunt may be filled during the regular hunting season in the corresponding zone.

During this two-day youth hunt, the bag limit is one male or bearded turkey.

To participate in the mentored hunt program, youth hunters must be accompanied by a qualified adult 18 years of age or older. An adult cannot accompany more than two youth hunters at one time. Only one youth hunter can follow the mentored hunting program if the adult is attending to more than one youth hunter. More information on mentoring a hunter is available on the DNR’s Mentored Hunting webpage.

New hunters can commemorate their first harvest with an official certificate. Follow the

instructions on the DNR’s First Harvest Certificate webpage and upload information about the experience.

Full regulations, harvest registration information and other helpful turkey hunting information can be found on the DNR’s Turkey Hunting and Management webpage.

Harvest Registration

Harvest registration is a critical component of wildlife population management, and turkey registration is mandatory for all turkey hunters, including youth hunters.

Hunters must register their turkey by 5 p.m. the day after recovery online via GameReg (gowild.wi.gov/wildlife/harvest) or by calling 1-844-426-3734. Hunters will need their harvest authorization number to register their turkey.





Doug's Retired

Hello friends,

As time passes, a great many of my friends and family have retired or are very close. One man that has been in this column on a regular basis is Doug Cibulka, who, when we were kids in Poynette, was a pal of mine and still is today.



By dark, Doug and I only had three perch and we entered the Eskimo mobile home for an evening of fine food and festivities.


Wednesday, March 26

As can be the case sometimes, we were not exactly on fire, as was the case for most fishermen.


The water was very low and possibly the perch were about done spawning, but some fishermen that tried really hard were impressive.




